

Red Sox Rally To Defeat Mt. Shasta Club

KLAMATH TEAM STAYS ON TOP

Joyce Hit on Head by Pitched Ball, Forced Out of Game

Coming from behind in a fourth inning rally to tie the score and then forge on ahead, the league-leading Klamath Falls Red Sox defeated the Mt. Shasta City Athletic club 9-6 in a hard-fought battle on Modoc field Sunday afternoon, maintaining the top spot in the Northern California league.

Clyde Carlstrom, Klamath's curve ball artist, starting on the mound, appeared quite wild the first two innings. Bobby Joyce, star hurler for the visitors, was hit in the head by a fast ball pitch, the first time up, injuring him to the extent that he was forced from the game. Crisp, Mt. Shasta shortstop, also was hit by a pitched ball in the eventful opening frames, but was not injured.

Mt. Shasta touched Carlstrom for three hits and three runs in the initial inning, and came back in the second to get two more base knocks and score once. In the fourth, the California sluggers cracked out two more for a single score, making the count 5-1 for the visitors.

Klamath sluggers, rallying in the fourth, pounded out five base hits off Adecock, Mt. Shasta hurler, who replaced Joyce in the first frame, scoring four runs and tying the game up 5-5.

With Carlstrom now settled down to some outstanding hurling, Mt. Shasta scored but once more during the frame, a lone tally in the eighth, when the visitors found him for three safeties. The Red Sox made the most of a lucky seventh spree, getting five hits off Adecock and scoring three runs, the final count being 9-6 at the end of the contest.

Carlstrom, the winning pitcher, allowed eleven hits, struck out seven Mt. Shasta batters, and walked but one man.

"Hammy" Hammericksen was the slugging sensation of the afternoon, hitting safely four times in five trips to the plate. Bernado brought the crowd to its feet with a homer into deep right-center, scoring two ahead of him, when runs were badly needed by the local Red Sox.

Peterson, former University of California baseball player, led the Mt. Shasta sluggers with three hits in four times up. M. Barney, outfielder for the visitors, was credited with two safeties off the slants of Carlstrom.

One of the largest crowds of the season was on hand for the fray, including many visitors from Mt. Shasta City. Lloyd Noble, president, and Tom Ball, secretary of the Northern California league, were both on hand for the contest.

Next Sunday, Manager "Red" Sanders pilots his Red Sox gang to Redding for the last league game before the grand play-off. Many Klamath fans are planning on making the trip also.

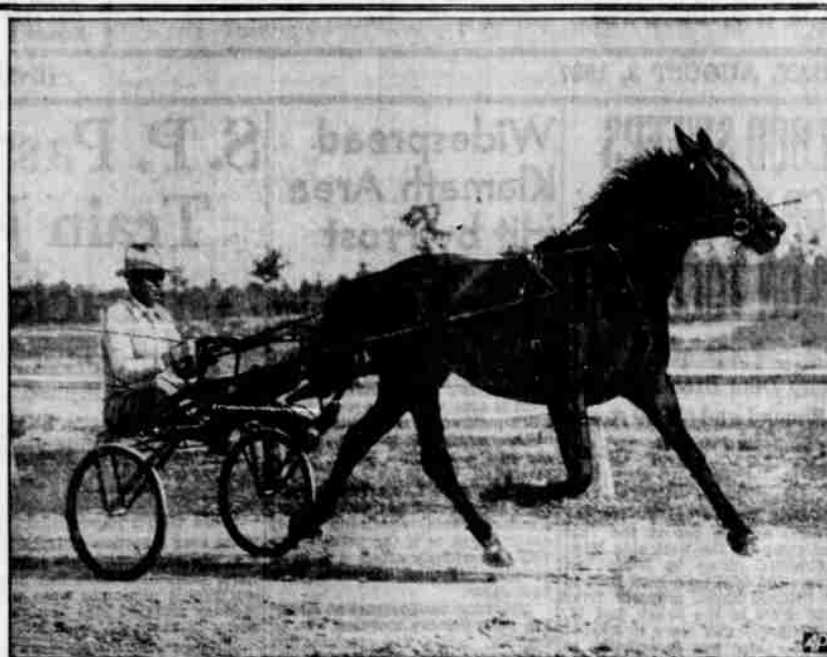

National League Pitching Arms Go Sour; Dean and Mungo Make Dismal Showing

A few weeks ago each of them could have attracted bids in six figures on the ivory trading market as possessors of baseball's currently greatest "slopboners"; Monday, they look as washed up, at least temporarily, as the week's laundry.

Representing half a million dollars or more in pitching arms to the Giants, Cards and Dodgers, the "Slop-Toss" Dean, Carl (Metticket) Hubbell and the (toss)less Van Mungo are as sour as a barrel of pickles right now in the National league, where they used to knock 'em dead.

The recent failures of this set of flingers, touted far and wide as the absolute tops and chief point in the argument that the National league has it all over the American in pitching, was the big talking point of the baseball business today. It overshadowed even the runaway Cubs, with a six-game lead, are starting to make of the National league chase, and the impending Yankee-White Sox series for the American league laurels.

Mungo, ailing since just before the all-star game, hasn't pitched since July 15. In the hopes it would help, he has had his tonsils yanked. Hubbell hasn't won a game since July 18. In his last three starts, he lasted just six innings against the Cubs and three against the Cards, and, on Friday, was belted again by the Cubs.

Dean's dismal doings date also to the all-star game. A battered drive bounced off one of Denny's big toes that day, and the great one is now a well-liked "cousin" to opposition batters. He hasn't won a game since July 4. Yesterday, against his perennial pushovers, the Brooklyn Dodgers, he lasted only through the sixth and was tagged with a 7-3 whipping in a doubleheader opener. The Cards came back to take the nightcap, 7-1, behind Lon Warneke, but that didn't make Dean look any better.

"I'm not right," he wailed afterward. "I shouldn't be pitching. My arm's sore and I can't follow through at all."

Seattle blanked the Padres 5 to 0 in the first, but then dropped the seven inning nightcap, 9 to 2.

Two home runs by Johnny Vazquez and another by Joe Oregon paved the way for Sacramento's only win of its Los Angeles series in the first game Sunday. The score was 10 to 2. In the nightcap the Angels won, 5 to 4, despite a homer by Art Garibaldi of the Solons.

Sad Sam Gibson, leading hurler of the Seals and the league, was honored by fans and the Seals management Sunday. Everyone but the Oaks were kind to Sam. Wee Willie Ludolph limited the Seals to one run, and that one by Sam.

The San Francisco Missions surprised everyone, including themselves by taking their series with Portland, five games out of eight. They shared a pair with the Beavers Sunday. They lost the opener, 4 to 1, but won the second, 7 to 1, with the aid of homers by Max West, Pitcher Walter Beck and Joe Vitter.

DUCK SEASON TO BE 30 DAYS

Regulations to Be Same As Those in Last Two Years.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2 (AP)—Duck hunters will have a 30-day season this fall, with the same rigid regulations of the last two years.

The daily bag and possession limit on geese and brant was raised from four to five in rules announced yesterday, but that on ducks was kept at 10.

Baiting of waterfowl and doves and the use of live decoys are prohibited and the 3-shell limit on repeating shotguns was retained.

The northern zone season on ducks, geese, Wilson's snipe and coot opens Oct. 9 and closes Nov. 7. In the intermediate zone the season is Nov. 1 to Nov. 30, and in the southern zone, Nov. 27 to Dec. 26.
