

Haying Moves at Top Speed

FIRST CROP OF ALFALFA HIGH GRADE

Haying is in full swing in all portions of the Klamath basin, with the first cutting of alfalfa reported to be of unusually high quality and free from weeds.

Scattered cuttings of hay including dry land rye and mountain meadow hay as well as some grass and hay cutting on irrigated lands will continue throughout the summer.

The major part of the haying season will occur, however, late in the summer, when the full crops of grass and grain hay on irrigated lands will be cut.

Hay acreage is about the same as last year, according to County Agent C. A. Henderson, and a fine crop is predicted.

Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, July 9 (AP)—Profit sellers sniped at the stock market today but failed to damage the list to any great extent.

Farm implements and specialties succeeded in surmounting offerings for gains of fractions to 2 or more points. Losses among some recent issues were generally limited to fractions.

Business news, on the whole, was seen as constructive.

A technical set-back had been looked for in view of the fact the averages had advanced for seven consecutive sessions. That declines were relatively modest was encouraging to buyers.

Prices were well fixed at the close. The trading pace slowed after a fairly lively start. Transfers were around \$50,000 shares.

Official returns on last week's freight loadings revealed a jump to a total of more than \$50,000 cars, a top for the year, but carrier issues were backward.

JUNE RAINS CAUSE NO SERIOUS HARM

PORTLAND, July 9 (AP)—Oregon agriculture looked back today on the record-breaking June rains and found the results not so serious as many farmers had feared.

Warmer weather brought corn along rapidly in the past week. The weather report of the U. S. department of agriculture said, while all small grains showed favorable results from the wet weather.

The cherry loss will be less than expected, although the crop will be light and the pear blight is less noticeable, while apples and prunes are sitting well.

Losses in the hay crop will be made up by later cuttings and pastures are in excellent condition with livestock progressing satisfactorily.

Lane county, Eugene: Corn doing fine. Pastures excellent. Cherries being picked. Good crop of filberts expected.

Douglas county, Roseburg: Second cutting of alfalfa begun. Jackson county, Medford: Dry, warm weather aiding blight control. Harvest of winter grain will be difficult, because of lodging. Peaches and apricots doing well; good crop of cherries being picked.

Klamath county, Klamath Falls: Crops made excellent growth.

Lake county, Lakeview: Wild hay will be short, due backward spring. Ranges improved.

Malheur county, Adrian: Corn doing well; second crop of alfalfa starting well.

WHEAT SHORT ON RALLYING POWER

CHICAGO, July 9 (AP)—Facing uncertainties relative to United States and Canadian government crop reports after the close, wheat prices failed to develop much rallying power late today.

Rains in Canada and continued big record-breaking receipts of new domestic wheat acted as a weight on values. In some cases, the day's lowest prices on wheat were touched just before trading ended.

At the close, wheat was 11-24c under yesterday's finish, July \$1.22 1/2, Sept. \$1.23 1/2-1.23 3/4, corn 1 1/2c off to 1 1/2c up, July \$1.28 1/2-1.28 3/4, Sept. \$1.14 1/2 to \$1.14 3/4, and oats 4-6c down.

BUSINESS LEAPS IN PINE DISTRICT

PORTLAND, July 9 (AP)—Reports from 38 mills showed last week's new business of \$1,523,000 board feet of lumber was 12 per cent above the previous week's mark, the Western Pine association said today.

Production totaled 73,500,000 feet, a decline of five million feet from last week, and shipments reached 59,302,000, virtually the same. Orders, production and the corresponding week totals for the shipments exceeded in 1936.

To date, orders were reported 14 per cent above last year.

COUNCIL MAY LEVY TOLL ON PARKED CARS

Possible installation of parking meters on Main street and other business streets where traffic is heavy is being considered by Klamath Falls officials.

The suggestion was made at a recent meeting of the city council, and various members are making a study of the feasibility of such action.

Parking meters are ingenious little machines placed at intervals, in which one inserts a coin to pay for parking space with certain time limits.

It is believed if they were installed in Klamath Falls that overtime parking might be eliminated in the busiest streets and available parking spaces used by those with urgent business to be transacted in a limited period of time.

A report on investigation of possible installation of the machines will probably be made at a meeting of the council in the near future.

FIR PRODUCTION SHOWS DECLINE

SEATTLE, July 9 (AP)—Lumber production at 175 mills and operating mills in Washington and Oregon dropped more than 20,000,000 board feet last week to 108,107,462, lowest in several months, the West Coast Lumber men's association reported today.

The association said slowing of production was usual at this time of the year.

Shipments rose from 131,590,541 feet to 128,084,825 and new business showed a slight increase of 800,983 to 104,970,387 board feet.

The unfilled order file dropped from 572,660,127 to 533,106,495.
