

\$8 BAIL FORFEITED ON DRUNK CHARGES

Josephine Cargill, charged with drunkenness, forfeited bail of \$8 Tuesday when she failed to appear in justice court to answer to the count.

Henrietta Johns, Indian woman, charged with drunk and disorderly conduct, was assessed a fine of \$20 plus 15 days in jail, both fine and sentence to be suspended in order to allow her to leave town at once.

Frank Cunningham, charged with disorderly conduct and vagrancy, was assessed a fine of \$20 on the first count and pleaded not guilty to the second charge. Trial on the vagrancy charge will be scheduled for Wednesday.

Monroe Faithful, John Hoach, John Stanton, Perry John and Matt Murphy were fined \$10 each or given 5-day jail sentences for drunkenness. Murphy was also assessed a fine of \$100 and 30 days in jail on a vagrancy charge. Eileen May Stahl and Marvin Broughton are being held on open charges in city jail pending investigation.

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ed the port of Valencia, seat of the Spanish central government dropping several big bombs along the waterfront.

Three persons were killed, several others injured, and some buildings destroyed before government anti-aircraft batteries drove off the raiders. The squadron, apparently abandoning plans for a second attack after flying down the coast, turned toward the sea and disappeared.

Insurgent concentrations were held in their rearward positions on the Madrid front. Fleets of government aircraft, cutting off the insurgent defenses at Brunete and Villanueva Del Pardo from reinforcements, strafed troops and trucks which sought shelter in groves of olive trees.

Defense Stiffens
The display of air strength on the basque front was reported to have stiffened resistance to Gen. Franco's almost undefended march toward Santander, last important government-held port on the Bay of Biscay.

The planes roared low over insurgent positions for 18 hours, intensively machine gunning and bombing the lines. Insurgent entrenchments on four peaks between Carriane and Valmaseda were reported destroyed in two raids by government war planes.

General Sebastian Pozas, commander of the government forces in the Zaragoza-Teruel sector, reported Albaracin, "not only has been completely surrounded but has been completely surrounded by government troops are now fighting in the streets of the town."

"Many prisoners," Gen. Pozas declared, "have been taken and a number of fascists have come over to our side. The insurgents are still holding some well-fortified houses in the town."

Hand-to-Hand Fighting
Bayonets clashed in Albaracin's streets in hand-to-hand fighting which, government communiques reported, routed insurgents from barricades and fortified adobe houses.

The severity of insurgent bombardments of Madrid, dropped sharply as their heavy guns were turned toward the government of offensive west of the capital. Occasional shells still burst in the streets, however. Two men were killed today.

The stark Castilian plain, 15 miles west of Madrid, was an inferno of artillery and aerial bombardments.

Villanueva Del Pardo, itself virtually leveled by the clash of two modern war machines and now claimed by the government as another segment of what once was insurgent territory, was the vortex.

Villages Blotted Out
Hot summer winds carried the stench of death and the cries of the dying over the shell torn terrain. Whole villages had been blotted out in the week-old government offensive and insurgent counter-thrusts.

The government strength around Villanueva Del Pardo constituted a serious threat to insurgent towns along the Corina road and the eight-month old siege positions in Casa De Campo and Carabanchel on the western and southwestern fringes of Madrid.

The fall of Boadilla Del Monte, seven miles west of Casa De Campo, in the path of the government's curving salient, would bring Gen. Jose M. Lujan's government troops near the insurgent rear guard on the edge of Madrid.

Bodies in Heaps
Scarcely a house remained undamaged in Villanueva Del Pardo and Quijorna, said eyewitnesses who toured the front lines of Mija's salient.

Boadilla Del Monte, while still in the hands of Franco's insurgents, had been turned into a roaring furnace by government shells and bombs.

Bodies of Moorish troops who had garrisoned Villanueva Del Pardo and Quijorna lay in heaps around the ruined towns. Quijorna fell last week to the government thrust and Villanueva Del Pardo was reported taken yesterday.

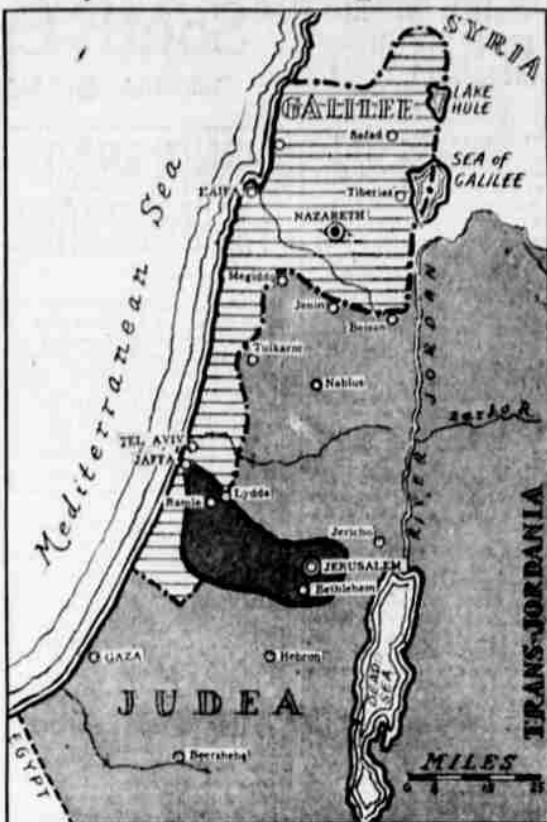

BANDITS ROB JOHN DAY BANK, SHOOT BYSTANDER IN HEEL

of the townspeople gathered to watch a fire believed to have been set by the robbers.

Most of the silver was reported recovered from the robbers' car which overturned on the John Day highway.

Not knowing of the robbery E. Blaylock, who lives near the scene of the wreck, approached the overturned car to offer aid and was shot in the heel.

Later a Mr. and Mrs. Carruthers of John Day reported the men stopped their automobile, forced them to get out and commanded their car.

The wrecked car was described as a Plymouth coupe with Washington license plates and was reported to have contained at least four guns and a number of license plates of various states, in addition to two sacks of coins.

A report which officers were unable to confirm said that the robbers visited Holmerson's home, forced him to accompany them to the bank and open the vault. He was found lying on the sidewalk in front of the bank, badly beaten about the head and unable to talk.

Officers said they believed the robbers set fire to an old barn on a side street, which burst into flame shortly before the robbery, to distract attention from the bank.
