

INJUNCTIONS BAN PROPOSED

said 80 per cent of the house membership favored a constitutional amendment to let congress pass on decisions overturning legislation. A two-thirds vote would be required to reinstate such laws.

Connally said "there is no reason in permitting a single district judge to issue an injunction staying an act of congress," adding: "It is entirely sound to require a three-judge court in such a case. I am very much interested in this provision, and shall urge it before the judiciary committee."

The Texas said the new bill now being drafted by a judiciary subcommittee, also would "provide direct appeal to the supreme court in cases involving the constitutionality of an act of congress."

Rep. Butler (D-NY) carried Dies' proposal a step further by recommending that the people pass indirectly on these decisions. He would stipulate that congress could not vote to override an invalidating decision until an election had intervened.

Some of Dies' supporters said they were prepared to bring up his amendment at this session. Other legislators pointed out, however, that the administration had agreed with court bill foes not to mention the supreme court in any measure enacted.

Campaign to Heal Wounds
Vice President Garner started a campaign to heal the ragged wounds that the long court controversy left in democratic ranks.

Observers were not agreed on the ultimate effect of the vice president's conciliatory efforts. Some said he had laid the ground-work for a new party harmony that would leave few signs of the recent strife by the 1940 presidential election.

Others expressed a conviction that differences were too fundamental to be eased by talk of party loyalty or the settlement of a single issue. Before long, they predicted, a split may develop on other issues and affect future political campaigns.

CALIFORNIA PLANS TO CUT RELIEF BY DEPORTATION

SACRAMENTO, July 24 (UP)—California tonight prepared to deport needy aliens as a temporary expedient in meeting the most forbidding relief situation the state ever has faced.

Over-riding protests that such action would be "the most disgraceful in its history," the state relief commission adopted a resolution providing aliens the alternative of accepting passage to their homelands or being dropped from relief rolls.

The move was recommended by Relief Administrator Harold E. Pomeroy as a result of a congressional order removing all aliens from WPA projects. Pomeroy said approximately 8,000 aliens were on WPA projects, with an additional 2,000 already on state relief rolls.

Under the policy adopted today, an alien agreeing to deportation will be provided assistance until departure.

Roy R. Nofz and Michael Harves, representatives of the Workers' Alliance, said if there are 12,000 aliens on relief rolls, 60,000 persons would be affected.

SEARCHERS FIND AIRPLANE "CRASH"

SANTA BARBARA, Cal., July 24 (UP)—A two-day search for a crashed airplane was ended here today when it was found that "crash" had been that of a model plane.

An alarm was turned in last night when residents reported hearing a plane's motor overhead suddenly go silent.

Paul Witt, 14-year-old schoolboy, and owner of the plane, admitted it was his six-foot ship which had crashed.

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MARTIN PRAISES BONNEVILLE BILL NOW IN CONGRESS

SALEM, July 24 (AP)—The so-called compromise bill now before congress providing for administration of the Bonneville dam is sound and should receive the approval of the citizens of Oregon, Governor Charles H. Martin declared here today.

"I predicted in the beginning that a good bill would be reported out by the house rivers and harbors committee," Governor Martin continued.

The governor said it was somewhat disconcerting, however, that Judge Mansfield of Texas had to lead the fight for the Bonneville bill against two members of the Oregon delegation in congress.

Defeat of the amendments offered by Representative Walter Pierce in which he sought to revise the bill to place the power plan under the interior department administrator also was pleasing to Governor Martin, he said.

The compromise bill provides for the appointment of a \$10,000 a year power administrator at Bonneville dam. He would supervise power distribution and sale and fix the rates under sanction of the federal power commission.
