

STEEL STRIKE DEADLOCK CUT ON ONE FRONT

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non-strikers entering mills of Republic Steel corporation in a back-to-work movement today.

Operations in three of Republic's Canton mills were resumed successfully, under protection of the Ohio national guard, after an early morning flare-up.

Evacuation of 2000 men, interned in the plant since the strike was called May 25, was under way in groups of 800, as non-strikers moved in to take their places.

Telephone Wires Ripped

Dynamite smashed a water main, quickly repaired; telephone wires were ripped from poles, and jeering pickets herded back by heavily armed guardsmen, aided by two low flying airplanes, as the back-to-work movement was started.

Sixty pickets were arrested and held on technical charges.

The most seriously injured non-striker was Louis Govei, who may have a concussion of the brain.

Others hurt by rocks, thrown at automobiles carrying the men into the plants, were: Harold Langkamp, Joseph Sturm, John H. Cherdon and Robert Kilgore.

Hit With Rock

Kilgore, one of the main office workers at the Republic alloy plant, said a picket jumped on the running board of his automobile.

Rock in hand, said Kilgore, the picket jeered him, then hit him a blow on the head.

Aside from Govei, injuries of the others were not serious.

Comparative quiet prevailed on other fronts of the steel strike, called by the SWOC against the Republic, Inland Steel, Bethlehem Steel corporation and the Youngstown Sheet and Tube Company over refusal of the concerns to sign labor contracts.

At Johnstown, Pa., James Mark, CIO leader, and C. W. Jones, vice president of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, were ordered out of the city by Mayor Daniel J. Shields, who told them their presence was "inimical to community peace."

Martial Law Asked

The two refused to leave and Mark appealed to Gov. George H. Earle for resumption of martial law.

The Youngstown steel mill district returned to the normal three-shift operating basis today with 32 out of 47 open hearth furnaces working and plant managers reporting operations back on pre-strike schedule.

The Youngstown Sheet and Tube company, employing 14,500 men normally, resumed the three-shift schedule this morning following the lead of Republic Steel corporation.

Plant managers claimed 90 per cent of their forces were back at work and operations supervisors were reported re-establishing the five-day, 40-hour week for mill hands.

DETECTIVE SENTENCED

DEFENSE RESTS IN MODOC CASE

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McCracken was accused of sending through the mails to annoy the French family. The letters were mentioned in the testimony of Mrs. Gertrude French, mother of the defendant.

Mrs. McCracken Called

Wylie attempted to bring out that letters written by McCracken and given to the French family were refused examination by postal authorities. Defense Attorney Luke Howe objected on the grounds that the testimony was not rebuttal since Mrs. French testified on cross examination in regard to the attitude of postal authorities toward the letters. He was sustained and Smith was dismissed.

Mrs. Frances McCracken, wife of the slain man, was called next. She admitted that her husband had written two letters to the French family and identified the signatures on them. But she said she did not know of any telephone calls the defense said he made to annoy the French family.

French is accused of slaying McCracken in a back-country newspaper feud. The defense maintains he was goaded into the slaying by slurring remarks and persecutions to which the French family was subjected at the hands of McCracken.

Under cross examination by Howe, Mrs. McCracken said she had asked her husband not to pay any attention to such petty squabbles as these that had developed with the French family.

The prosecution rested its case and court recessed until Thursday.

ALTURAS, CALIF., June 30 (AP)—The defense called to the witness stand today several relatives of Harvey French in an effort to show that Claude L. McCracken, newspaper editor, annoyed or threatened the French family.

Harry French is on trial for the slaying of McCracken, who operated a newspaper in opposition to the long-established weekly publication owned by Mr. and Mrs. Bard French, parents of the accused man.

Peeked Through Window

Ruth French, sister of the defendant, testified she discovered a man looking at her through the bathroom window of the French home one night. Miss French, a University of California student, said she ran out and told her mother about it, but didn't know the identity of the prowler.

The mother, Mrs. Gertrude French, yesterday testified she saw McCracken walk from the yard of the French home at the time.

Mrs. E. G. Scammon, Westwood, Calif., testified she was present when Mrs. Gertrude French received an annoying telephone call, presumably from McCracken. Mrs. Scammon said she saw Mrs. French turn pale, hang up the receiver and turn away nervously.

Heard Sound of Shots

Mrs. Mamie Wood, also of Westwood, told of being at the French home at the time when Mrs. French claimed McCracken fired several shots over her head. She said she heard what sounded like shots.

On cross-examination, however, Mrs. Wood conceded she could not tell whether the sounds were shots.

INGLEWOOD, Cal., June 30 (AP)—A man officials identified only as "Eddie the Sailor" became suspect No. 1 today in the search for the degenerate slayer of three little Inglewood girls.

"Eddie the Sailor," police learned, almost succeeded in luring into his automobile five girls Saturday when he put to death Madeline Everett, 7, her sister Melba, 9, and Jeanette Marjorie Stephens, 8.

Remembered Warning

Lillian Pop, 11, told officers that she and her cousin almost joined the three victims in what "Eddie the Sailor" represented was going to be a rabbit hunt in the hills.

"When he reached the car, I kicked my cousin and reminded her, in whispers, what her mother had told her about going riding with a strange man," Lillian said.

"So we didn't go, but Melba and Jeanette and Madeline got into the car with the man and they drove down Park street."

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health board. Sufferers first will be offered treatment and if they refuse they will either be isolated privately or put in institutions by compulsion.

Because many doctors are not equipped medically to fight the disease, a post graduate course will be added to the curricula of the University of Oregon medical school to give physicians special education in treating the disease.

The public will be educated to the fact that quick cures are extremely dangerous; that over-treatment is as injurious as no treatment, and that no drug store remedies can cure the infection. Doctors will be asked to submit cases to physicians specializing in syphilis. Dr. Stricker saying only medical men educated to it can recognize the "hidden danger," one of the greatest causes of the disease's spread.

Efforts also will be made to marshal public opinion behind a legislative act to be voted upon at the 1938 elections and which would require parties to a marriage contract to submit to blood tests before issuance of a license as a check against an unwitting spread of dangerous diseases.
