

HATCHERY ON DESCHUTES TO BE RE-BUILT

In an announcement this week, the Oregon state game commission revealed it had decided to re-build the Oak Springs hatchery on the Deschutes river to a capacity of 10,000,000 trout annually. Construction work will be started this year.

Rebuilding of the plant will cost \$20,000. The hatchery currently produces seven-inch-long fish in one year, and for this reason is considered one of the finest hatchery grounds in the United States.

Seven holding ponds are now in use at the station, and eight more will be added by the rebuilding. The largest of the new ponds will measure 172 feet by 50 feet. The other new ponds will measure 40 feet by 50 feet.

When the new ponds and other hatchery equipment are completed, Matt L. Ryckman, superintendent of fisheries at the unit, claims that the station will be capable of spawning more adult rainbow trout than half the natural egg-taking stations in the entire state.

The commission recently announced decision to rebuild the Klamath Falls hatchery, site of two successive fires. A hatchery building, a dwelling for the station superintendent and a general utility structure will be constructed at a cost of \$16,873.

Drilling of the Union hatchery well will be continued to a depth of 500 feet in an effort to produce a sufficient flow of water to accommodate hatchery needs. The well is now dug to a depth of 300 feet. The hatchery has been supplied by a flow from Catherine creek, but irrigation demands have cut the supply to a minimum.

DR. SMITH WILL OCCUPY PULPIT

A very happy and unexpected meeting took place in Newkirk, Pennsylvania, when at the reunion of the Lambie family, Dr. Tom Lambie, famous missionary and formerly confidential adviser to Haile Selassie of Ethiopia, while the latter was ruling in that country, appeared. It so happened that he was in Pittsburgh for two days to receive the degree of Doctor of Science at the Cathedral of Learning, the University of Pittsburgh, and was able to be present. It has been many years since Mrs. Smith had seen her cousin. In their youth they held a pastorate for the foreign field at the same missionary conference.

On the way home the Smiths passed through the "Bad Lands" and the Black Hills of South Dakota, saw the famous Rushmore national memorial, the carving in granite of Washington, Jefferson, Lincoln and Theodore Roosevelt, visited Yellowstone park and Glacier park, and were privileged to meet old-time friends in Spokane, where they held a pastorate for eight years. In Portland, they visited their daughter, Dorothy, now Mrs. Paul D. Groat, who with her husband and Alan Smith were involved in rather a serious auto wreck at the time they were leaving for the East.

"We passed through seventeen states, were within a stone's throw of two others, were not only on the long stretches of the West, but in congested areas of the East, covered nearly seven thousand miles," said the pastor, "and all without mishap of any kind or even an approach to danger. The Lord watched over us."

While in Chicago the Smiths visited with Miss Henrietta Wright, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. George L. Wright, and Ben Wilson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur R. Wilson.

One lad, after his second unsuccessful attempt, brushed himself off and said, "Gosh! If a little mule bucks that hard, what must those Brahmas steers do to you?"

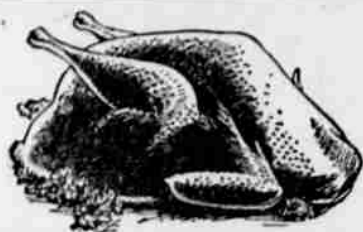
