Third place San Diego was only a game and a half behind the Pacific Coast league leading Sacramento Solons Friday after beating the San Francisco Missions 7 to 2, as Sacramento bowed to Seattle, 3 to 1, and Los Angeles trimmed San Francisco, 5 to 2.

Los Angeles defeated the Seals with a makeshift infield Thursday night when their hard playing shortstop, Bobby Mattick, mysteriously disappeared before the game. Mattick's roommate, Catcher Rip Collins, said he believed Mattick was headed for his home in St. Louis and blamed an "unfavorable" love affair for his disappearance.

The Portland Beavers snapped the Oakland A's winning streak Thursday night, blanking them 4 to 0 in a well-played game. Bill Ponder limited the Oaks to six hits and fanned six. Floyd Olds, Oaks' hurler, was nipped for 10 hits.

Sensational fielding by the Coscarart brothers, Pete and Steve, played an important part in keeping the Oaks scoreless. Pete made two sensational fielding plays in the fourth, and Steve made a spectacular catch of a hefty clout by Catcher Bill Baker which had two bases written all over it.

More than 10,000 persons witnessed Seattle's largest wedding Thursday night when Outfielder Art Hunt of the Tribe was married to Charlotte Axelson of Mount Vernon, Wash., former Washington State college co-ed.

They were married on a special altar erected halfway between home plate and the pitcher's box.

Governor Clarence D. Martin of Washington escorted the bride to the altar while Hunt was accompanied by Pitcher Clarence Pickrel, his best man.

The Rev. Mark A. Matthews performed the ceremony. A new automobile was presented to the newlyweds as a gift from the Oakland and Seattle ball clubs.

After the ceremony Hunt took the field and Pickrel went into the pitcher's box. Seattle won, but didn't get much help from Hunt. In four times at bat he failed to get a hit—but then he didn't make any errors either.

Klamath Mat Fans Eager to Glimpse Clemens 'Paralyzer'

The guys who are in a position to hear it reported Friday that there is a lot of talk going the rounds regarding the return to the local wrestling wars of Frank Clemens, the Oklahoma "wonder boy."

The talk—so the report goes—centers principally on Clemens' "Indian paralyzer" with which the Oklahoma annihilated opponents and amazed the grasping patrons on the occasion of his last visit here three or four years ago.

As described by the veteran ringworms, the "paralyzer" starts out with an arm stretch, from which Clemens suddenly switches around so as to grasp his rival's head between his feet. Then in some mysterious manner the Indian applies pressure, to the cords in his opponent's neck, with disastrously stunning effect.

No other grappler has ever exhibited the maneuver in Klamath Falls, and Promoter Mack Lillard, who makes a business of observing wrestlers in all parts of the country, claims he has never seen the hold employed by any other man anywhere.

The fans who flock to the armory next Tuesday night for the opening of moan and mangle's summer season will probably hope that the "paralyzer" will be in peak working condition on that evening, for Clemens is scheduled to meet Jack LaRue, billed as an ornery critter, in the semi-windup.

Nothing, of course, is so delightful as to see a knavish rascal humbled, and, judging from the word of the oldest fans, nothing produces utter humility so rapidly as the patented Clemens "paralyzer."

Armstrong Stops Australian Boxer In Prompt Order

NEW YORK, July 9 (AP)—New York got another look at Henry Armstrong last night and Henry gave New York something to look at.

The little brown man from the Pacific coast stopped Alf Blatch, an Australian lightweight, in three rounds in Madison Square Garden.

Little Henry won at 1:21 of the third round when Blatch hit the canvas under the impact of a short right and Referee Billy Cavanaugh stopped the bout.

Blatch was on the floor twice in the first round and three times in the second.

The victory gives the coast negro added prestige in metropolitan ring circles. In two previous bouts here he knocked out Mike Helleise and cut up Aldo Spoldi. His entrance into the big time further complicates the lightweight class already booming with a Pedro Montanez-Lou Ambers bout in the offing.

Oregon Prepares to Entertain U.S. Amateur Golfers

PORTLAND, July 9 (AP)—Portland became thoroughly aware of its approaching position as the American golf capital today with the arrival of entry blanks for the United States amateur golf tournament at Alderwood August 23 to 28.

Officials immediately distributed the blanks to all golf clubs in the district. They must be back in the hands of the association officials by midnight July 14.

One northwest qualifying round will be held at Fircrest, Tacoma, on July 21 and the other at the Portland Golf club on July 27.

The number to qualify from the northwest will depend upon the number of entry blanks filed with the association.

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FISH OUTLOOK BEST OF YEAR

Angling Conditions This Weekend Nearly Perfect, Report.

PORTLAND, July 9 (AP)—The game commission brought grins to the faces of Oregon anglers by predicting nearly perfect fishing conditions for the coming weekend in its bulletin this week.

The phrase: "All streams in the county are clear and not high and a number of limit catches have been made," was common to reports from nearly all sections.

Tidewater streams have yielded salmon, and trout fishing was held all that the ardent fly fisherman could ask.

Reports by counties included: Marion—Fishing has improved during the past week. Roads to a number of lakes in the eastern portion are now open. Lower, Oallie and Monon lakes may be reached by way of the Wapinitia highway to Bear Springs and south by the forest road. Snowdrifts between Monon and Brettenbush are one to 10 feet deep. Horsehoes and Brettenbush lakes may be reached by hiking over the snow.

Polk—The Big Lucklamute and Ritzer creek have been yielding fair to good catches.

Benton—Fishing good in Alsea river and tributaries. Five rivers and Lobster creek. Some salmon in tidewater of Alsea. Good catches of sunfish, bass, perch and crappies from Black, McBea and Wagner lakes.

Wasco—The Deschutes river near Maupin should be in good condition. Trout take flies fairly well.

Crook and Jefferson—Bait fishing most popular with worms and salmon eggs used the most.

Deschutes—Limit catches are being made on yellow caddis in Deschutes river below Sheep bridge and on black gnat at Mud lake. Big Cutthroat, south Twin and East lakes productive with trolling, while trolling and bait best at Paulina lake. Most of the roads now open.

Union—All streams in good condition, but water still too high for flies in Little Minner river, where bait and spinners successful. Lake fishing good, and all roads in good condition.

Josephine—Fishing greatly improved along most sections of the Rogue, with north, south and middle forks in perfect condition for fly fishing. A wild stretch of water between the Copco power plant and Peyton bridge, which is seldom fished, affords some of the best fly fishing in southern Oregon. Below Applegate, water too badly discolored from milling for good fishing. A few salmon are being caught near Grants Pass.

PORTLAND, July 9 (AP)—The state game commission will fix hunting seasons and bag limits for Oregon at its next meeting here July 16 and 17, Frank B. Wire, game supervisor said.

Recommendations of sportsmen's clubs and individuals will be received until July 15, with hearings July 17.

PORTLAND, July 9 (AP)—Elimination of Roland Edwards of San Jose, seeded first in the men's junior division, had provided the major upset in the Oregon state tennis championship play which resumed today on the Irvington courts.

Emory Neale of Portland, who only this year graduated from the boy's division, provided dope-spilling, defeating the flashy Californian in straight sets, 6-4, 6-4.

Seeded players in other divisions continued in the running as play entered its fourth day.

Edwards progressed in the men's division yesterday, defeating Doug Lefebvre of Seattle, 6-1, 6-2. Lefebvre was eliminated from the junior division, where he was seeded second, by Harold Downie Wednesday.

Three Portlanders placed in the quarter finals of the men's singles. Sam Lee defeating Harold Wagner, San Francisco, 6-4, 6-2; Don Lewis winning from Fred Fisher, Portland, 6-1, 6-4, and Henry Neer eliminating Jack Gurely, Sacramento, 3-6.

Webfoot-Beaver Clash May Move Back to Portland

PORTLAND, July 9 (AP)—A proposal to transfer the annual "big game" between the University of Oregon and Oregon State college football teams this fall from Eugene to Portland will be discussed at a meeting of representatives of the two schools and the Multnomah club here Saturday.

L. H. Gregory, sports editor of the Oregonian, said in his column today.

The suggestion originated with the state college and evoked expressions of dissatisfaction from Eugene, where the game was scheduled for October 23, Gregory said.

Poor attendance and gate receipts during the past few years at Corvallis and Eugene was claimed by advocates of the change.

The conference Saturday was said to have been called by Dr. Frederick M. Hunter, chancellor of higher education.

COTTON WINS BRITISH OPEN

Noted English Pro Golfer Repeats Victory of Two Years Ago.

CARNOUSTIE, Scotland, July 9 (AP)—Tall Henry Cotton, famed British professional, won the British open golf championship today for the second time in three years, posting 290 for the 72-hole tournament after a heavy rainstorm threatened for a time to force replay of the final round.

Cotton, holder of the title in 1934 and acknowledged king of the tournament committee of the royal and ancient club of St. Andrews made it official.

After lengthy conference, the officials decided that the fourth and final round would stand as played.

This decision gave Cotton, who scored a brilliant par 71 in his last round at the height of the storm, the championship by a margin of two strokes over Reginald Whitcombe, youngest of the three famed British golfing brothers.

Leading the American contingent, by virtue of a spectacular finish, was Charley Lacey of Great Neck, Lacey put together rounds of 70-82 over rain-soaked Carnoustie today for a 72-hole total of 293.
