

BARKLEY MADE SENATE CHIEF BY DEMO VOTE

the contest. Senators said. Up to the last vote, the two candidates were tied at 27 to 27. When the deciding ballot was announced there was a burst of applause.

Tiny white cards passed among the senators for the balloting. Each wrote the name of his choice upon one. They were collected by a committee. Then they were examined individually, and the votes were called out one by one.

Listening excitedly, the senators kept a rough tally of the vote as it proceeded. The high point of tension was reached, when, with one more vote to be called, the count stood tied.

Barkley opened the meeting with a brief statement of his purpose, and then turned over the chair to Senator Pittman (D-Ne.). the senate president pro-temp.

Two Roll Calls. Senators said there were two roll calls, one to register those present and another as the senators dropped their written ballots.

The only absentee was Senator Rankin, who went to his Jasper, Ala., home last week because of his wife's illness.

Senator Hayden of Arizona, who left the naval hospital to attend, was applauded as he cast his ballot. He said he voted for Harrison.

Harrison showed no sign of disappointment as he stood beside Barkley to shake hands with the democratic senators and make statements to the press.

Both Support New Deal. But some of the Mississippian's supporters obviously were downcast. They had expected up to the last ballot to win. Both candidates had bespoken confidence as they entered the caucus room in the state office building.

President Roosevelt publicly kept his hands off the contest. Both candidates participated in a legislative conference with him last night.

Both senators have supported the Roosevelt administration on

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nearly every issue, including court reorganization.

Still Friends
Members said the names of Barkley and Harrison were placed before the caucus when Senator Tydings (D-Md.) rose and asked unanimous consent that they be considered the nominees.

In announcing the result, Pittman called it "the most interesting and exciting election of a leader I have witnessed in 24 years."

"It was neck and neck until the last ballot," he said. "These two men have been life-long friends and they are friends now. There was no contest over any of the procedure. Senator Harrison with true sportsmanship asked for a unanimous ballot for Senator Barkley."

Harrison Told Barkley:
"I congratulate you, old boy. We've got to fight together for the progress of our country and the success of the democratic party."

"Thank you, Pat," Barkley replied. "We have been fighting together since the Wilson administration began in 1913, and this is the only occasion I can remember when our interests were separate."

It was the first contest for democratic leader since Senator Robinson was elected in 1922.

WOODWORKERS IN FACTIONAL FIGHT OVER CIO, AFL

dodge action of the convention which voted the organization into the CIO.

Honey, business agent for the local, announced members had declined to support the convention action after hearing representatives of the new organization and the Federation of Woodworkers, AFL affiliate which it replaced.

He said the union while not specifically repudiating the convention, refused to vote its approval of the move taken here Monday.

Appeal Fruitless
An appeal by Harold Pritchett, president of the woodworkers failed to swing the Tacoma workers from their AFL allegiance.

"Last night's vote by the rank and file of local No. 2623," Haney said, "was clear indication that just because delegates (to the convention still in session here) have gone wild over dumping immediately into CIO, it does not mean the men on the job in the mills and camps are favorable to such 'rail-road' tactics. The rank and file in Tacoma recall how much they received from other unions in the dreary days of 1933-34, and they are not ready to turn their backs on them."

"If CIO is such a good thing, it will be just as good 30 to 60 days from now as it is today; and many delegates who have jumped into the parade at the convention are going to be told that when they go home to face their brothers."

The Tacoma split was the third in the woodworkers ranks over the CIO question. Previously, the Willamette council, with another 1000 members had repudiated the convention and all its acts, while the Snoqualmie local, a smaller group, had expressed violent opposition to CIO.

examination of Smith's body at Tulelake, before it was taken to Alturas, indicated Smith was shot at least four times.

Mother Witness
Only witness of the shooting was Fitch's aged mother, who had followed him across the road to the potato cellar site.

Smith was shot 10 feet inside the Modoc county line. He staggered that distance, and fell dead almost exactly on the line between Modoc and Shoshone counties.

'Had to Shoot'
Dysert received a call shortly after the shooting. He started for the scene, but at the edge of Tulelake met Fitch coming in.

Fitch, according to Dysert, told him, "I had to shoot a man. Asked who it was, he said, 'Earle Smith.'"

Fitch handed the gun over to Dysert. It had been re-loaded.

Homestead Divided
Dysert went on to the shooting scene, and found Smith lying flat on his back in the middle of the road. He was dead.

Modoc authorities at Alturas were notified, and came to Tulelake to take Fitch to the county seat.

Acquaintances of Smith and Fitch said that the two men had been unfriendly for more than a year. Smith and Fitch's elder sister, who was divorced about eight months ago, at the time the homestead had been owned was divided, each taking part. Fitch lived on the part taken by Mrs. Smith.

The Smiths have a 12-year-old son, Byron. Fitch has a brother, a minister, living in Tulelake. Officers said he told them he had borrowed the gun from his brother, and had carried it for some time in his boot-top.

Fitch is married. His wife is at Pasadena, Calif. Smith has been living on a small cabin on his place. He has engaged in operation of a freight line between San Francisco and Tulelake, his partner being H. H. Murphy.

the administration for their consideration.

He would not disclose the nature of his conference with Garner, but it appeared that the move to draft a new bill was made at the vice president's suggestion.

Earlier reports of a possible drastic modification of the administration's court measure spread among senators simultaneously with the election of Barkley as the new democratic leader.

A short time later, Senator Logan (D-Ky.), one of the authors

of the court compromise pending in the senate, told reporters he was "ready to let the whole thing drop."

"I'm sick and tired of the court issue and Washington," Logan said. He added that he would "go along" if there was any chance of working something out.

McNary Expects Adjournment
He said he did not like the proposal of court bill opponents to draft a new bill dealing only with the lower courts and declared, "If we are going to do anything about the lower courts we had better pass the bill as it is."

Minority Leader McNary (R-Ore.) forecast quick adjournment of congress as soon as the court bill is out of the way. Republicans, he said, would oppose consideration of wage-hour and other major legislation at this session.

Wheeler's statement was the first hint that the foes of the bill would submit an alternative for the presidential program.

These foes said, meanwhile, that administration leaders had agreed to lay aside the pending court bill until next week to give them a chance to work out another bill. Later, they said, it would be decided whether to send the administration bill back to the committee or make the substitution on the floor.

Votes to Recommit
Wheeler told reporters flatly there was no doubt his group had enough votes to recommit the present bill. He served notice they would agree to no compromise which would increase the size of the supreme court.

The opposition leader said his group was willing to work out some reform legislation for the lower courts, to speed action, and permit direct appeals to the supreme court in constitutional cases, but was opposed to "roving judges" or the proposed proctor to recommend their assignment.

mounted carabinieri, a military band, representatives of the army navy and air corps and a group of Franciscan monks with lighted candles who walked directly in front of the gilded funeral carriage drawn by six horses.

The crew of the yacht Elettra formed the guard of honor on both sides of the carriage. Black-shirt officers carried Marconi's academician decorations on black cushions. A group of academicians followed the generals of the air, navy and army who walked behind three empty royal coaches with blinds drawn. The dense crowd was held back by black-shirts.

More than 50,000 persons viewed the body, passing the coffin in single file, in the Royal Academy. The body will be sent to Bologna tomorrow and the national funeral will be held on Friday.

since Justice Percy R. Kelly was appointed to succeed Justice Thomas A. McBride, who died September 9, 1936.

Gov. Julius L. Meier did not appoint a justice in his four years as governor, and today's appointment was Governor Martin's first supreme court appointment.

Justice Campbell died here Friday night of a heart ailment, and was buried Monday in Oregon City.

More than 30 applications for the post were received, but Governor Martin accepted none of them until after Justice Campbell's funeral.

Justice Campbell was elected for a six-year term in 1930 and was reelected last year. He was chief justice in 1935 and 1936.

In Second Term
Judge Lusk, born in Washington, D. C., in 1883, received his bachelor of laws degree from Georgetown University in 1907.

He has lived in Oregon since 1908 and was assistant U. S. attorney in 1919 and 1922.

He now is serving his second term as judge of the fourth judicial district of the circuit court. He has a wife and five daughters.

The supreme court adjourned a week ago today to reconvene next September, when Justice Lusk assumes his new post.

Judge Dobson was born in Indiana in 1879, completing his law education at Chicago in 1906. He is married.

He was a member of the legal advisory board during the world war and aided in liberty bond work for the YMCA and for the Red Cross.

At both the Denton and Trimmer homes, the captives' families had been distraught although the outlaws had assured them their hostages would not be harmed.

Mrs. Denton was surprised to learn of her husband's feat. "He hadn't fired a gun for three years," she said. "And then it was only a shotgun he used to hunt rabbits. I always joked him about being a lousy shot, too."

Mrs. Denton described her husband as "very mild and agreeable." He weighs 143 pounds and although only 44 years old has

much gray in his hair. Denton was on a vacation from his job as oil field pumper at Asher, Okla.
