

TWO KLAMATH DISTRICTS ASK R. F. C. FUNDS

Applications of the Malin and Horsety irrigation districts for reconstruction finance corporation loans, have been approved to the extent that an appraisal of the districts is to be made.

This was reported Thursday by Carl Mason, local accountant, who handles the applications of the two districts for advance of funds to permit a refinancing program.

Appraisers Appointed
Mason received word Thursday from Senators Steiwer and McNary informing him that an appraiser had been ordered to the districts and the appraisal will start within the next few days.

If, after the appraisal, the loans are approved, the districts will receive approximately \$200,000. Horsety asked for \$110,000 and Malin asked for \$90,000. The loans will make it possible for the districts to operate on a cheaper basis than at present, with payments spread over a period of 40 years. At present, Malin must meet its payments in 10 years and Horsety in 30 years.

NEW CABINET MAN SWORN IN FRIDAY

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16. (AP)—A new cabinet officer who says he will give unwavering support to President Roosevelt's gold-buying plan, and who is a close friend of a leading commodity dollar advocate, takes full control tomorrow of the treasury.

But officials continued to deny vigorously that the designation of Henry Morgenthau, Jr., as undersecretary and the unlimited leave of absence granted to William H. Woodin, secretary, meant any schism between the latter and the president.

CHARGE OF MURDER FILED IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 16. (AP)—A charge of first degree murder was today filed against Mrs. A. Henrietta Vollbrecht, who nursed Herman Herbers, 72, the last few days before his death Oct. 28 in a Vancouver, Wash., hospital.

The complaint, signed by a son of Herbers, charges that Mrs. Vollbrecht, also known as Henrietta Ayers, "of deliberate and premeditated malice did kill Herman Herbers by administering to him poison." The date of the alleged offense was given as Oct. 14.

MEN GIVEN JOBS PLANTING PINES

WILLOW RANCH, Calif.—A score and a half of men have found employment here during the past week when 60,000 young pine trees were planted by the U. S. forest service under the supervision of District Ranger Alvin L. Parker. The tree planters, some of whom had been burning brush along new roads built by the men of the 998th company from the Crane

Creek camp during the past summer, were all drawn from local ranches, the farmers driving in their cars to the planting area and returning home each night.

Since the Sugar Hill fire of 1929 swept over 5,000 acres of merchantable pine timber east of Goose Lake valley, tree planting has been carried on by the U. S. forest service each spring and fall and several hundred acres have blossomed forth in young pine trees. Forestry officials state that tree planting in this section has been unusually successful. The work will be resumed on a larger scale next spring.
