BUDGE BEATS NO. 2 BRITON

Bunny Austin Wins Easy Victory Over Frankie Parker

WIMBLEDON, Eng., July 24 (AP)—Surviving a marathon 25-game first set, America's sorriest-topped tennis ace, Don Budge, crushed Charles Edgar Hare, 22-year-old Englishman, 15-13, 6-1, 6-2, and gave the United States an even break with Great Britain in the opening singles matches of the Davis Cup challenge round today.

Budge's triumph came after Henry Wilfred (Bunny) Austin, British stylist, had trounced Frankie Parker of Milwaukee, 6-3, 6-2, 7-5.

Hare, the 32-year-old newcomer to cup competition, furnished all the fireworks in the first day's play.

Cast in the role of a sacrifice to Budge's vaunted tennis powers, the left-handed youngster fought the American ace tooth and nail in the first set as the small crowd looked on in amazement.

He broke through the red-head in the third game, but Budge came back to smother Hare's service in the sixth game to stay level. Again in the ninth, Hare broke through for a 5-4 lead, but Budge came back to take the tenth. Thereafter, the next 17 games in a row went to service and Budge thus held a 14-13 lead as Hare served in the 25th game.

The Briton promptly pounded out a 40-15 lead but served two double-faults in a row to allow the American to deuce the game. A few minutes later, the exhausted Hare served another double-fault for the decisive game and the set.

After that Budge, regaining full control of his game, smashed through the youngster at will. He won the second set in 14 minutes, giving Hare only five points in the first five games and only 11 points all told.

The third set followed similar lines, although Hare summoned up enough resistance to snare two games.

"What boxing needs is a Judge Landis."

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Plans Complete For Red Sox To Play Seals Here

Plans for entertaining the San Francisco Seals of the Coast league here Monday, August 9, are going on apace, Hal Haight, who is supervising arrangements, announced Saturday.

The Seals will play the Klamath Red Sox, Northern California league leaders, on Modoc field at 5:30 p. m., rather than a team of all-stars, as was announced earlier, Haight said.

The question that is raising particular interest among local fans is whether or not the Sox can maintain their undefeated record on their home diamond, when faced with one of the strongest outfits on the coast.

Haight points out that the Seals are the first professional ball club to play in this section in 20 years. The San Francisco roster will include such stars as Glen Wright, former Pittsburgh second baseman; Lefty Frank, former major league batting champion and rated one of the best managers in the coast circuit; Walter Math, ex-pitcher and comedian; Hal Rhyne, shortstop formerly with the Boston Red Sox, and Dominic DiMaggio, big league prospect and brother of the famed DiMaggios.

Medwick Takes Firmer Grip On Batting Crown

NEW YORK, July 24 (AP)—Ducky Medwick's National league batting lead stretched larger than ever today, while Lou Gehrig's hold on the American league home seemed shaky, at best, as the result of their respective performances this week.

Medwick collected 13 hits in 24 times at bat during the week ended yesterday to keep his season average at .410, a slight drop from his .413 of the previous week.

In the American league, Joe DiMaggio continued his climbing, getting 14 hits in 38 chances to hold a .382 margin and a climb from third place to a tie for second with Cecil Travis of the Senators.

Gehrig, meantime, went into a mild slump and lost eight points during the week, falling to .359.

Highest hitter of the week was Earl Averett of Cleveland, who traveled at a 500 clip, getting 16 for 32, to take over tenth place in the American league with a .340 mark.

Schoolboy Rowe Hangs Up Glove, To Quit Tigers

DETROIT, July 24 (AP)—A mournful Lynwood (Schoolboy) Rowe, once one of baseball's most admired pitchers, hung up his glove for apparently the rest of this season.

The Schoolboy is going back home to Eldorado, Ark., if he follows the advice of his boss, and let a sore arm rest a long time.

Rowe, former ace of the Detroit Tigers' staff, met his Waterloo against the Philadelphia Athletics yesterday, when he was punched around for five runs in one inning and went in the process.

Directly, Manager Mickey Coghane, decided Rowe had had enough for this season and, pending final word from Owner Walter O. Briggs, the big right-hander will be free to return home.

An operation on his arm, which had helped the Tigers to two American league pennants and a world championship, is contemplated.
