Elks Come From Way Behind to Beat Polin in Final Innings

Weyerhaeuser's softball team, which up until Friday night had been more or less of an unknown quantity despite its position on top of the standings, Saturday looked like the class of the circuit and a more than likely pennant winner.

Weyerhaeuser blanked Klamath Billiards, rated as one of the loop's stronger outfits, 4-0, Friday night and sank the Billiards below the 500 mark for the first time this season. A bit later in the evening, the Elks claimed a screwy 13-15 victory over Louie Polin and jumped past the Polins into a tie with Klamath Billiards for fifth place.

Weyerhaeuser's record Saturday stood at three games won, none lost and four left to play. One of the victories was against the weak Southern Pacific club but the other two were hard-earned wins over Smokes, the second-place team, and Klamath Billiards.

Among the four remaining games, the league-leaders have two relatively easy spots, the Elks and Polins, and two tough ones, Woodworkers and Knights of Columbus. If the mill players can beat both Elks and Polin and turn back either one of their other two opponents, they will be assured of at least a tie for the first-half championship, because no other outfit in the league is still undefeated.

In shutting out the Billiards, Ferguson of Weyerhaeuser allowed only four hits and practically won his own ball game with a home run and a single. He got additional, though unnecessary, batting support from Herberger, who collected two singles, and String, who batted out a double.

Remus of Klamath Billiards also turned in a nice pitching job, limiting the winners to seven hits and three runs. Weyerhaeuser's concentrated efforts in the third, fourth and last innings, coupled with light stickwork on the part of the Billiards batters, proved too much of a handicap for him to overcome. Lenn, second-sacker, got two of the four Billiards hits.

Strong, Weyerhaeuser second baseman, and Marshall, Billiards shortstop, were outstanding on defense. The game was run off in less than an hour.

Louie Polin led 10-3 at the end of the fifth inning of the nightcap and apparently had his game with the Elks securely tied, fastened and anchored by three straight errors, and tied up the game, 12-13.

At a meeting of managers of Klamath Basin baseball teams it was voted to change the name of their league from Klamath Basin to Klamath Timber League, inasmuch as all its members are mill teams.

The league will swing into the fourth week Sunday, with Big Lakes traveling to Dorris, Algonia going to Chiloquin and Big meeting Modoc Point in Klamath Falls.

The Big Lakes nine is resting in top place, with three wins and no defeats. Big is second, with two wins and one loss.

Chiloquin, which replaced the Polins in the league, has played but one game to date. It will meet Modoc Point at Chiloquin in a double header July 13 and play a twin bill at Dorris August 1, in order to pick up its postponed games.

The undefeated Big Lakes team will be featured on Modoc field in a game July 4. Its opponent has not yet been named, but will probably be either the Warm Springs Indians or the Medford Rogues.

WIMBLEDON, Eng., June 26 (AP)—Baron Gottfried von Cramm, tournament's second seeded player, won the first of the Wimbledon tennis championships today. Scores were 6-0, 6-2, 6-2.

The match between Baron Gottfried von Cramm of Germany and Gene Mako, American Davis cup star, promised to be outstanding among the four titles scheduled to complete the men's last eight in the Wimbledon championships today.

The German ace was a heavy favorite to win along with H. W. (Bunny) Austin of England, Heinrich Henkel of Germany and Jack Crawford, the Australian veteran.

In addition to the men's singles, the third round of women's singles was to be completed today along with the second round of the men's doubles.

Dorothy Round, British crack player, won her third round match from Miss G. Terwindt of Holland, 6-2, 6-2.

Alice Marble, the American champion, also moved up with a 6-1, 6-0 triumph over Mollie Lincoln of Great Britain.

Moe Gets Big Chance to Win Amateur Title

TACOMA, June 26 (AP)—Don Moe of Portland, an internationally famous campaigner of the fairways, who has captured a lot of titles and trophies, but has never been able to lift the Pacific northwest amateur crown, had his big chance today in the finals match with defending champion, Harry Givan of Seattle.

They were down for a 36-hole struggle at the Tacoma Country and Golf club at the same time Champion Marian McDougall, Portland, and Mrs. E. G. Griggs, Tacoma, were deciding the women's title over the same distance.

Moe has twice won the Western amateur championship, has twice been a member of the American Walker Cup team, and only recently capped the 1937 Oregon state crown, but he has always failed to quite make the grade in the northwest meet. He came the closest to the championship in 1927, when he was runner-up to the Dr. O. P. Whilling, a fellow-townsmen.

PORTLAND, June 26 (AP)—The Oak Springs trout hatchery will produce 10,000,000 trout annually under plans for its expansion adopted by the state game commission at its session here Friday.

The contemplated work, to cost \$29,667, will include addition of eight holding ponds in addition to the seven now operating, one of which will be 172 by 50 feet, the others 40 by 50 feet.

The unit will spawn more rainbow trout than half of the state's natural egg taking stations. Matt L. Ryckman, superintendent of hatcheries, estimated.

Charles D. Withers of Klamath Falls was awarded the contract for construction of a hatchery building, superintended by the state game commission at the Klamath Falls hatchery. His bid was \$16,873.

The American team made it look easy when Ralph Guldahl, American open champion, and Ed Dudley shot 67's and Johnny Revolta 68, only Sam Snead, who didn't post a score, had trouble as Captain Walter Hagen, Byron Nelson and Henry Picard shot 70's and Denny Shute and Horton Smith 72's.

It was here four years ago that Shute missed a putt on the eighteenth green, losing the hole to Syd Easterbrook, 6 strokes to 5, giving England's Ryder cup team victory by the narrowest possible margin.

Harvard Varsity Defeats Yale in Upstream Race

NEW LONDON, Conn., June 26 (AP)—Harvard's joyful Johnnies kept repeating their songs of victory today as they anticipated what promises to be the most glorious era of their long rowing history under Tom Holles, their newest-coached head coach, and captain-elect John F. (Spike) Chase, whom they hail as the greatest stroke to man one of their crimson tipped blades.

The stalwart Chase crowded even the famed Jerry (Killer) Cassidy from minds of Harvard's rowing minded hosts last night, when, for the second consecutive year, he set a pace that Ed Leader's Yale sweepers could not match up the four mile stretch of Thames river from the railroad bridge to Bartlett's cove. A year ago Chase stroked the Yale Whitehead's seventh and last varsity eight downstream to a one sided triumph over an unimpressive blue crew.

He and his sturdy mates yesterday set a new upstream record of 20 minutes, finishing a length and a quarter in front of the Yale while carrying the latter's mark of 20:14 2/5 made in 1926.

The current Elks were also under their old record, being clocked in 20:06 2/5.

The Yale crew won both the freshman and junior varsity races in the morning.
