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CHAMBER BACKS  
DAIRY ROAD PLEA

Chamber of commerce directors Wednesday noon joined with 133 residents of the Dairy section in urging the state highway commission to complete the short section of road on the east end of the Dairy over-crossing and approach project.

When the highway commission built the over-crossing last year, it finished the approach on the west end. But that on the east end was left about half done. This short piece of road will eliminate a bad turn.

Chairman T. B. Watters of the roads and highways committee showed the petition bearing 133 names obtained in the Dairy section. The chamber endorsed the petition.

R. R. Macartney was named a member of the board of directors, succeeding W. E. Lamm, who resigned.

William Crockett of the Southern Pacific appeared at the chamber meeting to explain the S. P.'s plan to acquire the Merrill-Malin truck line owned by T. W. Laird. A hearing on a certificate of convenience and necessity in connection with the transaction is to be held at Sacramento July 3 by the Interstate commerce commission. Chamber directors said that if chambers at Merrill and Malin take action in favor of the proposal, they would take a similar stand.

The chamber has been informed that Engineer Chandler of state highway department will come here to investigate the proposal to permit log hauling in Klamath county on Saturday afternoons, now prohibited.

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RUSSIAN BOAT  
SUNK BY JAPS

After the conference Shigemitsu told the United Press that Soviet forces had expelled all Manchukuoans from the disputed islands. He said he had been instructed to settle the matter by diplomatic methods and "we hope that these methods bear fruit."

He said that although Russia had used force to meet similar situations, "we do not like to deal that way."

**HSINKING**, Manchoukoo, June 30 (P)—Japanese-Manchoukooan artillery along the disputed Amur river border was reported in Japanese army and news agency advices today to have sunk one "invading" soviet Russian gunboat, badly damaged another and forced a third to flee.

Thus, the long troubled far east frontier relations between Russia and the Japanese-sponsored state of Manchoukoo reached a dramatic and dangerous climax. The Japanese said the soviet vessels "invaded" a Manchoukooan channel south of Sennufu (Kanchatu) island in the river, firing on Japanese-Manchoukooan forces guarding the shore. The latter's guns returned the fire.

Later advices said the soviet Amur fleet of more than a dozen gunboats and many hydroplanes was being concentrated.

The gravest view was taken of the situation. Powerful Japanese-Manchoukooan reinforcements were being rushed to the river to prepare for eventualities.

The Manchoukoo government immediately filed a vigorous protest to Moscow against the alleged invasion.

The river runs along the northeastern Manchoukoo-Siberian border.
