

Red Sox Beat Weed, Keep League Leadership

SUNDAY TILT LOOSE EVENT

Many Hits, Many Errors Feature Play in Mill Town.

Defeating the Weed Townies 16-11 in a loosely played contest at Weed Sunday afternoon, the Klamath Falls Red Sox retained the Northern California league leadership for another week at least.

Both teams gathered many base hits, accompanied with numerous errors, turned the fray into a free scoring affair, especially in the first two frames.

Turpin, starting on the mound for the local, had a decidedly off day. The California team, in the first two innings, enjoyed his offerings to the tune of seven hits while scoring eight runs with Red Sox errors responsible for part of the big parade.

Hodges, Weed hurler, was no more fortunate than Turpin. Red Sox sluggers touched the Weed veteran for seven blows and crossed the plate eight times to make the fray 8-8 at the start of the third.

Carlstrom replaced Turpin in the third and buried the remainder of the contest, allowing seven hits and three runs. Hodges, for the Townies, remained on the mound despite the opening barrage, but was pounded from the box in the seventh and replaced by P. Mazzoni.

The Townies broke the 8-8 tie in the fourth, jumping into a 10-8 lead, which feature apparently aroused the trailing Red Sox as they came back in the fifth, sixth and seventh to drive out nine base knocks off the faltering Hodges, scoring eight runs, and putting the game on ice for the day. The Townies, rallying desperately, scored once in the last inning but were unable to harm Carlstrom to any extent.

Wheeler and Donaldson led the list of Klamath sluggers for the day, Wheeler hammering out four base hits in six trips, one a double, while Donaldson collected three in five trips. E. Mazzoni of Weed likewise enjoyed a big day at bat, receiving four base knocks in six times at bat, one a double.

Carlstrom, Klamath pitcher, put one over the fence in the seventh for a home run, scoring Fryer, catcher, ahead of him.

Next Sunday the Klamath team will be host to Mt. Shasta City Athletic club on Modoc Field. Mt. Shasta is the only team that has defeated the Red Sox this season in league competition and it will be a "revenge" game from start to finish. Let it be known that Klamath is gunning for Bobby Joyce and the whole Mt. Shasta outfit.

CHICAGO, July 26 (AP)—The boys who golf for a living can start fearing Gene Sarazen all over again.

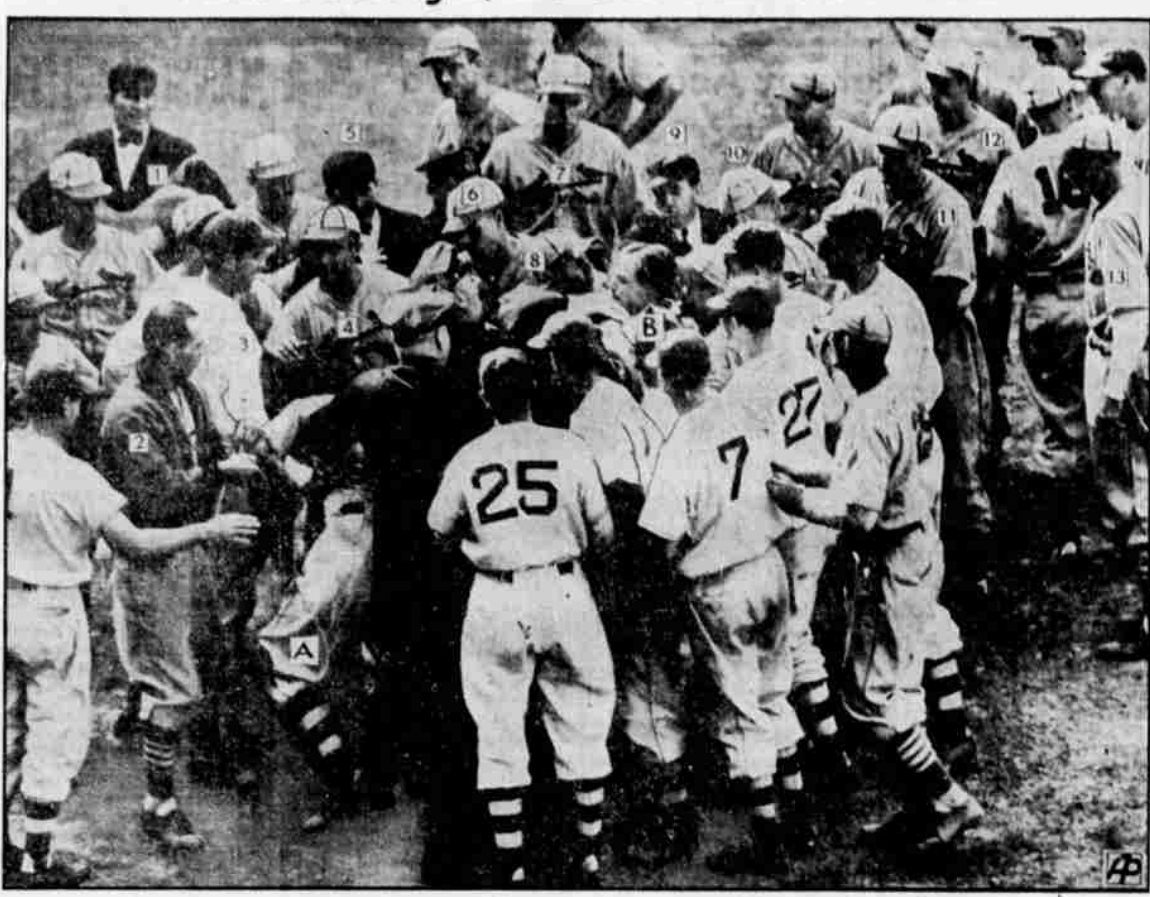

Sacramento's larruping Solons were back on top of the heap again today in the Pacific Coast Baseball league race after a fighting Oakland team took a pair from the San Diego Padres to dump them out of first place.

Sacramento split a pair with the third place San Francisco Seals yesterday, losing the opener 3 to 5, as Ted Norbert of the Seals and Art Garibaldi of the Seals slashed homers. Sacramento took the nightcap, 4 to 1.

Portland moved to within 5 1/2 games of first place by taking four straight from the Los Angeles team. The Beavers blanked the Angels 2 to 0 and 2 to 0 Sunday at Los Angeles. Mike Tresh and Steve Conerant hit homers for the Beavers in the opener.

San Diego's Padres, whose home town fans are hard on umpires and visiting ball players, found fans at the Oakland ball park equally as enthusiastic yesterday. Oakland won both games, 2 to 1 and 6 to 1, to make it three out of four for the series.

The Padres put up a strong protest on a decision by umpire Milt Steenegrat in the first game when he called out Jimmy Chaplin, Padre pinchhitter. Oakland fans disapproved the protest and started showering the Padres with pop and beer bottles. Steenegrat left the field and went to the dressing room as police reserves were called. Teammates had to drag George Myatt, Padre infielder, from the field when he wanted to do battle with a baseball fan who accused of trying to "caress" him with a bottle.

Boston's 4 Cheaply-Bought Pitchers Prove Poison to Other Senior League Teams

They were still chasing after the Cubs on the National League merry-go-round Monday but the brass ring appeared to be exclusively in possession of Boston's believe-it-or-not Bees, possessors of a pitching staff that came out of nowhere and is pure poison to the rest of the senior circuit.

And the payoff is that although the Bees' big four flingers are worth their weight in pound sterling right now, they didn't cost wily old Bob Quinn and gay Bill McKee much more than enough to keep a Sunday crowd in hot dogs.

Danny MacFadden landed in Boston on waivers. Every other club gave up on old Guy Bush. Lou Fette and Jim Turner, a couple of 30-year-old rookies, couldn't have cost much to bring up from the minors this year, at an age when most others are on the way down again.

This quartet, aided by a couple of other "cheap" assistants, such as Johnny Lanning and Gabbo Gabler, and without the hacking of any kind of batting punch, have earned up the loop in a drive that has skyrocketed the Bees from eighth place on June 27 to a spot where they're flirting with the first division.

They have won 22 of 30 starts, have allowed but 81 runs in 270 innings, and have a collective earned run average that should make the Mathewsons and the

Waddells turn over in their graves.

They climaxed their winning spree yesterday by topping the Pittsburgh Pirates in both ends of a doubleheader, 5-2 and 7-5, with Bush and Fette doing the work.

The Giants salvaged the last game of their series from the Cubs 5-0 behind Harry Gumbert's six hit elbowing. This defeat sliced the Cubs' lead to two games.

The Yankees wound up their western whirl by splitting with the Chicago White Sox. They won the first game, 12-11, on Bill Dickey's two homers, but were nipped in the nightcap, 7-6, despite a pair of round trip belts by young Tommy Henrich, all of which left them with a five game lead in the American league.

Washington's Senators knocked the ears off seven St. Louis Browns' pitchers for a twin win, 16-10 and 15-3. Lefty Grove hurled a two hitter as the Red Sox socked the Indians, 4-1, in a single game cut to five innings by rain, and the Detroit Tigers banged out four homers to whip the Athletics, 12-9, as their lone tilt was washed out in six frames.

The Dodgers and Cardinals put on 23 innings of dizzy baseball, with Brooklyn winning the opener, 6-5, in 11 innings and tying the nightcap at 7-11 in 12.

The Reds split with the Philadelphia Dredgers the second game, 7-3, after taking the opener, 13-2.

U. S. LEADS IN CUP TOURNEY

Budge, Mako Take Doubles Match in Play at Wimbledon.

WIMBLEDON, Eng., July 26 (AP)—Overcoming surprisingly stubborn resistance, Don Budge and Gene Mako whipped C. R. D. Turkey and F. H. D. Wilde in the doubles today, 6-3, 7-5, 7-9, 12-10, and gave the United States a 2-1 lead over Great Britain in the Davis cup challenge round with two more singles matches yet to be played.

With that one point advantage, American supporters now are confident Budge will whip Henry Wilford (Bunny) Austin in the final singles matches tomorrow for the clinching point even if Frankie Parker bows to Charles Edgar Hare in the opener.

Budge and Mako, the all-England champions and conquerors of Germany's crack combination of Gottfried von Cramm and Heinrich Henkel in the inter-zone finals, gave their followers many anxious moments and then today they finally pulled the doubles match out of the fire.

After sweeping through the first two sets in rapid style, the Californians appeared headed toward an easy triumph. But with the veteran Turkey performing brilliantly in support of the untied Wilde, the British came roaring back to win the third set and a 10-8 snatched the fourth as well.

By a strange quirk, Turkey captured every one of his service games until the 21st game of the fourth set. And when Budge and Mako broke through then, it spelled curtains for the British. Leading 11-10 then, Budge served a lover game in the 22nd game for set and match.

Kids of City Bound to Benefit Regardless of Tuesday's Bout Outcome

One hundred dollars.

That's what it's going to cost the one of two guys so unfortunate as to lose Tuesday night's main event wrestling match at the Klamath armory.

One hundred hard, cold dollars will be extracted, regardless of how it hurts, from the pocketbook of the loser. No paper deficit, no IOU's, no publicity gag cooked up merely to draw a crowd and then conveniently forgotten as soon as the match is over. The fellow who winds up on the bottom in Tuesday night's headline bout is actually going to have to fork over the cash, or Carl Cook and William Hallie and their recreation committee will know the reason why—and probably tell.

Frank Clemens, Indian paralysis specialist, and the Black Dragon, atrocity addit, are the two nuts who were reckless and extravagant enough to enter into the fool agreement.

The story is pretty common knowledge by now. The Dragon absorbed one of the few beatings he has ever experienced in a local ring when he tangled with Clemens last Tuesday night. His fate left him in a bitter and revengeful mood, and he immediately challenged his victor to a return match for \$100, the loser to cough up the dough.

Clemens accepted the deft, and Promoter Mack Lillard agreed with the stipulation that the prize money should go to the city recreation fund.

The way it stands now, neither wrestler can win anything extra but both are in a position to lose \$100.

What would you do in a case like that. Um hum. Well, \$100 is just a bit above the chicken feed category for the mean and mangle artists, too, and the chances are that they will react under the circumstances much as you just said you would.

Have a glance at a statistic or two. The lads who grapple in these parts work on a percentage, and the cut for each one averages around 10 per cent of the box office gross.

Week in and week out, army attendance averages about 1000, men, women and children, ringsters and galleryites, customers and hangers-on, and the gross "take" is in the neighborhood of \$500.

That means \$50 for each wrestler, \$50 here and, say, another \$50 in Medford, or about \$100 for the week's efforts.

And yet that's just the amount Clemens and the Dragon are betting on Tuesday night's match, with neither one standing a chance to collect a penny of the stakes even if he does win.
