## BONHAM JOINS HALL OF FAME

Acorn Moundsman Twirls No-Hitter; Portland Splits Games.

 Oakland's much improved Acorns could lose both ends of a double-header with the Seattle Indians Monday and still achieve their cherished ambition—with their first series of the current Pacific Coast baseball league season.

For 13 weeks the Oaks failed, but by splitting a twin bill with the Indians Sunday, they ran their total for the series to five games won and two lost. Seattle took the opener, 5 to 7, but Ernie Bonham entered baseball's hall of fame in the nightcap when he pitched seven innings of no-hit, no-run baseball to give the Acorns a 2 to 0 decision.

San Francisco split a pair with the Missions. They dropped the opener, 12 to 4, although they outthrew the Reds, 14 to 13, but came back to take another slugfest, 10 to 9. The Seals made 13 hits, the Missions 12. In the two games 10 pitchers paraded to the pitcher's box for the two teams.

Sacramento, playing in and out all week, still maintained a half game lead Monday after winning the first from Portland Sunday, 3 to 4. It dropped the second game 4 to 2. San Diego's record of not having lost a series on its home diamond this season, was still intact Monday. The Padres took both ends of a twin bill from Los Angeles Sunday, 2 to 1 and 12 to 1, to give them five out of seven games.

Home runs were plentiful in Sunday's games. Ernie Koy and Bill Baker clouted homers in their second game with Seattle to give the Oaks a 2 to 0 decision and Pitcher Donham his no-hit, no-run game.

In the first game Herman Michael and Fred Miller of the Tribe decided the tilt for the Tribe when each slapped one out of the ball park.  
 Johnny Frederick of the Beavers slashed a four-bagger, but it didn't do his team any good as it lost the first game to the Solons. Don Hurst hit a home run for the Angels and George Myatt clouted a circuit for San Diego in the second game.

## ARMORY DARK TO WRESTLING

Grapplers Enjoy Week's Vacation; New Faces Due July 13.

No wrestling matches at the Klamath armory Tuesday night. Mack Lillard, who presents the weekly programs, hopes that the general suspension in the regular schedule will keep all the fans away from the big auditorium, but he also knows that no amount of publicity on earth can do that.  
 Other times, when Mack and his wrestlers have called things off for a week or so in order to provide themselves with brief vacations, the promoter has tried every means available to advise the customers that the house would be darkened but he has never managed to do so with very satisfactory results.  
 There are always 400 or so of the faithful who will turn up at the armory on Tuesday nights, Mack says, regardless of whom is wrestling or whether anybody is wrestling or not. This group apparently just has the habit, as other people have the habit of awakening at 7:30 or 8 or some other particular time of day.  
 Frequent newspaper blasts, repeated radio announcements and the like will occasionally reach the ears of half the 400, but the other 200 are going to show up at the armory door Tuesday night in spite of hell and high water only to be informed by the janitor that the building is empty and no fight of any kind in immediate prospect. Mack is convinced of that.  
 The grappling program will resume on schedule the following Tuesday, July 13, and a number of new faces have been tentatively signed for the opening matches of the mid-summer season.  
 One of the prospective newcomers is Frank Clemens, the "Indian Wonder Boy" of Tulsa, Okla. Clemens exhibited his sensational style here a year or two ago, but he will class as entirely fresh talent so far as a majority of the fans are concerned.  
 Another scheduled arrival is Sammy Cohen of New York. The Jewish boy is billed as the most perfectly developed wrestler in the game.  
 Prince Mihailis, who is already familiar to nearly every inveterate armorygoer, is almost definitely certain to be on the program, as is the currently notorious Black Dragon.  
 The Dragon, incidentally, has indicated an intention of wrestling his next bout without his mask. He claims the head covering is a definite handicap and he would like to make a hoodless appearance against Pete Belcastro, for whom he promises "a real beating."

## Milwaukee Meet Indicates Many Records to Fall

MILWAUKEE, July 5 (AP)—Championship performances of the Amateur Athletic union's 56th track and field meet demonstrated today the probability of successful attack by a new array of stars on world and national records.  
 Jack Weterhauer of Stanford galloped the 200 meters, negotiating a curve in the bargain, in 20.9 seconds, just six-tenths of a second over the world record time which Jesse Owens, Ohio State, set on a straightaway.  
 Allan Tolmich of Wayne university, Detroit, gave the meet, which closed Saturday, its biggest upset by beating Georgia's world champion, Forrest Towns, in the high hurdles, and showed it was no accident by setting a new 200 meter low hurdles meet record of 23.3 seconds.  
 A new 500 meters world mark may be in the offing. If John Woodruff, the University of Pittsburgh's Olympic champion, continues his present form, the long striding negro was clocked in one minute, 50 seconds, and was so fresh at the finish he might have clipped off a fraction of a second if he had been pressed.  
 Veteran Joe McCluskey set a new 5000 meters mark of 15 minutes, 4.1 seconds, and four pole vaulters shared a new height of 14 feet, 7 1/2 inches.  
 Earle Meadows of Southern California, one of the quartet, believes the day when pole vaulters will clear 15 feet is not far off.  
 "Probably not a year more," Meadows said. "A fast runway, a soft landing pit, everything right, and someone will do 15 feet, or as high as 15 feet three inches."  
 Similar sentiments are echoed by Cornelius Johnson, the Compton, Cal., negro who shares the world high jump record of 6 feet, 9 1/2 inches. He believes seven feet is certain to be accomplished.

## California Stars Expected to Rule Oregon Net Event

PORTLAND, July 5 (AP)—Strong Southern California entries in the Oregon state tennis championships which open here tomorrow, indicate slim prospects of keeping the titles within the state, sports observers declared.  
 Only one defending Oregon champion will do battle in the 35th annual event—Ruth Roland in the women's single division. All other events were declared wide open.  
 Four local stars were expected to provide chief opposition to foreign players—Sam Lee, last year's runner-up; Henry Neer, Hawaiian champion; Don Lewis and Bob Lloyd.  
 Heading the California players in the men's division will be William Hope Doeg, ex-national junior champion and his brother Johnny Doeg; and Ed Amark, recent winner of the Del Monte invitational title.

## Smith, Boomer Gain Early Lead In British Open

CARNOSTIE, Scotland, July 5 (AP)—Blond Horton Smith, a demon with a putter when he's right, and tall, thin Aubrey Boomer, 40-year-old Englishman who has been a professional in France for a number of years, posted joint 59's over the championship Carnoustie course today to gain at least a temporary lead in the first qualifying round of the British open golf championship.  
 Their scores were two under par and lowered Hector Thompson's course record by one stroke.  
 Smith, out of last week's U. S. Ryder cup victory with a lame back, was definitely in putting form on the first nine, where he scored five birdies with putts ranging from nine to 24 feet. Boomer did his best work on the back nine, the 40-year-old veteran picking up two birdies on the homeward journey while playing the other holes in par.  
 Behind Boomer and Smith came three players with course record 70's scored over the shorter neighboring Borneide links, being used only for the qualifying rounds. One was Gene Sarazen, the veteran American who won the British title in 1932 and today lost two strokes on the back nine after going out in 32, three under par.  
 The others were young Ernest E. Whitcombe of Great Britain and Pat Mahon of Ireland.

## Record Interest Rising in Big League All-Star Game

NEW YORK, July 5 (AP)—Baseball's mid-summer extravaganza, the game between all-star teams of the National and American leagues, will be played Wednesday at Washington with interest over the team selections and outcome at a higher pitch than at any time since the game was inaugurated at Chicago in 1933.  
 President Roosevelt will throw out the first ball at 1:30 p. m. (EST).  
 While the size of the Senators' park at Washington precludes any forecast of a record crowd, the game is heralded by Secretary Ed Eymon of the Washington club, as a sellout. This means that 30,392 fans will pay \$26, 977 to see the contest. The gate, less the operating expenses, will be turned over to a fund for indigent players.  
 Last year at Boston the National League club halted the string of triumphs that had extended since the game was first played at Chicago. The two great hurlers, Dizzy Dean and Carl Hubbell, who turned back the junior circuit hitters last year, will be on hand again, plus the talented Van Lingle Mungo, Brooklyn's ex-

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ponent of the "high hard one," and the heaviest hitting infield and outfield the older league has yet been able to muster.  
 Managers Bill Terry of the Giants and Joe McCarthy of the Yankees have chosen the teams for this year's game, a departure from the original idea which assigned this duty to the fans. Fans have protested some of the selections violently, particularly in the National league, where Terry's choice of Arky Vaughan Pittsburgh shortstop, to play third base over the circuit's regular third sackers has given the solid citizens of Brooklyn and Philadelphia, home cities of Joe Stripp and Pinkle Whitney, plenty to shout about.  
 Vernon (Lefty) Gomez, who has been in every all-star game since last year's will probably start for the junior circuit. He has pitched a one-hitter and a five hit shutout his last two times. After he pitches his three innings, the maximum effort allowed each hurler in this game, McCarthy can call on the aging but wily Lefty Grove, Detroit's Tommy Bridges, Wes Ferrell of the Senators, Mel Harder of the Indians, and Monty Stratton of the White Sox.

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After being held to two hits by Van Mungo for six innings, the Giants teed off for four runs in the eighth and topped the Brooklyn Dodgers 6-5 to remain just off the pace.  
 The White Sox whipped the Browns twice, 4-2 and 9-5.  
 Dizzy Dean pitched a seven hitter and Lon Warneke a four, either as the Cards clubbed Cincinnati 1-0 and 5-2. The Bees boosted themselves into fifth place in the National league with a twin win over the Phillies, 14-9 and 4-2, the latter going 10 innings until Eddie Mayo's homer broke it up.
