Trying to catch the galloping Yankees these days is about as hopeful as trying to keep up with Gar Wood in a one-lung outboard, but you can't rule the White Sox or the Tigers off the track for trying. The Sox won six in a row to maintain their place as runners-up to the champions, now six and a half games in front after drubbing the Browns in both ends of a double-header Tuesday.

The Tigers, encouraged by the promising recovery of Manager Mickey Cochrane, who for the first time since his injury got on a uniform during morning workout Tuesday, have won five straight since handing the Yanks the lousiest setback of their current road trip. Both have had fairly easy pickings the last few days. The Sox caught fire the Red Sox and not the Senators in the throes of a losing streak, making it 10 defeats in a row for the Nats Tuesday with a 4-3 triumph in 10 innings.

The Red Sox aren't proving too tough for the Tigers, either. The Hub crew was up in second place last week, but has hit the skids again, that 10-inning, 10-9 licking by Detroit being its fifth in a row.

Even the fact that Jimmy Fox chimed in with his nineteenth and twentieth homers and Colonel Mills and Eric McNair came up with one each couldn't save the Sox. The extra-inning virus even affected the Yankees, who won the opener from the Browns in the tenth, 5-4, then belted four St. Louis flingers for 11 hits to win the nightcap, 9-6. Joe DiMaggio's twenty-fifth homer, with two on, was the big blow in the first game, but shared importance with Tom Henrich's peg from right field for a double play in the tenth.

The other American league game saw George Caster go the route while his fellow Athletics bagged 15 hits off four Cleveland pitchers to win, 7-5.

The Giants, climbing back to within half a game of the rain-soaked Cubs, and the Dodgers, recovering from four straight trimmings by Chicago, also needed 10 innings to win. Cliff Melton held the Reds to five hits as the Terrmen won, 4-3.

Max Butcher tamed the Pirates with eight safeties, to give Brooklyn a 2-1 decision.

The Cardinals threw in a few misplays and bowed to the Bees, 5-3.

BIG MONEY ON IT

OAKS RISE TO SIXTH PLACE

Seattle Club Displaced in Standings; Portland Shades Solons.

The Oakland A's miraculously moved into sixth place in the Pacific Coast league Wednesday, relegating their customary seventh place berth to the skidding Seattle Indians.

Playing errorless ball and hitting hard, the Oaks defeated the San Francisco Mission Reds, 7 to 1, Tuesday night, while Big Jim Chaplin gave the league leading San Diego Padres a 4 to 0 shut out over the Indians.

The Padres' lead was increased to a game and a half as Portland won its fourteenth game in 16 starts, defeating the second-place Sacramento Solons, 3 to 2.

Although wild, "Sailor" Bill Posedel won his sixth straight for the lapping Portland Beavers, an unearned run was blamed for "Gentleman" Dick Newsome's defeat. In the eighth inning First Baseman Dutch Prather lost a throw from third base in the lights. A sacrifice and a double by Johnny Frederick chased the run home.

A wild pitch and too many walks cost Wesley Flowers and the Los Angeles Angels a 5 to 4 defeat at the hands of the San Francisco Seals in 10 innings. Flowers, recently released by the Seals, limited his former mates to five hits but saw two runs scored in the second inning when he forced in one tally with a walk and let another come home on a wild pitch. The Angels outbatted the Seals, 15 to 5.

Merrill May, third baseman and recent Oakland addition, led the A's assault on the Missions with a triple and three singles, and drove in three runs. It was the Oaks' seventh consecutive victory. Chaplin virtually won his game single-handed. The big Padre hurler's victory was his sixteenth for the season. He hit a homer in the seventh and also bagged a double. Harold Patchett of the Padres also hit for the circuit in the seventh.

ASTORIA, July 21 (AP)—Astoria's annual midsummer golf championships entered first round play today after the elusive par on the Golf and Country Club course defied all but one entrant in qualifying rounds Tuesday.
