TEMPERANCE PLAY TO BE STAGED HERE

Three performances of the widely-heralded drama, "Prisoner at the Bar," will be presented in Klamath Falls churches during this week, with 63 prominent citizens taking part.

The "murder trial" tells the story of a returned soldier influenced by wet repeal propaganda and trapped by the modern liquor sales system. The plot is taken from court records.

Hayward H. Johnson of Portland will play the role of the prisoner, who, under the influence of liquor, has "killed" his wife and left three motherless children. He is then tried for murder.

Johnson will be supported in each performance by a cast of 21 people. The play is called "The Uncle Tom's Cabin of the Liquor Traffic."

Arrangements have been made for the drama to be presented Wednesday, July 7, at the Klamath temple at 8 o'clock, and Thursday night, July 8, at the First Methodist church at 8 o'clock. The final presentation of the drama will be on Sunday night, July 11, at the First Christian church at 8 o'clock.

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Railroad News

RAIL RETIREMENT PLANS INCLUSIVE

The most comprehensive plan in existence for any industry providing for the retirement of employees because of age or disability is embodied in the new railroad retirement act which has just become effective.

The plan was evolved as a result of joint negotiations between representatives of the 21 standard railroad labor unions and railway management at the suggestion of President Roosevelt, who early in January asked both sides to confer in an effort to work out a retirement plan for railroad employees that would be mutually satisfactory.

Approximately 1,500,000 employees of railroad, express companies, sleeping car companies and their subsidiaries, employees of railroad labor organizations and of railroad labor organizations come within the scope of the plan.

Establishment of a retirement system for railroad employees was brought about by the enactment of two laws. Under one act—the railroad retirement act which was approved on June 24—a retirement plan is set up and will be administered by the railroad retirement board which was established under the act of 1935 which this act supercedes. The second law to be enacted is the so-called railway tax act which was approved on June 25 and which provides for an excise tax on the payrolls of the carriers and an income tax on the salaries of employees.
