

FAIR ANGLER CATCHES 'EM AT BIG LAVA

As fine a catch of Eastern brook trout as has been seen in these parts in many a day was displayed at The Herald and News office by Mrs. Floyd Woodworth, 2033 Del Moro street.

Mrs. Woodworth made her marvelous catch at Big Lava lake. The back shop fellows at the newspaper office, who are just about the last authorities on fishing, gathered around and shed no end about Mrs. Woodworth's trout.

And did she do it with worms? No sir, Mrs. Woodworth caught 'em on a black gnat No. 10 fly.

She did it right in the face of a number of male fishermen, who crowded their boats close to hers when they witnessed her luck. And they just couldn't do so well, either.

Most of the successful fishing at Big Lava lake is being done with spinners and worms.

One party of Klamath men got the limit on the Deschutes river, Sunday. The fine catch made up for the scare they got from lightning, which hit a snag a few feet from their boat.

Reports are that Diamond lake is coming back strong after a mid-season lull in fishing. Trolling deep with spinner and worms has brought some exceptionally large catches. Fly fishing is reported good on adjacent creeks.

Jay's lake fly fishing appears pretty good on the basis of reports from up that way. One day the limit is taken, the next day it's tough to get one fish. Bucktail caddis is reported to be the preferred fly.

Nice catches are still being made in Elk and Mud lake. Crescent lake fishermen report some large ones taken out.

Evening fly fishing on East lake is bringing results. On some days a black hackle is preferred; on others a royal dows the trick. Nice catches are being made at Paulina, deep trolling.

"FLYING AUTOS" NEARLY READY

The world's first "flying automobile" will be demonstrated to America this summer by Studebaker, according to Ralph McCall, Studebaker dealer.

Five "flying automobiles," contraptions that may be driven upon the highways and actually flown in the air, have been purchased by the Studebaker corporation, and will be "toured" and demonstrated in every principal city during the late summer. The vehicles are Waterman Arrowwheels, powered with Studebaker Dictator motors and manufactured in Santa Monica, Calif.

The "flying automobile" has regular wings which may be detached in less than three minutes and left at the airport hangar while the pilot switches his engine's power from propeller to wheels and takes to the highways. While on the streets and boulevards the propeller does not revolve, the two rear wheels of the vehicle being supplied with both forward and reverse power and equipped with brakes.

PICKETS KEPT FROM INTERFERING WITH LOG RAFTS

VANCOUVER, Wash., July 28 (AP)—Visiting Judge W. E. Campbell continued until next Tuesday a temporary order restraining pickets from interfering with the log rafts of the Brattle Bros. mill at Ridgefield, but struck off the names of all but three of a long list of defendants.

The court held that the plaintiffs failed to show that the union or any of the defendants with the exception of Archie Campbell, Homer Matthews and E. Kilkelly had engaged in the picketing.

Meanwhile the mill remained closed. Its rafts were understood to be held up by towboat pickets on the Oregon side of the Columbia river.

The temporary order applied only to Clark county waters.

STATE FILES SHOW TRAILER INCREASE

SALEM, Ore., July 28 (UP)—Registration fees of trailers in the state during 1936 amounted to \$49,268.39. It was reported from the secretary of state's office this week.

Logging trailer licenses totaled \$13,557.55 last year, to lead other registrations.

A total of 4553 trailers was licensed by the state last year, although there were many in addition to that number as two-wheeled trailers equipped with pneumatic tires, weighing not over 750 pounds and carrying a load of less than 1000 pounds are not required to be licensed.

RECREATION SURVEY ON IN OREGON

PORTLAND, July 28 (Special)—The nation-wide recreational study announced recently by Secretary of the Interior Harold I. Ickes, is under way for Oregon. The national park services with offices at 712 Spaulding building, Portland, is directing the work.

An act of the 74th congress authorizing a recreational study on a national scale is permanent legislation and its results will likewise be permanent in effect. The study, Secretary Ickes said, is the most far-reaching of its kind ever attempted in the United States.

Governor Charles H. Martin accepted Secretary Ickes' offer to cooperate in this undertaking and called attention to a long time program of state recreational development formulated by the Oregon state parks commission.

This undertaking is an outgrowth of emergency conservation work cooperation between the federal government and the states through which hundreds of state park and recreation areas have been extended and developed by the civilian conservation corps since 1933.

Using emergency funds, the national park service has set up under its branch of recreational planning and state cooperation a basic organization for initiating the study.

It is the hope of the national park service to enlist the assistance of the Oregon state planning board and other state, private and federal agencies concerned with planning for present and future recreational development.

In Oregon the study will include (1) the gathering of data relating to existing parks and facilities, (2) a study of social, industrial and population trends, (3) an inventory of potential park, parkway and recreational areas, and (4) a formulation of definite plans and recommendations for meeting the present and future recreational needs of the people, covering further development of existing areas, legislation, finance, administration and maintenance.

The study, it was emphasized, will have immense value in connection with emergency conservation work activities in that it provides for planning to produce master development programs for 20 to 30 years in the various states. This procedure, it was pointed out, is in line with President Roosevelt's plan for a national program for recreation.

It was further emphasized, now that there is a definite authority for a closer cooperation between the federal government and the several states, that it is expected state and local park, parkway and recreational-area planning will receive greater consideration and that the work will be systematized and correlated on a state, regional and nationwide basis.

BIDS ON LASSEN PARK ROAD OPENED

Bids totalling nearly one million dollars were opened today by the federal bureau of public roads for road and bridge construction in Shasta county, California.

Low bidders on the grading of a portion of the Lassen Volcanic park — Mt. Shasta City highway were: A. Telcher and Son, Inc., Sacramento, \$112,555.90; E. L. Gates, Trail, Ore., \$114,662.50; and Hemstreet and Bell, Marysville, Cal., \$115,459.76.

The low bidder on construction of a bridge across Lake Britton reservoir as a part of the highway, was C. J. Montag and Son, Portland, Ore., with a bid of \$191,222. Other bidders were: A. Telcher and Son, Inc., Sacramento, \$199,554.50 and the Wickes Engineering and Construction company, Des Moines, Iowa, \$205,939.

ROGUE FOREST TO BE ENLARGED

WASHINGTON, July 28 (AP)—A bill signed Tuesday by President Roosevelt will add several hundred acres of Oregon and California grant land to the Rogue River national forest in Oregon.

The secretaries of interior and agriculture will appraise the land, and an amount equal to its value will be transferred by the treasury from national forest receipts to the land grant funds of the two states.

INQUIRIES ARRIVE FROM MANY POINTS

SALEM, Ore., July 28 (UP)—Requests for information on Oregon's scenic and recreational attractions this year have been received at the tourist and travel information bureau of the state highway department from every state in the union and 20 foreign countries.

Since January 1, more than 41,000 inquiries have been received, and the department is still being flooded with such letters in a volume of 200 or 300 a day.

Highway officials said tourist travel in Oregon this summer would set a new record. Out-of-state automobile registration in the first six months of 1937 had already totaled 52,000, over 20 per cent more than was reported in the first half of 1936.

Crater Lake National park already has set an early-season record of 75,000 visitors. It was reported by David Canfield, park superintendent.

Complete records for the Oregon Caves were not available, but George C. Sabin, manager of the resort, reported 1142 persons trekked through the caves over the Fourth of July, breaking the previous day's record high.

BRIDGES REGARDED SERIOUS HAZARD

SALEM, Ore., July 28 (UP)—Structural spans, or bridges, are considered among the most hazardous driving places in the state, a survey drawn by the secretary of state's office showed.

"Be doubly careful as you drive across bridges in the state" is the warning sounded by traffic accident figures for the first five months of 1937.
