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A Big Morning

IT'S our opinion that the weekend's celebration will receive a bang-up start in the air circus to be staged by the pilots coming here Saturday morning with the Oregon air tour.

This will be the major aviation event on the Pacific coast this year, with the 60 planes traveling to ten Oregon cities. From the standpoint of thrills, size and attendance, the air circus will unquestionably be the biggest aviation event in the history of Klamath Falls.

It's 100 to 1 that Klamath residents, and celebration visitors, will turn out in huge numbers to see this show, which presents an interesting contrast to the old-fashioned wild west doings to prevail in the fairgrounds arena on the succeeding afternoons. Persons interested have suggested that in this column attendance at the air show be urged—we're glad to do it, but we don't believe it necessary. Klamath people are as air-minded as any, and they aren't going to miss the opportunities afforded by the weekend event.

We have been assured that there will be none of the confusion and delay that so often marks small-time air circuses. This is going to be a big-time affair; it will be well organized, with experienced men in charge, and the spectators will be given full information about everything that is going on.

Paul Sharp has been bringing us a lot of facts and figures about the air show, and most of these have been carried in the news columns, along with pictures. Those who have read these stories will agree, we are sure, that it looks like a big morning Saturday at the airport.

Public Dislikes Violence

WARRING factions in the steel strike situation in Ohio and Pennsylvania would do well to look to the danger of unfavorable public reaction to violence. The quickest way to lose public sympathy is to turn from peaceful argument to hoodlumism.

It is noteworthy that labor leaders are at this time issuing public assurances that they do not condone violence. Philip Murray of the CIO was so quoted by the United Press in this morning's dispatches. It is evident that Mr. Murray is feeling the effects of public sentiment.

Tower Views, the Christian Science Monitor column, draws some interesting conclusions from history:

When C.I.O. workers, or any other labor organizations, abuse the right to strike by introducing violence, they are pursuing a defeatist's course, if past events are a criterion. The cause of unionism was greatly injured by the Herring massacre of 1922 and the Homestead massacre of 1892, even though in each case unionists and non-unionists suffered. Similarly, the confession of the McNamara brothers in 1911 to dynamiting a Los Angeles newspaper plant reacted unfavorably on the union movement. Likewise, the cause of labor suffered from the acts of uncontrolled agitators when seven policemen were bombed at Haymarket Square in Chicago while breaking up a pro-labor meeting, and anti-radical sentiment gained a great impetus when in 1920 a bomb was touched off opposite the Morgan offices in Wall street.

Use of violence is a confession of weakness on the part of whichever side, in a controversy, uses it first. Those who cannot accomplish an end by peaceful means do not deserve to succeed to it.

Behind the Scenes in Washington

WASHINGTON, June 30—President Roosevelt, who has been experimenting all over the place for the last four years, now thinks he has the makings of a magic formula which will perform the following wonders:

- 1—Give a decent standard of living to 40,000,000 persons for the first time.
- 2—Keep prosperity returning by a steady increase in the national income.
- 3—Pile up millions of votes for the new deal and its candidates in 1938 and 1940.
- 4—Eliminate the relief problem, balance the budget and start paying off the national debt.
- 5—Avert serious depressions in the future.

Will the formula really do any or all of these things? Possibly not. But it certainly would make all millionaires and most other wealthy persons scream with pain. Early in the new deal Mr. Roosevelt had the idea he could make everybody happy. Now he thinks he can make everybody happy except the rich. His present program is a share-the-wealth program. But the rich will be told that it means more profits than ever—right up to the moment the tax collector comes.

It's all based on the velocity theory of money which was a feature of the Townsend plan. You put the money in the hands of those who will spend it fastest, meaning those who are shy on the necessities of life. Then the shopkeeper or landlord spends it and, eventually, it gets into the hands of Mr. J. P. Morgan or somebody who pays a big fat slice to the government, which puts it right back into circulation again, preferably through those who will spend it fastest.

Higher wages, shorter hours, lower prices, maximum production, bigger volume of profits—all this to build up the bigger national income which, Roosevelt said at his press conference the other day, would make it possible to balance the budget.

It has come to be a well-accepted new deal theory that the government must redistribute income so that high incomes will not drain off an undue share of buying power into overinvestment for a consuming market which does not exist.

You go and ask the economists how they know it will work and they say that's a tough one on you, because the purchasing power theory has had its test and has worked and is working better all the time. Not all economists agree on that, by any means. But the local members of the craft do and they've persuaded Roosevelt.

National income has gone up steadily as a result of more production and that, Mr. Roosevelt and the other new dealers are glad to be able to believe, has been due to higher wages, more money for the lower income group—relief and so on, social security payments and relative absence of profiteering.

At any rate, national income is estimated at \$9 billion dollars in 1929, \$38 billions in 1932, \$38 billions in 1936 and 70 billions in 1937. (The figures are really better than they look if you remember that the wholesale price level was 95 in 1929 and is only about 87 now. But

they're much worse than they look if you take into account the population growth since 1929 and figure it out per capita.)

Specific examples given of the way things have been pepped up are in the big boost the increase in farm purchasing power gave the automobile industry and in the high production schedules of the cotton textile industry whose big market is among the lower income groups.

So what? Well, the administration idea is that you must have more of the same. You get a wage and hour bill which spreads employment to millions and increases the wages of millions, you try to break up monopoly price-fixing, you maintain WPA, you lash out at the wealthy men who the treasury think are evading taxes, you try to work out a selective tax scheme which will go after "excess profits," you boost the inter-convertible dividend tax again because you think holding companies are non-productive devices for draining off wealth, you wonder how soon you ought to hike up income taxes again and then you see what else you can think of.

The beauty or the hell of the program—according to the point of view—is that, unlike the Huey Long or Townsend schemes, you're likely to see how it works out.
