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Streamlined Truck Hauls Oil



Heilbrunner and Ren, local fuel dealers, have recently added a new streamlined diesel and stove-oil pump truck to their equipment. The 750-gallon, two-compartment tank is mounted on a Ford V-8 chassis, equipped with air brakes, and is modern in detail from bumper to bumper, the only complete unit of its kind in Klamath Falls. Other features of the new pump include a power driven pump, automatic meter and an automatic reel with 100 feet of hose. Everything is enclosed and protected from rain and dust, thus providing clean, accurately measured diesel and stove oil—all for underground storage tanks, basement tanks and barrel delivery, according to Fred Heilbrunner of the local firm.

SCHOOL BOND BIDS
OPENED ON MONDAY

Interest is keen in the Klamath union high school bond issue, for which bids will be opened by the school board Monday evening.

Many inquiries have been received, indicating that several firms are considering offering bids for the \$265,000 issue, according to Chairman Percy Murray of the school board.

The bonds were approved by taxpayers of the district for the purpose of financing construction of additional classrooms, a shop and a gymnasium at the high school plant.

If a satisfactory bid is received Monday night, it is expected steps will be taken almost immediately for the beginning of part of the construction program.

NEW YORK, July 17 (AP)—Feeble rallies in some of the steels, rails, motors, coppers and specialties punctuated today's drab stock market session.

Mild profit selling at the opening put prices down fractions to a point or more but offerings were so light bids were later hoisted in numerous instances.

It was one of the slowest days of the year, transfers running to about 250,000 shares for the two hours.

Traders apparently found no great stimulation in another batch of favorable second quarter earnings statements. Restraining the buying urge, it was said, was the tenseness of the congressional court bill fight, darkening war clouds over the far east and a new French financial crisis.

The French franc, reflecting a new flight of capital from the republic, broke to its lowest level in terms of the dollar since 1926.

Bonds developed no definite trends and commodities were uneven.

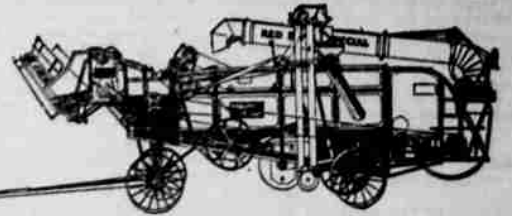
