

26 ARRESTED ON DRUNK CHARGES

Clarence B. Friend, arrested Sunday on charges of drunken driving, left his automobile at police station in lieu of bail, and will appear in police court for hearing on Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock.

Della Jackson, Indian woman, pleaded guilty Monday to a drunken driving count and was assessed a fine of \$100, plus 30 days in jail. She originally pleaded not guilty to the charge on July 8 and asked for jury trial but changed her plea Monday.

Twenty-six defendants charged with drunkenness or drunk and disorderly conduct appeared in police court Monday and were assessed regulation fines.

Fred Carreagan forfeited bail of \$10 when he failed to appear to answer to a disorderly conduct charge, and J. S. Bradshaw was fined \$5 for having no operator's license.

H. H. Hilbury appeared in police court to answer to charges of reckless driving and for driving without operator's license. He was fined \$2.50 on the first count and \$5 on the latter.

Harold Collins, Francis Meloff and Jack Blandon, charged with vagrancy, were fined \$100 each and sentenced to 100 days in jail. The sentences are to be suspended after varying lengths of time to allow them to leave town.

Robert E. Emmons was arrested by city police during the past weekend and is being held for investigation on fictitious check charges.
