PORTLAND FIRM TO
WORK ON CAPITOL

PORTLAND, July 28 (AP)—Whitehead and Church, Portland architects, held the assignment to proposed additions to the state capitol buildings today.
The Portland firm was designated over four other Portland firms by the capitol reconstruction commission, which voted to retain the designers of the main capitol building to assure uniformity.
The firm must complete plans by November 1 for a single NEA building at a cost of from \$600,000 to \$700,000, to house the state library and additional office space, which will be rededicated to library uses when additional buildings are erected.
The commission authorized a fee of 6 per cent of the total cost, less about \$900 already paid the firm for plans already submitted.

ROSICRUCIAN EVENT
OF MUCH INTEREST

In the atmosphere of a physics laboratory, nature has taken to designing the patterns and color combinations of milady's gowns—and always in good taste.
Nearly one thousand Rosicrucians who attended the eighth annual Amore Rosicrucian convention in San Jose, Calif., concluded this month, watched this strange phenomenon, says Mrs. Ira P. Barr of Merrill, Ore., local member who has just returned from the convention.
Daily, says Mrs. Barr, delegates observed in the light laboratory of the order. Rays of sunlight from a heliostate (which moves so that the sun's beams may be reflected from it in a fixed position) enter mathematically adjusted prisms, when the ensuing colors were arranged according to their respective vibratory rates. The color harmony of the spectrum is most perfect, and a great variety of shades and hues can be had by a slight change of the angle of the prisms.
Each band of color is always in a natural relationship to all others. By the addition of refraction mirrors, the rays of sunlight form a magnificent array of geometrical patterns, pleasing to the eye and easily reproduced for commercial purposes.
The designs are infinite in number and entirely new to the fashion world. Textile manufacturers are turning to this method for a study of natural color harmony and symmetry.
The convention program included daily discourses on philosophic and scientific subjects in the Rosicrucian museum and auditorium.
It is related that nearly every state in the union, and province of Canada and several foreign countries were represented.
Important administrative matters included the election of nine grand councilors of the philosophic order, representing as many different sections of North America.

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STEEL LEADS
DECLINE AFTER
SHORT RALLY

NEW YORK, July 28 (AP)—Caught in cross currents of selling, the stock market yielded fractions to one or more points today.
U. S. Steel, the pace-setter, led a late decline, dropping around two points after an earlier short-lived rally. General Motors also turned in a heavy-footed performance, falling more than a point.
Earnings reports of both companies, issued after Tuesday's close, provided the key to action of the shares, brokers said.
Some said offerings of steel reflected traders' disappointment. No action was taken by directors on the common. Others attributed the recession to "selling on favorable news." The corporation's second quarter net was best since 1929.
Failure of General Motors to report a gain in earnings despite increased business brought selling to this issue, it was said.
For a time around mid-day, aviation and metal shares found friends, but later they were left to shift for themselves.
Transactions for the session approximated 900,000 shares.

WAR SCARE SENDS
WHEAT PRICES UP

CHICAGO, July 28 (AP)—With considerable buying based on war developments in the east, wheat prices late today scored a maximum upturn of 41 cents a bushel. A majority of wheat handlers, however, indicated that there had been relatively little new export business in North American wheat today, for the time being. Europeans apparently refused to follow price upturns, and bulges in values applied chiefly to July contracts in which speculative dealings ended today.
At the close, wheat was unchanged to 41 cents higher, July \$1.22-1.24; September \$1.18-1.19; December \$1.20-1.21; corn 23c off to 10c up, September 97-97 1/2c; December 72c, and oats at 1c down to 1c advance.
