

HAY SUSTAINS DEMURRER TO PENSION SUIT

Circuit Judge Arthur D. Hay Monday sustained the demurrer of Klamath county and members of the Klamath county court in the case brought against them by William J. Nicholson, seeking a lump sum payment of old age pensions he claimed was due him.

Nicholson, the memorandum opinion of the court recalled, first qualified for an old age pension under the laws of 1933. He transferred his property to the county to be held in trust in accordance with old age pension procedure.

Subsequently, in 1935, the legislature amended the law and Nicholson could not qualify further for a pension. He sued the county, asking for a lump sum based on a monthly pension for the remainder of his life expectancy.

Judge Hay said that if the value of the real property transferred to the county is in excess of pension money paid Nicholson, he has a remedy at equity but not at law.

In the opinion, the court said the plaintiff should "disburse his mind of any thought that to Klamath county he has a 'dripping roast' from which he can carve a bountiful portion. He is entitled to be placed in status quo, and no more."

Deputy District Attorney William Kuykendall made the arguments for sustenance of the demurrers before Judge Hay.

BOSTON WOOL

BOSTON, June 28 (AP-USA)—The wool market was quoted mostly steady to firm today though practically no business was done.

Country packed medium Ohio fleeces in lots containing combing and clothing lengths of three-eighths and quarter grades together were quoted mostly 42-43 cents in the grease, delivered east. An occasional carload was reported available at a slight concession from this range.

Graded, combed spot Ohio fleeces were firm at 43-44 cents in the grease for three-eighths blood and 42-43 cents for quarter blood. Some houses asked 45 cents for three-eighths and 44 for quarter grade.

Klamath's Cream Improves LOCAL PRODUCT GRADES HIGHER THAN AVERAGE

Klamath county has made the finest improvement of any county in this district in the quality of its cream as tested under the new cream grading law, according to Bryant Williams, supervisor for the southwestern Oregon district.

Williams said that the first time Klamath cream was graded, May 16, four per cent of it was A grade. On the last grading, 32 per cent of Klamath cream was A grade.

Over the entire district, 85 per cent of the cream is B grade. In Klamath county, only 68 per cent is B grade.

Williams explained that B grade cream is not considered low quality in any sense of the term, but A grade is extremely high quality cream and creameries over the state are paying a premium for it.

The supervisor said that dairymen have found that the cream grading law is not working a hardship on them. All that is necessary, he said, is for them to take proper care of their cream, cool it and keep it cool, keep equipment clean and make frequent deliveries to the creamery.

In Williams' territory are Lane, Douglas, Coos, Curry, Josephine, Jackson, Klamath and Lake counties.

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Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, June 28 (AP)—A further decline in rails found the stock market vulnerable today and losses of fractions to two or more points followed an early rally.

Disappointment in some financial circles over carrier earnings trends paved the way for selling in rails. Meanwhile, despite the back-to-work movement at strike-affected steel mills, Wall street said continued disputes between employers and workers cast a shadow over the industrial profit outlook. Weakness in bonds also discouraged traders. It was said.

The slow pace of trading on the decline, however, was seen by analysts as an indication traders were still in a comparatively calm mood.

Transactions approximated 650,000 shares.

WHEAT REGISTERS EXTREME ADVANCE

CHICAGO, June 28 (AP)—In a late buying stampede today, wheat prices ran up to the extreme permissible limit, 5 cents a bushel, at most North American markets. Spring wheat markets led the skyrocketing of values, influenced by spread of black rust northward and by sensational curtailment of Canadian crop estimates because of drought damage. Some estimates put the probable size of the Canadian crop as low as 150,000,000 bushels, about 50 per cent of expectations a month ago.

At the close, Chicago wheat futures were 31c to 31c above Saturday's finish, July \$1.18 1/2 to \$1.19 1/2, September \$1.19 1/2 to \$1.20, corn 1 1/2c to 3 1/2c up, July \$1.27 1/2 to 1.27 3/4, September \$1.12 1/2 to \$1.13 1/2, and oats 1c to 2c advanced.
