PLANS SHAPING FOR WORLD'S FAIR IN 1939

NEW YORK—One of the chief concerns of women planning to attend the New York World's Fair in 1939 seems to be the matter of comfortable resting between sight-seeing expeditions. Questions on the matter of benches and shaded walks predominate in letters from women. Many of them ask about the care and entertainment of children. Others want to know about the presentation of women's interests. Then come the questions on fair exhibits, welfare, art and amusement sector.

Women who will be visitors at the fair will, no doubt, go home and discourse on its architectural beauty, its wonderful exhibits, its many new and novel displays, but before they set out to view the marvels of this 1939 exposition, they want to be sure they will be comfortable. The fair administration, guided somewhat by these letters from the women of the country, has arranged for many places in which visitors may rest quietly.

One group of resting places will be known as the aqueducts. Here beside a modernistic fountain, surrounded by shrubs and flowers, the tired visitor may sit beneath spreading trees and relax. Tall cylinders of glass, filled with water through which coarse bubbles of compressed air, a tinkling basin beneath and colored lights constantly changing the tone of the cylinders will make up the fountains. These aqueducts, erected by the fair administration, will be located wherever it is practical to place them and many will be found throughout the grounds as havens of coolness and rest.

Ten thousand snare trees will have been planted in the fair grounds by the time the fair opens in 1939. They will be planted along the avenues, in courtyards, beside the lagoons and wherever it is possible for them to grow successfully. Since the fair grounds will be turned into a permanent park at the close of the exposition, planting is a serious project.

New York state is noted for its splendid park system and the fair which will replace the fair will be one of the finest of the state's parks. Hundreds of thousands of shrubs, spring flowering bulbs and annuals will be planted within the grounds so that all during the spring and summer season there will be a continuous bloom.

The question of walking around inside the fair appears to trouble many of the feminine letter-writers. Inquiries as to intramural transportation will be possible to take a bus and ride around the inside of the fair on roads specially constructed for the purpose. It will be a delightful journey, giving a view of the Perisphere and Trylon, the Theme buildings of the fair, and a panoramic view of the vari-colored buildings and landscaping as one goes along.

The bus road inside the fair grounds will be for vehicles only and there will be no danger to pedestrians from motor traffic. Special paths for those who walk will be entirely safe and there will be no need for scurrying out of the way of cars or trucks. None of the traffic hazards which menace pedestrians in greater New York will be found at the fair.

Transportation through the fair itself, with occasional stops at interesting displays, will be available. This will be managed by motor or man-propelled chairs and should be accomplished in the utmost of ease. The problem of "fair feet" will be solved by shaded walks and numerous resting nooks.
