FORESTER OFFERS LEGISLATIVE PLAN

SALEM, June 24 (AP)—Perpetuation of the state's forestry resources would be aided by proposed legislation which would place mature timber on a more equitable tax basis and which would permit the state to acquire considerable land to be set aside as state forests, State Forester J. W. Ferguson reported to Governor Martin today.

Ferguson said the state must assume further obligation in forest protection.

Last year 221,485 acres of forest lands were burned over in western Oregon at a loss of \$1,965,218, while the loss on 3597 acres in eastern Oregon totaled \$2699.

Throughout the state, 80,919,000 board feet of merchantable timber burned at a loss of \$103,921, the remainder of the loss being suffered by equipment, brush fires and other property. Fire fighting costs were \$73,717. Of the 1,044 fires over the state, 363 were caused by careless smokers, 266 incendiary, 177 brush burning, 129 lightning, 111 campfires, 88 slashing, 87 miscellaneous, 45 logging and 23 by railroads.
