

STATE EJECTS DANCING FROM BEER PARLORS

PORTLAND, Ore., July 13 (AP)—Adopting its own experience proved maximum—that "entertainment with liquor means trouble"—the Oregon liquor control commission placed elimination of dancing in beer parlors at the head of its new enforcement policy today.

Inauguration of a new set of strict regulations along with more restrictions under power of discretion granted by law, enabled the state control officials to add potency to their reputation as a "hard-boiled" commission.

Along with the move to deny beer licenses where entertainment is provided, so far as possible, the commission placed stern rules on liquor advertising in newspapers, started a "black" list of drunkards whose purchase permits have been revoked, added further causes for license suspensions, placed more restrictions upon applicants for beer and wine licenses and added its own enforcement organization.

Arthur K. McMahan, chairman of the three-man commission, declared experience proved that where entertainment is permitted at beer and wine spots most of the "beer parlor trouble" occurs.

Under the law passed by the 1933 special legislative session, the commission has the power to regulate and prohibit liquor advertising within the state. The new regulations call for straight advertising in publications without pictures of men and women drinking. Firms are allowed to advertise only three kinds of liquors in state stores at one time to eliminate week-end sales.

McMahan pointed out the purpose of the control commission is to regulate sales, not to promote them.

Persons convicted of drunkenness, driving while intoxicated or other crimes resulting from drinking, will be denied the right to purchase hard liquor or beer. Twenty purchase permits were revoked at the last meeting of the commission, starting what McMahan termed a permanent "black list" which is supplied all agencies.

About three per cent of the enforcement trouble is caused by licensees of beer and wine, which caused the commission to tighten the regulations, making them adhere strictly to the letter of the law. After a suspension, a licensee will find it difficult to renew his license.

While applicants for such licenses must be approved by city council or county court, the commission is not bound to issue them with that approval. The matter rests entirely with the three-man board. Consideration is given moral and financial reputations of applicants.

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As Cleveland Strike-Bound Steel Plants Reopened

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INTERNAL REVENUE COLLECTIONS RISE

Commissioner of Internal Revenue Guy T. Helvering issued a statement Thursday showing internal revenue collections for the year ended June 30, 1937, by collection districts and states, together with comparative figures for the fiscal year 1936. The collections for the fiscal year just closed aggregated \$4,952,664,106.39 compared with \$3,529,268,381.69 for the previous fiscal year, an increase of \$1,423,395,725.20.

Income tax collections rose from \$1,412,938,702.89 to \$2,149,381,149.21, an increase of \$736,442,446.32. Excess profits taxes increased from \$14,509,290.47 to \$24,967,118.86, a gain of \$10,457,828.39. Liquor taxes jumped from \$625,422,525.64 to \$892,301,432.95, an increase of \$266,878,907.31. The collection of social security taxes became effective for the first time during the fiscal year 1937, total receipts from that source amounting to \$265,755,328.37.

Miscellaneous taxes accounted for the remainder of the increase in internal revenue taxes for the fiscal year 1937, collections from this source amounting to \$1,495,691,999.00 for 1936 and \$1,620,693,467.96 for 1937.
