

Black Dragon Benuded in Grappling Postlude.

PETE REMOVES KNITTED MASK

Stojack Drops Taylor In Sensational Bout; La-Due Defeated.

There was an unrelenting in the armory wrestling ring last night to climax a long evening of massacre, mayhem and near murder.

The unveiling, of course, was performed on the person of the Black Dragon by one Pete Belcastro, and unlike the previous occasion on which the hooded horror has his headpiece removed here, the operation was a highly successful one and left the denuded victim in full view of the audience.

No Dignified Escape

He strutted brazenly around the premises, glaring at the big crowd and muttering imprecations. There was little else he could do, for there was no dignified avenue of escape. The fans gazed on a dark-complexioned, Latin-appearing man with short-cropped black hair, a little, bristly black mustache and sideburns.

Belcastro struggled valiantly for a total of about 23 minutes before he was able to achieve the revelation.

The first 15 minutes were the toughest. Pete occasionally found an opportunity to twist and tug at the Dragon's mask, but for the most part it was the camouflaged cloister who carried the fight, and at the end of that time a Boston crabbed flattened Belcastro for the first fall.

Peanuts in Pants

The Italian came back from his corner, however, his trunk bulging with peanuts, and after less than three minutes of applying the goobers to the Dragon's eyes, strenuous efforts to rip off the mask, punches, dropkicks and body slams, he had evened the score.

The deciding fall, accomplished in much the same way, required an additional five minutes or so, but even official victory did not lead directly to the unmasking.

It was only after the crowd had begun to leave and the Dragon was preparing to retire to his dressing room that Pete set out to complete his campaign against the Dragon's knitted noodle sack.

Headpiece Ripped Open

A swoop across the ring, one gigantic tug and the headgear ripped open beneath the Dragon's chin, leaving his face half exposed. The Dragon promptly picked up his stool and dazed Belcastro to move in for what amounted to the kill, but luck and a couple of customers were on Pete's side.

The ringers snatched the stool from the Dragon's hand. Pete lunged forward, and in another second there stood the dark-complexioned, Latin-appearing fellow, all uncovered before the crowd.

The semi-windup between Frankie Taylor of Ohio and Stojack of Washington, longest bout of the evening, was also one of the fastest and most spectacular displayed on the local wrestling carpet in recent months.

Stojack, outweighed nearly 20 pounds, proved that sometimes a good little man can defeat a good big man, by tumbling the husky Ohio Stater for two straight.

Grants and Growlers

There was plenty of time between the falls, and it was filled with action, to say nothing of grunting and growling such as has seldom rung through those musty old halls.

The pair went through the first 10 minutes without either's gaining an advantage, although Stojack inflicted plenty of punishment on Taylor with his turnover short-arm scissors and Taylor made Stojack equally uncomfortable with his head scissors and toe holds.

In the second round Stojack got his sensational flying headlock to functioning, and the process was good, for the opening was good, for the match actually tumbled, but the climax in the third session, which paradoxically, produced no falls.

It was in the third round that Stojack whipped out of a painful leg split to trap Taylor in an Indian deathlock and then proceeded to demonstrate how to keep an Indian deathlock once you've got it and also to make it hurt worse.

Taylor finally moaned and writhing had drawn tears of sympathy even from the last row balcony.

It was also in the third round that Taylor and Stojack became so agonizingly entangled in each other's legs that both had to give up, and it was at the end of the up, that Stojack launched his round series of flying headlocks, only to have the process cut short by the bell.

Seals, Solons Fear Threat Of Booming San Diego Club

Sacramento and the San Francisco Seals, one-two in the Pacific Coast league baseball standings, eyed the booming San Diego Padres with trepidation Tuesday.

San Diego was the only team in the first four to fatten its percentage last week and did it more ways than one. Six games behind the first place Solons a week ago, the Padres in third place were only five behind Tuesday after taking six out of seven from the Portland Beavers.

The Padres went from fourth place to a three-way tie for team batting honors. Rupert Thompson, one of their most consistent batsmen, replaced Art Garibaldi, Sacramento's slogging Italian, as the league's best individual hitter. Other teams tied with the Padres in hitting were Los Angeles and San Francisco. Each had an average of .290.

San Diego has not lost a series on its home diamond this season

and entertains the Los Angeles aggregation this week as Sacramento invades Portland. An improved Oakland team goes to Seattle where it will try again to win its first series of the season.

San Francisco, its pitching staff much in need of rest and reinforcements, opens against the lowly but dangerous and hard hitting home town rivals, the Mission Reds Tuesday night.

Charley Graham, president of the Seals, admitted today he was frantically searching for pitchers. He said he would like to give Manager Lefty O'Doul a real ball club this year. He thought he had one, he asserted, but injuries and accidents cut into his plans. He would like to land a solid pitcher.

Graham said he was willing to pay well for Lou Koupal, big right hander with the St. Louis Americans, but the Browns replied they could not afford to part with Koupal now.

The margin of Smoke's victory over the Woodworkers Monday night resulted from three homers produced by Olsen, Duncan and Donaldson. Duncan behind the plate and Wheeler at first base performed for the winners.

On the Woodworkers' side of the ledger were a home run by Pitcher Horn, a triple and three singles by Granger, the trio accounting for seven of the Woodworkers' total of 10 hits.

The second game developed plenty of surprises and almost an upset. Southern Pacific, which has been unable to win a contest so far this year, held Klamath Billiards on even terms until the seventh inning, when a walk and two successive errors gave the Billiards the run they needed to win and another besides.

Jones of the Billiards connected for a homer and a single. Pitcher Murray led the Southern Pacific hitting brigade with two doubles and a single.

In the opening game Wednesday night Weyerhaeuser will face the most serious remaining threat to his undefeated standing, the booming Casey squad. Southern Pacific will have its last good chance to climb out of the cellar when it meets the Polin club in the second half of the double-header.

WIMBLEDON, Eng., June 29 (AP)—Alice Marble, United States title-holder, gained the semi-finals of the all-England tennis championships today, defeating the second seeded favorite, Miss Hilda Krahwinkel Sperling of Denmark and Germany, 7-5, 5-4, 6-3.

Miss Marble will meet Jadwiga Jedzejowska of Poland in Thursday's semi-finals.

All even after two sets, Miss Sperling captured the first three games of the final set and appeared on her way to victory. But Miss Marble, seeded fifth, broke up Miss Sperling's monstrous pace with tricky dropshots and won the next six games for set and match.

The final game was a tense battle with Miss Marble finally winning when a stinging backhand drive by the German star went sailing over the base line.

U. S. GOLFERS LEAD FOR CUP

American Pros Outscore Britons, 21-14, As Tourney Opens.

SOUTHPORT, Eng., June 29 (AP)—Led by the teams of Ed Dudley and Byron Nelson and Ralph Guldahl and Tony Manero, the United States today gained a 2 1/2 to 1 1/2 lead over Great Britain's team of professional golfers in the Scotch foursomes division of the biennial Ryder cup play.

The Dudley-Nelson and Guldahl-Manero combines won their matches, while Gene Sarazen and Denny Shute finished theirs all even for half a point and Henry Picard and Johnny Revolta lost to Percy Alliss and Richard Burton, 2 and 1.

Their showing in the foursomes, considered a British "specialty," strengthened the Americans' hopes of retaining the international trophy tomorrow when eight singles matches will be played, and at the same time scoring their first victory on a British course.

To date, the series stands 3 to 2 in favor of the United States, each side having won on its own grounds.

The day's greatest surprise was the showing made by the veteran Dudley and Nelson, his young ex-Texas partner. In advance of the matches, they had been regarded as sacrificial lambs being offered to be slaughtered by Britain's reputedly strongest duo, Henry Cotton and Alf Padgham, the latter holder of the British open championship.

But Dudley and Nelson never fitted into that role. One down at the end of nine holes, which they toured in a sweeping gale that chilled the gallery of 4,000 they rallied to finish the morning eighteen all even.

They jumped into the driver's seat at the start of the afternoon's play by winning four of the first five holes from their highly-touted rivals and never again were headed. To cap the climax, they finished off Cotton and Padgham with a birdie on No. 16, 34th hole of the match and considered the most dangerous on the course.

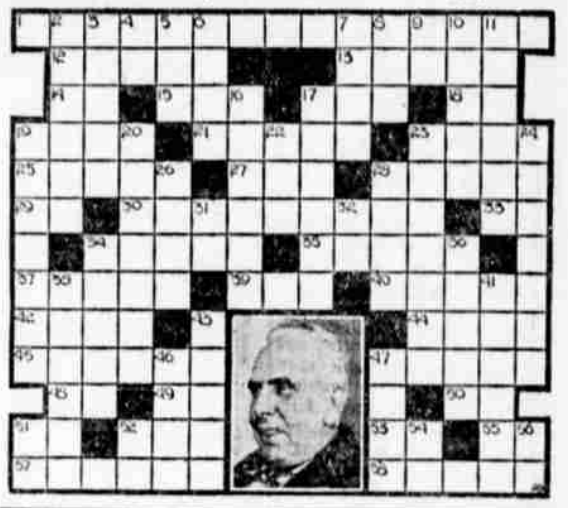
