GAY NEW MODES FEATURE COLOR AND NOVELTIES

NEW YORK—From Santa Fe and the colorful southwest comes the kind of gay togs that are splendid among backgrounds of blue sea, country lanes, vacation camps or mountain cabins. Even the most active of active sportswomen can't stay in slacks and shorts all the time, so such items as faded blue denim swaggers and bright bandana prints are important in any set of holiday luggage.

Alice Evans, Santa Fe designer, brought her collection to New York and delighted fashionists with a faded blue denim suit which includes a skirt, a sweater with raglan sleeves, and a sporty shirt, made from printed bandanas such as cowboys like. Stitching on coat and skirt matches the bandana blouse. The buttons are silver, hand beaten by the Indians.

For a really lovely spectator sports dress, Miss Evans uses two huge bandanas—one for the pleated skirt, the other for the tucked-in blouse. Both are cut so the border is emphasized around hemline, waist, collar, cuffs and down the front. This would be just the thing to slip on for dinner after a day on the mountain or an afternoon in the surf.

Another—a bit more dressy and correct for lunch in the suburbs or afternoon bridge at the country club—consists of white dress in heavy silk crepe, trimmed with sash and collar to match the pet, short-sleeved bandana bolero. Stitching on the gored skirt is sunset orange, the background color of the print.
