SPECIALTIES GO UP; MANY LEADERS DRIFT

NEW YORK, July 27 (AP)—Merchandising and specialty issues pushed to the fore in today's stock market, while many recent leaders either stood still or drifted lower.

Retail store stocks apparently responded to signs that sales at present are running well ahead of last year, and that the worst of local tax legislation affecting this group has been seen.

Utilities tilted downward as the president called a conference of congressmen to discuss a government power and rate program. Motors and rails were backward, as were steels, although early declines of fractions to a point of more were reduced, cancelled or transformed in to modest advances in late dealings.

Trading was extremely slow from the start. There was a little pickup in activity in the final hour. Prices were well mixed at the close. Transfers were around 700,000 shares.

HIGH SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT BIDS SOUGHT

Bids on part of the Klamath Union high school extension program will be opened by the school board at its meeting, August 3.

Work on which bids are now being received includes:

Additions to the field house.

Alterations to janitor's cottage.

Erection of a roof over Modoc field bleachers.

The projects are included in a single bid. The field house addition must be completed by September 11, and the other projects by October 2.

Howard R. Perrin, architect, has prepared plans for the improvements, which are to be financed through a bond issue voted last month.

The issue totaled \$205,000. Other work, including the major part of the improvement program, will be done later.

PEDDLER ORDINANCE COURT TEST SEEN

Case of the city of Klamath Falls versus R. V. Morgan, local representative of the Fuller Brush company, has been continued until mid-August, according to Police Judge Otto Langset.

Morgan was charged with violating the city peddler's ordinance, and posted bail of \$25, when arrested last week.

His company will fight the case, and will send counsel here to defend Morgan next month.

The Fuller Brush company contends that the ordinance, known as the Greenriver ordinance, is to be interpreted by individual states, and plans to carry the local test case to the Oregon supreme court, according to word received by the police judge and City Attorney D. E. Van Vactor.

The company takes the stand that the ordinance cannot be enforced by a city unless it becomes a state law.

Clarence Everton, a magazine salesman, was arrested Monday on charges of violating the peddler's ordinance. He was assessed a fine of \$15, or sentenced to spend 12 1/2 days in city jail. Both fine and sentence were suspended by the police judge to allow him to leave the city at once.

FORGERY CHARGED TO TWO MEN
Forgery charges were filed Tuesday by the district attorney's office against Charles Shephardson and A. Finley, and arraignment was scheduled for late afternoon.

The pair was arrested at a local restaurant where they attempted to pass an allegedly fraudulent check. Complaint was signed by J. G. Linkenbach, arresting officer of the city police department. Shephardson and Finley are housed in the county jail.

GAMBLING HEARING SET THURSDAY
Hearing for James Pulver and Barney Barnes charged with operating gambling devices at the Embassy night club, has been set for Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock before Justice of the Peace W. B. Barnes.

Pulver and Barnes waived arraignment Tuesday. They are at liberty under bond.
