Trophy Winners Promise They'll Be Back Next Year.

LONDON, July 30 (AP)—The Davis cup went west today. The tall, red-haired boy who won it, Donald Budge, carried it aboard the train at Waterloo station and started it back to its original home in the United States. A great crowd jammed the platform and Budge and his doubles partner Gene Mako, held up the cup for folks to see until they couldn't hold it up any longer. Bryan (Bitter) Grant, lost in the crowd, impatiently wished the train to be on its way bearing him back to his native Georgia. Budge Gets Kissed "We've certainly been treated royally," he exclaimed, "but, boy! I'd certainly like to see Peachtree street, Atlanta, again." Budge, whose singles and doubles play was given credit for taking the famous tennis trophy away from the British, was the real center of attraction. Old ladies pressed through the crowd to kiss the embarrassed Californian full on the lips. Solon gentlemen with whiskers shook hands and declared "We've never had a more worthy champion."

AMERICA'S CUP RACE SATURDAY

Vanderbilt and Sopwith Drill Crews for Opening Contest.

NEWPORT, R. I., July 30 (AP)—Shortly before starting time Harold S. Vanderbilt decided not to enter Ranger, the sloop he will take against T. O. M. Sopwith's second British challenger Endeavor II tomorrow, in today's concluding race of the Eastern Yacht club cruise. Vanderbilt's change in plans, however, did not mean shore leave or rest for his racing crew, for instead he put Ranger under canvas to try out some new sails. Sopwith also went out in Endeavor II to drill his crew against tomorrow's opening race of the four out of seven international match. Three previously unsuccessful contenders for the famous trophy were left in the final contest scheduled by the Eastern. Entries were Gerard B. Lambert's Yankee, and Chandler Hovey's Rainbow. NEWPORT, R. I., July 30 (AP)—Two women who will be aboard the competing yachts during the America's cup races off Newport were the best of friends today—on land. Gertrude Vanderbilt—she will sail for the first time in an international cup race on her husband's Ranger Saturday, keeping the log—chatted gayly last night with Phyllis Sopwith, who will be at her husband's side when the race starts, holding a stop-watch. It will be the first time in the history of the great yacht match that two women have helped their husbands compete for the title. Genial Tom Sopwith, whose Endeavor II is the challenger, scoffed at the tradition that a woman is bad luck on a racing yacht. His beautiful blonde wife who will be his time-keeper this year, was beside him at the wheel in the same spot at the last cup races three years ago. In 1934, Harold Stirling Vanderbilt's bride of a year watched him win the \$5-year-old silver trophy from an auxiliary yacht.

SAN DIEGO HAS 3-GAME LEAD

Seattle Indians Beaten Again; Beavers Split With Missions.

San Diego held a full three-game lead in the Pacific Coast baseball league Friday after handing the Seattle Indians their third setback in as many days as second-place Sacramento lost its fourth straight game to Los Angeles. The Padres capitalized on a brace of Seattle errors to win, 4 to 1. They scored two runs in the seventh with two men out when Outfielder Jerry Donovan dropped a fly ball and picked up two more in the eighth with the aid of another misplay. Homers by Bob Hargrave and Marvin Gudat and two-baggers by Hargrave and Steve Mesner featured the Angels' 7 to 2 victory over the Solons. Third-place San Francisco Seals with the aid of a pair of homers overcame a five-run Oakland lead to win, 7 to 5. Portland easily won, 7 to 3, from the San Francisco Missions and then dropped a heart-breaking seven-inning affair 3 to 0 when the Missions scored three runs in the second inning without making a hit. A batter, hit by a pitched ball, a sacrifice, a fly and errors by Shortstop Davey Lee and Pitcher Bill Poeschel accounted for the runs. The Missions made their scores when Roy Mort was hit by a pitched ball. Poeschel then walked Joe Sprina. Steve Barash sacrificed to Poeschel who threw to third in an unsuccessful attempt to catch Mort. Barash was safe at first. Lee then batted. Pitcher Johnny Bahch's grounder and Mort and Sprina romped home. Joe Vitter filed to deep left field and Barash scored. The Heavers landed on Pitcher Leroy Herzmann and Wayne Osborn for 18 hits, including a double and four singles by Manager Bill Sweeney in six times at bat in the first game. Ad Liska limited the Missions to nine hits.

Allison Weary as He Wins Seabright Sets From Shields

SEABRIGHT, N. J., July 30 (AP)—If Wilmer Allison's battered body can stand the strain of one more match, the former U. S. tennis singles champion may return to Texas with the Seabright bowl added to his string of comeback conquests. Allison literally dragged himself into the locker room after defeating Frank X. Shields, the former Davis cup star of Hollywood, Cal., yesterday in the semi-final of the U. S. tennis and Cridget club's 50th annual invitation tournament. Allison's greater tournament experience and superior net play enabled him to topple Shields, but only after a bitter duel, 1-6, 6-4, 5-6, 6-1, 7-5. Today's feature match pitted blonde Alice Marble of Los Angeles against her European nemesis, stocky Jadwiga Jedzejowska, Polish net queen, in the final of the women's singles. Allison's opponent in the title round Saturday will be youthful Bobby Riggs of Los Angeles, who yesterday eliminated the last foreign threat from the men's division as he turned back Jiro Yamagishi, Japanese national champion, in another marathon semi-final, 6-4, 3-6, 6-1, 2-6, 6-3.
