

SPECIAL FARM PRODUCTS NOT GIVEN NOTICE

Government estimates of Oregon's cash income for the past 10 years, which averaged slightly less than \$100,000,000, have included the principal national farm commodities but not numerous specialty products grown in Oregon, the current report on the agricultural situation by the OGC agricultural extension service points out. Among these specialty products are numerous kinds of grass and forage crop seeds, vegetable and flower seeds, flax fiber, filberts, peppermint oil, turkeys, and miscellaneous poultry, fur-bearing animals, and others.

"This lack of data concerning the production and marketing of Oregon's specialty products has been a serious handicap and has caused the state to be shown as of much less importance agriculturally than the facts would warrant, as the trend of Oregon agriculture has been toward specialty products to a far greater degree than the available statistics indicate," says L. R. Breithaupt, author of the report.

The Oregon State legislature of 1937 took cognizance of the need for more agricultural data in a law providing for the cooperation of the agricultural extension service with the bureau of agricultural economics, and a survey is now in progress, Breithaupt says. The problem is so complicated, however, that the first annual figures are not expected to be available for some time.

The development of crop and livestock estimates as an official activity of the government dates from the year 1859 when Congress first appropriated money for the purpose. Full-time federal agricultural statisticians were assigned to the respective states in 1914. By 1933, approximately three-fourths of the states had begun to cooperate in order that the data might be more complete.

"It is particularly desirable that the official crop reports should show Oregon's production of specialty products," says the college circular, which points out their value in advertising and marketing farm products. The data have been found valuable or essential for the benefit of the agricultural industry in many other ways, including planning agricultural production to meet market demands, in setting up marketing organizations and programs, in connection with tariff legislation and reciprocal trade agreements, in transportation matters involving facilities and rates, and for such vast projects as the agricultural adjustment and soil conservation programs.

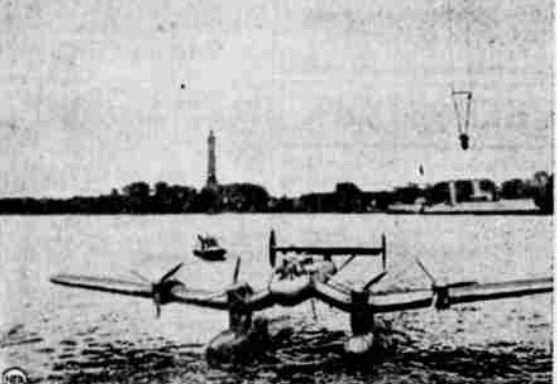

Several Attractive Wild Flowers Actually Noxious Weeds, County Agent Warns

Inasmuch as there is considerable interest at the present time in the transplanting of wild flowers and plants from the native state to rock gardens or flower beds, it is particularly important to know the difference between these plants and noxious weeds. Several of the serious noxious weeds of Klamath county are attractive looking perennial plants and flower abundantly, according to County Agent C. A. Henderson. One of the most noxious weeds in the county is hoary cress or white top. This plant is quite prevalent throughout certain portions of the irrigated project and considerable is found on the Southern Pacific right-of-way between Klamath Falls and Merrill. White top, or hoary cress, blooms early in the spring, the white flowers being very noticeable at that time. This plant should not be confused with other plants and should not be considered as a rock garden or home garden plant. It is listed as a noxious weed throughout Klamath county and land owners are required to destroy or suppress it in accordance with state laws. Other plants declared noxious in the county weed order are wild morning glory, Russian knapweed, leafy spurge and Canada thistle. It is illegal to transport or plant seeds or cuttings of any of these plants.

Members of garden clubs should make a study of these plants in order to see that none are transplanted in the gardens throughout the county," says the county agent, "as noxious weeds are a serious menace to irrigated agricultural lands and many thousands of dollars of public funds are required each year to hold these weeds in check. At the present time, federal, state and county governments are recognizing the seriousness of weed pests and are starting nation-wide programs for suppression and eradication."
