The plan. Some opponents of the bill said they had, others that they had not.

The judiciary committee action came after administration leaders had fought with their backs to the wall to save remnants of the compromise bill.

They had the votes.

The proponents, however, had needed for some time that the vote had enough votes to sidetrack the bill and virtually could dictate the kind of legislation they could pass.

Senator Bailey (D-N. C.), described the situation from the opposition's standpoint, and said:

"The battle for the independence of the judiciary has been fought and won. We are attending now to details."

Senator Pittman (D-Nev.), one of the bill's strongest advocates, commented: "It's up to them; they've got the votes."

Senator O'Mahoney (D-Wyo.), a leading opponent of the original court bill, announced the committee and administration chiefs had agreed on an eight-point program of "judicial reform."
