

Coast League Team Scheduled to Play Here

SEALS COMING AUGUST NINTH

San Francisco Club Will
Meet All-Star Squad
in Exhibition

The Seals are coming. The Seals of the Pacific Coast League, and they're coming to Modoc field Monday, August 9, if the best laid plans of Hal Haight, Bowlers' Garden manager, don't get away.

A select squad of all-stars drafted from the fertile baseball meadows of southern Oregon and northern California will furnish the opposition. Haight hasn't named any names yet, but he has his eye on players from the Klamath Falls Red Sox and Weed Sons of Italy in the Northern California league, and from Ashland and Medford in the Southern Oregon loop, with a scattering of talent from the Inter-Wonderland circuit.

Haight gave assurances Saturday that the game was a certainty and that arrangements with the San Francisco ownership had been completed. The Seals leave the bay region Sunday night, August 8, for a series with the Portland and Seattle clubs, and will stop over here Monday en route north. Time of the game has been tentatively set for 5 o'clock Monday afternoon. Play at that hour, Haight says, will make it possible for nearly every fan to attend and yet will not conflict with the regular softball schedule and will permit the Seals to catch the night train for Portland.

Haight says he stipulated—and Charley Graham of the San Francisco club agreed—that Manager Lefty O'Doul, Dominic DiMaggio, youngest of the famed DiMaggio club, and Walter Math, publicity director, and Seals' farmhand, should appear for the exhibition game here.

The contest is expected to provide scouts an opportunity to look over the prime baseball talent in this district. Clyde Carlstrom and Roy Wheeler of the Red Sox and Chief McLean and Bob Hardy of the Ashland club are mentioned as prospects most likely to catch the ivory-bustlers' eyes, and all four will be invited to participate in the Modoc field encounter.

On the other end of the string were the Polins and the Southern Pacific who managed to eke out only a single victory in the course of seven games.

In between and hovering around the 500 mark were the four remaining clubs, two of which wound up with one more victory than defeat and the other two of which finished with one more defeat than victory.

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New British Golf Champion Expert But Not Popular

CARNOUSTIE, Scotland, July 16 (AP)—Henry Cotton, the man nobody even pretends to know, is ready now to take his place alongside Harry Vardon, Walter Hagen and Bobby Jones among golf's immortals.

He shot a final 71 in a pouring rain yesterday to win his second British open in four years. Reg Whitcombe, the man he beat, said: "That probably was the greatest round of golf ever shot under similar circumstances."

Cotton trimmed the entire American Ryder cup team, and he made it so conclusive that it wasn't even close.

Cotton's total of 230 over the kind of course Carnoustie has been the past three days was the sort of miracle you couldn't appreciate unless you had tramped around Carnoustie with rain pouring down your neck.

Cotton (he hasn't talked to anyone) overtook Whitcombe's three stroke lead starting the final round and finished comfortably ahead.

He is tall, well built, slightly pigeon-toed and his high cheek bones give an oriental cast to his countenance. He doesn't smile and now and again he throws his club irritably when he has missed a putt. He doesn't hob-nob with his fellow professionals nor even speak to a playing companion during a round. The moment he is through playing golf he crawls into his car, driven by a liveried chauffeur, and disappears.

He isn't popular at all, yet he invariably commands the biggest gallery in the field.

The much-pummeled pitching fraternity still huddled in the storm cellars Saturday, while baseball's war club swimmers shouted for more three-day layoffs and better heat waves.

The three-day vacation caused by the all-star game, as well as the heat that melted pitchers down like so many frying snowballs, made a pretty holiday out of virtually all Friday's eight games and put the elbows generally in the time a dozen class. Thirty-eight participated in the eight games. There were 128 runs and 223 hits.

Leading this cannonading was the 13-11 decision the Boston Red Sox pulled out over the Athletics.

In 12 innings, with the two clubs piling up a total of 26 hits.

Joe DiMaggio served as executioner No. 1 for the Yanks and smashed out a pair of homers, a triple, double and single as murderers' row ganged up on the Washington Senators for a 16-2 victory.

The Pirates, given effective flanking support by Joe (Pop Fly) Bowman, climbed all over three Cubs pitchers for a 13-1 win, with Big Poison Waner doing the chief damage.

This setback, however, didn't cut into the Cubs' two game National league lead, since the second place New York Giants were also running into particularly heavy weather. Their feuding partners, the Dodgers, turned in 20 hits, the biggest single club total, and walloped the Giants, 15-2.

Probably the "funnest" game of the day was the Boston Bees' 5-0 victory over the Phillies. The White Sox slugged the Browns, 11-7, the Tigers trampled the Cleveland Indians 10-5, and the Cardinals conquered the Reds, 8-7, in a battle of homers.

Randall Island Sport Carnival Set For Sunday

NEW YORK, July 16 (AP)—A track meet which began as a failure last year because of Olympic competition has every prospect of becoming a howling success when the return engagement of the World Labor Athletic carnival is held at the Randall's Island stadium tomorrow.

Top events are the mile, in which the famous Kansas, Glenn Cunningham and Archie San Román, will resume their rivalry with John Woodruff, bank University of Pittsburgh negro who won the Olympic 800 meters title last year, as the dark horse in the mile. Gene Zenske, of New York, and Jimmy Smith of Indiana university also are in the field.

Two other Olympic champions, Forrest (Spec) Towns, the Georgia hurdler, and Cornelius Johnson, high jumper from Compton, Cal., as well as a flock of the national AAU champions are found on the entry list.

The high jump pits Johnson against Dave Albritton of Ohio State, who beat him last week as well as Mel Walker, Albritton's teammate, and Al Threadgill of Temple.

1937 Big Game Scheduled For Hayward Field

PORTLAND, July 16 (AP)—The "big game" between the University of Oregon and Oregon State college football teams scheduled here Friday, played October 23 at Eugene as scheduled but may be transferred to Portland next year and every third year thereafter, the Oregonian said today.

The newspaper said representatives of the two schools and the Multnomah Athletic club so decided at a secret meeting here Friday, called by Dr. Frederick M. Hunter, chancellor of higher education. Oregon State college, understood to have suggested the change in order to improve gate receipts, also plans to have the OSC-University of Washington game played here on years when the Oregon-Washington game is staged in Seattle.

League-Leading Klamath
Club Expects to Beat
Seventh-Placers

Leading the Northern California league by one game, the strong Klamath Falls Red Sox journey to Hilt Sunday for a tussle with "Hoosier" Heffert's scrappy gang, who to date have won but two league games. Heffert's Hilties rank seventh in the eight team circuit but have been making it plenty tough for every opponent during the past few games.

With the Red Sox at nearly full strength once more after several recent injuries, a defeat would be a decided upset in league circles. Running into a southpaw at Hilt, Manager Sanders will no doubt be switching his line-up to some extent for increased hitting power. Against a clever left-hander in Crescent City recently the Sox sluggers collected but four scattered blows, and Manager Sanders certainly wants no repetition of this.

"Lefty" Bowman of Hilt has humbled the Red Sox before. Two years ago, while hurling for Medford, the big southpaw tied up the league by almost shutting the Sox out, 6-1.

In the last game played, Hilt took the Wood Townies, early season pennant contenders, down the line for a loss, but the Sox are remaining wary and do not intend to let over-confidence step in and spell defeat.

With both Carlstrom and Turpin ready to hurl, Sanders has two of the best chukkers in the league, and after taking the records of the two clubs into consideration, the Sox should have little difficulty in turning in another victory.

Ranger Favored In Yacht Races

NEWPORT, R. I., July 19 (AP)—The only unbeaten sloop of her class in the world, Harold S. Vanderbilt's Ranger, today was favored to retain that standing when she meets T. O. M. Sowell's second, British Challenger for the America's cup off here July 21.

Only today's meeting with Chandler Hovey's Rainbow and Gerard R. Lambert's Yankee stood between her and the date she will be called upon to guard a cup emblematic of Yankee rule of yachting since 1841, when the schooner yacht America brought it home from England.

Since Ranger already has won 11 straight races from her two unsuccessful rivals for the defense nomination, there was little reason to suppose she would not make it an even dozen.

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
