**SILVER LAKE LAMB
PRICE EIGHT CENTS**

SILVER LAKE, July 31 (AP)—Eight cents a pound for wether lambs was paid by Carl Holland, Columbus, Ohio, who contracted with the 21st division, returning from France as a lieutenant colonel in the adjutant general's department as division adjutant of that division.

Well out in front in the annual scramble to contract Lake county's lamb crop of approximately 75,000 head, Holland represents the Eastern Buying company.

The lambs were contracted for delivery in September, when they will be shipped to Ohio for winter feeders. Lamb owners are holding the ewe lambs in expectation of a better price.

Many of these lambs will be trucked to Bend or to Beal, 60 miles, the nearest railroad stations, in huge, two-decker trucks which can haul about 175 head at a load. Owners have found this method to have many advantages over the old way of trailing them from 60 to 80 miles through heat and scarcity of feed, causing much loss of weight.

FOOD MEETING HELD
IN ALTAMONT SCHOOL

The food preservation meeting held in the Altamont domestic science room and conducted by Mrs. Theilma Mitchell opened at 10:00 a. m. with registration of those present. During the morning session there was discussion of food spoilage and right ways of food preserving.

A demonstration of canning peas by pressure cooker method; the hot water method of canning berries or small fruits; also the open kettle method for peaches, pears, or tomatoes was presented, suit one's own personal tastes.

At noon a potluck luncheon was enjoyed by all those present.

The afternoon session was on the uses and advantages of using tin cans to can in and a demonstration of canning beans in a tin can in a pressure cooker and showing the time saved without loss of shrinkage or breakage. A discussion of problems of canning in this altitude and the latest method of food preservation by the frozen pack method which is new in the field of food preservation was also held.

The purpose of this meeting was to see if the women of the community would be interested in having a home demonstration agent in the county, this being the second meeting on home demonstration work being held at Altamont this year. Those in charge of making arrangements were Mrs. Bert Schultz, Mrs. John Schubert and Mrs. A. G. Morrison. About 25 women attended the day's sessions. **CARL GRAY, JR.,
HEADS OMAHA LINE**

ST. PAUL, Minn., July 31 (AP)—Carl R. Gray, Jr., who said he tried to "swim himself away" from the railway business, took over the main throttle of the Omaha line today, continuing the Gray family succession to high executive posts in the industry.

The new executive vice-president of the Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis and Omaha railway, is the son and namesake of the president of the Union Pacific after 54 years in the business. Gray, Sr., has been president of the Union Pacific 17 years.

During the son's 13 years of "swimming"—1915 to 1928—he had a fling at the mail order business, banking and coal and ice dealing. Fred W. Sargent, president of the North Western line, prevailed upon him to return to his first love as industrial department manager of the North Western and Omaha roads.

In 1929 Gray was promoted to vice-president and general manager of the Omaha. His next step was the executive vice-presidency placing him in charge of all Omaha operations. He will retain headquarters here.
