Governor Urges Doubling Output of Fish Hatcheries

MARSHFIELD, July 31 (AP)—Governor Charles Martin urged members of the state game commission here to make Oregon a "sportsmen's paradise," and double its fish hatchery output in 1938.

Recommending that 70,000,000 fingerlings and 100,000 pheasants be liberated in 1938, the governor said that "such an attraction will bring us thousands of tourists."

"Tourists have money to spend with us. But we must remember that the tourist who races through our state at 70 miles an hour isn't the one who spends the money," he said.

The governor is accompanying members of the commission on a three-day inspection of game farms and hatcheries.

Farr in Peculiar Position As Result British Decision

LONDON, July 31 (AP)—The British board of boxing control emerged from a lengthy conference today to announce that it had decided to recognize the Tommy Farr-Joe Louis bout "as the final elimination contest for the world heavyweight championship." The winner, the solons decided, would have to meet Max Schmeling for the crown.

Farr, the Welsh holder of the British empire title, meets Louis in New York, August 24.

In the opinion of the British board, Jimmy Braddock forfeited his claim to the heavyweight championship by refusing to meet Schmeling and therefore wasn't titleholder when he was knocked out by Louis in Chicago. The board regards Louis as "American champion."

By this decision, the board has left Farr in a peculiar position should he succeed in whipping Louis. In that case the Welshman would be recognized as world's champion in the United States but simply as American champion in Great Britain.

Batsmen Have Big Week in Majors; Travis Headliner

NEW YORK, July 31 (AP)—Batsmen found a "Hitters' Heaven" in the big leagues this week, with the top ten in each league undergoing a major shake-up, headlined by Cecil Travis of the Senators, who took the American league lead away from Lou Gehrig, of New York.

Eight of the ten leaders in each circuit hit for .400 or better during the seven day period ended with yesterday's games. All 20 travelled at better than a 200 clip.

Travis, hitting .450 with 15 hits in 40 chances, boosted his mark 14 points to .376 for the season and climbed from a tie for second into the American league lead. At the same time, Gehrig also was climbing better than .400 and wound up the week with a .373 season average for second place.

Ducky Medwick, still setting the pace for both loops with a .463 average, dropped seven points despite a close-to-349 mark for the week.

Heaviest hitter for the seven-day stretch was Charley Gehringer, Detroit's classy second-baseman, who belted the ball at a .522 clip to make his season average .350, which gave him fifth place in the American league. Others among the week's wallpapers were Joe Vosmik, Browns, with 7-for-33 for the seven-day span; Billy Herman, Cubs, with 11-for-22.

Mt. Shasta Battle Sunday Crucial for Team Here

With two regular league games left in the Northern California circuit before the play-off opens, the Klamath Falls Red Sox take on the sparkling Mt. Shasta City Athletic club at Modoc field Sunday afternoon in an attempt to maintain the one game lead they hold in first place.

Mt. Shasta has had a long winning streak, in fact has suffered no defeats since signing Bobby Joyce, former Coast league hurler for Los Angeles, along with Charley Currin, fiery catcher. The Red Sox, looking ahead to the tough Redding game on August 5th, find it very necessary to win Sunday to avoid possibility of a tie for first position in the league.

Anything can happen this weekend to the league standings. With the Weed Sons of Italy, now in second spot, taking on the fast Redding Tigers in Weed, several changes in the league may be seen by Sunday evening.

It is beginning to look like a pitching duel between Joyce and Carlstrom as the old feud is resumed anew on Sunday. Carlstrom hurled heavy eight-hit ball for thirteen innings at Mt. Shasta in a previous tilt only to lose when his team-mates faltered behind him.

Joyce, possessing a world of control and a sharp breaking low curve, has been having his way pretty well in the league but the Red Sox sluggers have every intention of running him to the showers before the fray is over.

Earl Brooks will be back on second after missing a game and Cliff Molatore will also be back in uniform. Molatore has been out of the lineup for several weeks with a broken hand. Roy Wheeler, who suffered a knee injury during July 4th, will be on shortstop for Sunday's game and reports his condition okay.

"Amazing" Sanders stated Friday that although Joyce and Currin form a very smart battery, he is sure the Red Sox sluggers can come through for a win if they get out and play real ball which he is sure they will do. Sanders will no doubt start Carlstrom on the mound with Grainger doing the receiving.

President Lloyd Noble and Secretary Tom Ball of the Northern California league will be on hand to witness Sunday's battle. Both saw the 13-inning battle in Mt. Shasta some weeks ago and do not intend to miss another fray between these two clubs.

The Red Sox want revenge. This is the talk that is heard around the players' camp each day. "Get Bobby Joyce out of there" is the most frequent expression and no doubt each Sox slugger will be up there Sunday with every intention of doing just that. With Bernadon and Donaldson both coming through in recent games for several base hits, the hitting power of the local team has increased and it is hard to find a weak spot as Joyce will find out Sunday.

PADRES LOSE BUT GAIN ALSO

Los Angeles Cracks Second Place Solons to Help San Diego

By The Associated Press Despite a break in their winning stride, the San Diego Padres hold an added margin in the Coast league leadership today, thanks to Los Angeles.

While Seattle's heavy-hitting Mike Hunt was lambasting the Padres into a 6 to 1 defeat, the Angels came to the rescue of their southern neighbors by taking a double-header from the league's second place Sacramento Senators.

The Angels won the first game 6 to 2 in twelve innings and capped the second 4 to 0. Jack Salomon allowed only two hits in the second, his first start after his arm was hurt a month ago.

Oakland clouted San Francisco's Seals 19 to 5 in a wild comedy of hits and errors and the lowly Missions handed Portland a 5 to 2 defeat.

Hunt, the league's home-run king, collected his 24th and 25th circuit clouts of the season to stop the Padres, who had won three straight over Seattle.

Rip Russell poled out a homer for Los Angeles and Nick Calipetro drove one over the fence for Sacramento in the nocturnal double-bill in the south. The two wins increased the Angels record to six straight over the Senators.

Oakland gathered 24 hits off pitcher Sheehan and Dito as the eastbay sluggers humbled the Seals. Both teams hobbled the ball frequently and many fans lost track of the errors. The conservative official count was six—two by the Seals and four by the Oaks. The Seals held down their errors by keeping out of the way of the ball.

Max West's triple off Hobo Carsons in the fifth inning with two men on was the main factor in the Missions' win over Portland.

MOTORS, STEEL GIVE LIFT TO STOCK LISTS

NEW YORK, July 31 (AP)—Slow but persistent buying in motors and steel provided the stock market with lifting power in today's final July session.

While the ticker tape joggled along indifferently most of the time, gains of fractions to more than two points were pinned on the favorites.

Profit taking was present in a few sectors, but leaders finished not far from their tops.

With Ford announcing boosts in automobile prices to offset increased labor and material costs, thus paving the way for advances by other manufacturers, both General Motors and Chrysler were well out in front from the start.

Steels responded to brighter earnings and production prospects. Farm implements, oils and aviation were bid up on reports of larger demand in both fields. Utilities and rails, while not buoyant, generally held their own.

Transfers were around 300,000 shares.

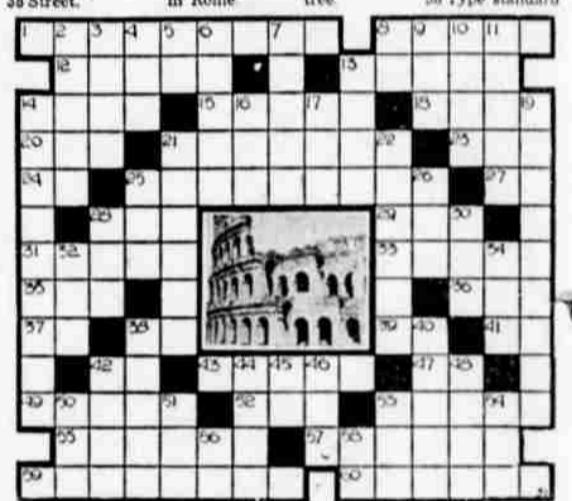
