GOLFERS READY FOR BIG EVENT

Weyerhaeuser to Put 30 Men in Field Against Rest of Reames.

Preparations are moving rapidly ahead this week for the golf "battle of the century" between the Weyerhaeuser linksmen and a team of select players recruited from the rest of the Reames club membership. The tournament is scheduled for next Sunday.

At 35—he'll be 36 next Tuesday—Heinie might not be quite so fast as in 1926, when he won the American League batting championship, but at least he was powdering the ball. Heinie just went on about his business, such as the ninth inning home run Tuesday that gave the Dodgers a 2-1 decision over the Bees.

Tuesday's was only Heinie's fourth home run, yet, with 35 runs batted in, he leads his nearest teammate, Cookie Lavagotto, by six. He is tied at .335 with Joe Moore, the Giants' thin man who, after his five for six Tuesday against the Phillies, is top batter among the second place Terrymen.

Moore was the big gun in a 20-hit giant attack that required 10 innings to nose out the Phils, 11-9. The last of Joe's five singles drove home the winning run.

In the only game in the American League, the Indians backed up Dennis Galehouse's seven-hit pitching with some snappy fielding to edge out the White Sox, 2-1.

TULELAKE WELL HITS CAP ROCK

TULELAKE—Base rock of the old lake bed, "hard as flint" has been struck by the big bit that for months has been seeking water for the town of Tulelake. Interest of the townspeople is concentrated on the bore with the announcement from those who know that water may be expected in quantities at any moment.

Recent findings from the bore are the most encouraging yet recovered and comparative tests made of water within 90 feet of the top of the hole and that taken from the tank car from Peres that has furnished water for the town over a period of years was found to be about the same mineral content. That which has been drawn from the local well is ice cold.

Recent drilling has sent the bit through 65 feet of flinty shale, a small strata of sand and a conglomerate vein of mineral with high quartz crystal content.

The bore is at the 1675 foot depth and an excellent flow of water is expected when the cap rock is punctured.
