The Pacific Coast baseball league will be a one-team circuit next season, says Branch Rickey, head of the St. Louis Cardinals, owners of the Sacramento Solons.

Rickey said today the 1938 Sacramento team would be the most colorful in Coast league history and would be a pennant winner by the widest margin. He didn't mention the fact the second place Solons dropped a pair to Los Angeles last night, 4 to 0 and 3 to 5. Bill Klepper, blustering boss of the Seattle ball club, suspended outfielder Bill Lawrence indefinitely for "playing indifferently" after the San Diego Padres increased their league leadership with a 13 to 2 win over the Tribe. Klepper promised more suspensions "to put some bustle in the team."

Oakland won a smashing 10 to 3 victory from the San Francisco Seals who yesterday learned they would lose the services of Pitcher-Shortstop-Third Baseman Gene Lillard. He has been recalled by the Chicago Cubs.

The Missions kept Portland out of third place by blanking them 3 to 0.

Hefty Stew Boien of the Missions limited the Beavers to three hits and allowed only two runners to get as far as third base. Shortstop Joe Vitter of the Reds made an effort to tie a unique record.

Except for Ducky Wucky Medwick, who hasn't changed a bit from the villain role, the rough, tough and nasty boys from the other side of the railroad tracks appear to have become a bunch of empty baas.

To be sure, they can still knock over those perennial pushovers, the Dodgers and Phillies, perpetual second division lads, but when they come up against the big boys, or even the up-and-coming Boston Red Sox, the aspiring Cincinnati Reds, the Gas House gang has become just a mild breeze. In fact, without Dirty (Sore Toes) Dean there isn't enough pitching and pep to get a rise even out of themselves.

Joe DiMaggio Credited for Yank Showing This Season

NEW YORK, July 29 (UPI)—The Yankees are away out in front in the American league despite a sharp decline in their play during last week.

Injuries riddled their ranks their pitching faded in and their defense resembled a choice slab of Swiss cheese. What held them up then?

The answer—Joe DiMaggio, sophomore center fielder and the year's greatest player. His only serious rival is Joe Medwick, St. Louis Cardinals' slashing outfielder, but most baseball critics agree that even he must take off his cap to DiMaggio.

During the last two weeks when DiMaggio performed some of the greatest catches ever seen in the American league and hit at better than 400-gall, three American league managers got aboard the DiMaggio bandwagon with the highest praise ever paid a second-year player.

Joe McCarthy, Yanks' pilot who's been having plenty of troubles lately, but none with DiMaggio, said:

"For my money DiMaggio is the player of the year. I don't know what we would have done without him."

That's a high compliment but Joe Cronin, Red Sox manager, topped it when he said:

"Any one of four clubs would win the American league pennant if they had DiMaggio. I think either the Red Sox, White Sox, Tigers or Indians would win

Coaches Agree to Let Substitutions Go Without Listing

CHAMPAIGN, Ill., July 29 (AP)—A gentlemen's agreement between rival coaches will relieve the umpire of the Notre Dame-Illinois game this year of the task of recording substitutions.

Coaches Elmer Layden and Bob Zuppke said today that under the agreement each would assume responsibility for the legality of his substitutions. The plan follows a recommendation by the rules committee to speed up play.

A suggestion by Layden that the idea be tried, when Illinois and Notre Dame play for the first time since 1898 on October 3 met with enthusiastic approval by Zuppke.

Substitutes will report to the umpire as usual but the official will not be obliged to list their names and keep tab on how many times they have been in and out of the game.
