BAIL POSTED ON TRAFFIC CHARGE

POSTAL RECEIPTS RECORD BIG GAIN

Postal receipts for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1937, totaled \$119,694, a gain of \$15,006.33, or 12.542 per cent over the fiscal year ending June 30, 1936.

This is the greatest gain since 1926, according to Postmaster Burt Hawkins, when the increase was 25.12 per cent over the preceding year. Receipts of this year, however, are virtually double those of 1926, which were \$57,413.55.

Receipts for the June quarter at the Klamath Falls postoffice were \$28,393.15, or a gain of 17.147 percent over the June quarter of 1936.

Total receipts for the month of June alone totaled \$9,149, or a gain of 19.381 per cent over the month of June, 1936.

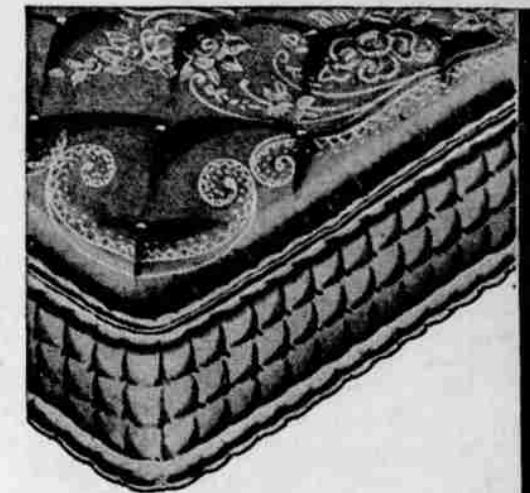
