FIRE DEPARTMENT ANSWERS 10 CALLS

Ten alarms were answered by the Klamath Falls fire department during June, according to the monthly report of Fire Chief Keith K. Ambrose. Of this number, two alarms were false and one was outside the city limits.

Men and equipment in the department were in actual service two hours and 47 minutes during the month.

Sound value of property at risk in the blazes was set at \$24,032.65, and insurance carried amounted to \$26,100.

Total loss by fire during the month was set at \$1,316.71, all of which was covered by insurance.

Causes of five of the month's fires were attributed to electric wiring, one to explosion, and two to hot grease or oil lighting.

THREE HURT IN AUTO ACCIDENT

Three persons were injured in an accident July 4 between Olene and Lakeview junction, according to a report on file with the sheriff. The little girl has been a patient at Hillside hospital since her accident, which occurred when she tried to put a piece of wood in the stove at her home at Malin and her overalls caught fire. Her mother was in the yard when the accident occurred and rushed into the house when the child screamed.

The heroic youngster had already extinguished the blaze, however, by beating out the flames with her hands.

ARRESTS TOTAL 335 DURING JUNE
