

# Californian Takes British Net Championship

## BUDGE WINS IN STRAIGHT SETS

Germany's Leading Star  
Blasted From Courts  
in Final Round.

WIMBLEDON, Eng., July 2 (AP)—Don Budge, lanky red-head from Oakland, Cal., today won the all-England singles tennis championship, blasting Germany's Baron Gottfried Von Cramm off the courts in straight sets, 6-3, 6-4, 6-2.

The American Davis Cup star's decisive triumph climaxed a brilliant performance by Budge throughout the famed Wimbledon tournament. En route to the title relinquished by Fred Perry, now a professional, Budge dropped only one set and that to his Davis Cup teammate, Frankie Parker of Milwaukee.

For Von Cramm it was his second successive trouncing in Wimbledon's final. He lost to Perry last year, 6-1, 6-1, 6-0.

Budge required only an hour and five minutes to annex the title. Immediately after the match both went to the royal box to be introduced to Queen Mary.

Both Budge and Von Cramm shook hands with the smiling Queen Mother who, wearing dark glasses, had watched the last two sets with the greatest interest.

Budge bowed slightly and beamed all over his face as he backed out of the box after receiving Queen Mary's congratulations.

Asked what the Queen Mother said to him, Budge replied: "I don't think it's proper to tell that. Just say that she congratulated me."

"I was lucky to play probably the finest tennis of my life just when I wanted to," he added. "I couldn't believe it when I reached that match point."

"Von Cramm is a great player and a great gentleman."

"No, I am not going to turn professional."

Repeatedly this season the circuit's outstanding cellar contenders (the Missions are the best bat at present) have outlived their opponents only to have baserunners die on the bags and the opposition run off with the ball games.

Miraculously the Acorns have won two straight from the hard-hitting Seattle Indians. Thursday night they managed to get four runs out of 11 hits which included homers by Earl Holyard, who made his debut with the Oaks Thursday, and Ed Leishman. The score was 4 to 3. Wednesday night the Oaks made 17 hits, left 15 stranded on the bags and made a grand total of three runs, winning by one run.

Budge had only one erratic streak, in the middle of the second set when for three games—the fifth, sixth and seventh—his forehead went haywire. He won only three points all told in those three sets.

He quickly regained his devastating form, however, and thereafter there never was any doubt who had command. Von Cramm could carry games to deuce but Budge then calmly won them.

The new champion scored few placements until the final set but he was hitting the kind of shots that Von Cramm couldn't return. For the three sets Von Cramm made 66 errors including 28 nets and 37 outs as well as a single doublefault. Budge, in the meantime, made only 52 errors, including 34 nets, 25 outs and three doublefaults.

Yvonne Petra and Mme. Simone Mathieu of France reached the finals of mixed doubles by defeating Daniel Prens of Germany and Bevelyn Dearman of England, 6-2, 6-4. The winners will meet Budge and Alice Marble of San Francisco in the finals tomorrow. Budge and Miss Marble won their semi-final round match yesterday.

The Missions lost their third straight game to their home town rivals, the second place San Francisco Seals Thursday, 6 to 3, although they outlived the Seals 11 hits to 10. The Missions' defeat was the fourth in five of the season for Sad Sam Gibson, the San Francisco Seals' mellowing pitcher. Sad Sam is the league's topnotch hurler and has lost but one game. Dominic DiMaggio returned to the Seals lineup Thursday after a brief rest which showed results. He blasted a double and a single, scored one run himself and accounted for two others. Sacramento defeated the Portland Beavers, 5 to 2. Moose Clabaugh of the Beavers poked a homer in the seventh. An eighth inning homer by Los Angeles Catcher Rip Collins with Pitcher Ray Prim aboard defeated the San Diego Padres, 6 to 4.

The Gas House gangsters are still rough, tough and nasty, but they're learning fast and from experts that they'll need lots more than an ability to dial it out in order to string along in the current National League dog fight.

In their last two series, against the Giants and Cubs, they haven't even been lukewarm. As a result, Friday they were creaking along in a third place tie with the Pittsburgh Pirates, while the Cubs and Cardinals are racing 34 and three games, respectively, in front of them.

Tangling with these two troupes in their last six starts, the Cards have dropped five in a row—two to the Giants and three straight to the Cubs. And losing those two series meant as much to them as their pay checks, particularly at this time, when jockeying for fourth of July positions is going full blast.

The "big three" pitching troops of Dean, Red Weiland and Lon Warneke folded up like a collapse stretch. Although they've kept on hitting, their defense has been

as full of holes as a bag of doughnuts.

Thursday, Frankie Frisch sent Jim Winfield to the wars, and the Cubs pinned his ears back 6-3, after Frisch and Shortstop Lippy Leo Durocher were banned for rowing with the umpire, Ripper Collins' homer with two aboard was the payoff Wallop.

The Cubs had to win to stay out in front, for the Giants, as anxious as a mother hen in their drive to hit the top by the July 4 deadline, knocked over the Phillies 8-5 on Wally Berger's pinch-homer in the clutch, with two on base and two away in the ninth, to remain a half game off the pace.

Although they won a 2-7 burlesque from the Athletics, the Yankees were a sorry set. Twinkleton Selkirk, their slugging outfielder, fell in making a circus catch and suffered an injury to his right shoulder that will keep him on the shelf several days.

Josephine—Weather and water conditions now ideal in southern Oregon. A few salmon still being taken near Grants Pass. Summer steelhead should be rising to flies on the upper Rogue. Most of the mountain lakes now accessible.
