

### WORK STARTED ON GIRL SCOUT CAMP

Lumber is on the ground, and the sound of hammers on nails is breaking into the forest sounds at the southwest end of Lake o' the Woods, where construction has started on the Girl Scout camp, to be dedicated as Camp Esther Applegate. It is expected to be completed in time for an August camp session of two weeks.

The camp includes a 20-acre tract of heavily timbered land, with an excellent beach and water front. The Girl Scouts secured the last site available for an organization camp.

Although this year's improvements will only fill the requirements of the national organization for a comfortable, sanitary camp, the cost will be about \$2500. To raise this amount the Klamath area, under the direction of Mrs. Twyla Ferguson, commissioner, is holding its first financial campaign since troops were organized in this city.

A well with pure spring water to supply the camp was dug last fall and is ready for the installation of a pump. The site for the main building has been cleared and other necessary clearing is going forward rapidly.

The main camp building will be a combined dining and recreation hall, kitchen, office and supply room. A large porch, providing a beautiful view of the lake, will extend entirely along one side of the hall. Sleeping quarters for the girls and camp staff will be in tents which have already been ordered from the east. Improvements will also be made on the waterfront before camp opens.

The road on the west side of the lake, which now ends directly through the camp site, will be repaved by the forest service.
