TAX BILL FOR RAIL PENSIONS PASSED

WASHINGTON, June 28 (AP)—The senate approved and sent to the White House today a taxation bill to finance the revised retirement system for the nation's 1,150,000 railroad workers.

The measure, passed last week by the house, would impose graduated levies on payrolls, shared equally by the roads and employees, starting at 5 1/2 per cent for three years and increasing to 7 1/2 per cent by 1949.

Separate legislation to revise the 1935 retirement act was signed last week by President Roosevelt.
