

SEVERAL HURT IN ACCIDENTS HERE SUNDAY

Four accidents were reported at the Klamath county sheriff's office over the past weekend.

Mrs. O. B. Armstrong of Los Angeles is at the Hillside hospital with an arm injury as the result of an accident on the Dallas-California highway Sunday, in which the Armstrong car, which was going north, was sideswiped by a car driven by Eva Davis, The Dallas, according to the report of Mr. Armstrong, driver of one of the machines.

One of the passengers in the Davis car suffered a slight leg injury.

The accident, which occurred south of Klamath Falls on the Sun mountain grade, took place when the Davis car, coming around a curve, hit loose gravel and skidded, striking the Armstrong car at a right angle, Armstrong's report stated.

Armstrong is postal supervisor at Los Angeles. He returned to Klamath Falls to give his wife medical attention.

Margaret Isaac, Duval, Chiloquin, struck the rear end of a bus driven by Leo E. Owens at the railroad crossing near Modoc Point on the Dallas-California highway Saturday. The bus had stopped for the railroad crossing.

Mrs. Peter N. Gray, 19, was injured when the Gray car, driven by her husband, Fort Klamath truck driver, struck a car driven by E. E. Triplett, Klamath Falls logger, near El Nido tavern at the Lakeview junction south of Klamath Falls Saturday night. Triplett was backing out from a parking space into the highway when the collision took place, the report stated.

Mrs. George Krauss, Algoma, received arm injuries in a traffic collision Saturday night on the Lakeview highway near Altamont bridge. Mrs. Krauss had stopped her car in traffic, when a car driven by J. L. Fotheringham, Merrill, ran into the rear end of the Krauss car. Geraldine Fotheringham, 21, who was riding in the Fotheringham car, had a slightly injured leg, it was reported.

**NUMEROUS ARRESTS

KLAMATH INDIANS HURT IN ACCIDENT

Two persons sustained undetermined injuries in a car crash Sunday afternoon two miles above Park Headquarters near the Crater lake rim village. Russell Barkley, Gertrude Barkley and Celia Jeggerson, Indians of Sprague River on the Klamath reservation received numerous cuts and bruises. A roadster in which they were riding plunged over a 40 foot bank rolling over twice and coming to rest on its wheels.

Miss Barkley, sister of Russell Barkley, driver, appeared to be the most seriously injured. She was taken on a stretcher to the park hospital for emergency treatment. Later in the afternoon an ambulance removed her to a Klamath Falls hospital.

A car driven by A. Manary, Seattle, went over the grade on the north entrance highway to Crater lake, about two miles from the north entrance registry Sunday night, rolling over twice before its fall ceased. Neither Manary, nor his companion Veronica MacDougal, Prineville, was badly hurt.

Investigators said that Manary probably dozed off before the accident occurred. The car fell about 25 feet over the steep grade. It was enroute to Prineville.

STOCK SHIPMENTS START FROM NORTH

CHILOQUIN, Ore., Aug. 2—(Special)—The seasonal shipments of live stock from the upper marsh and Wood River valley district is beginning with the shipment of a few cars of veal calves to California markets. It is expected there will be in the neighborhood of 1000 cars of cattle move from this district to the various markets and California grazing lands at the end of the season.

NEW STEEL LAID ON S. P. CURVES

CHILOQUIN, Ore., Aug. 2—(Special)—The extra gang on the Southern Pacific has moved from Braymill siding to Calamus, the gang supervised by Roadmaster V. E. Parker of Klamath Falls and Foreman Frank Pucel of Calfax, Calif., is laying new steel on the curves in this district. They have been in the vicinity of Chiloquin for about two weeks and it will be some time before the work is completed. There are 50 men employed in this work.

G. E. Wall of Oakland, Calif., and Wm. Reister of Klamath Falls are the signal men in charge of the changing of the wiring from the old rails to the new for the automatic block signals.

The Southern Pacific reports car loadings at Chiloquin were increased during July due to the Chiloquin Lumber Co. shipping 35 cars of scrap steel to Portland, Seattle and San Francisco. The steel was for export.

The Southern Pacific has added another telegraph operator to their staff at Kirk. The new position is being filled by A. R. Grubb of Dunsmuir, Calif.

There was a 24-hour delay to a train of logs moving from Mazama siding to the Forest Lumber company at Pine Ridge last week due to the Great Northern engine

handling the train being derailed at Kirk.

It was necessary for the relief outfit to be sent from the Klamath Falls to the scene to rerail the locomotive. There was no delay to main line traffic due to the derailment. No one was injured.

Friday, August 13—just a week from next Friday—will be "Jinx Day" in the city recreation program. It will mark the closing of the activities work in connection with playground set-up that has been operating since June 1. By activities work we mean that part of the recreation program that has to do with the handicrafts; the constructive, the building, the occupational part of the summer work.

Out will go cooking and sewing which have held the interest of dozens of boys and girls for weeks. The popular shop classes which have been so active all through the summer will be closed. The elementary art classes, the library and the gymnasiums will no longer be available to the scores of youngsters who have been flocking to them since the close of school. It will be "Jinx Day" to all those children who have been primarily interested in the activities part of the program.

All this is made necessary because of the need to renovate and recondition the many classrooms and shops before the opening of the regular school year on September 7th. These rooms have had a lot of hard use during the summer and work on them has been delayed until the close of the summer program. All the rest of the rooms will be finished by that time. Now these will need cleaning up, will need painting and refinishing, will need their faces lifted. They must be spic and span for the opening of school. These rooms have made excellent quarters for the summer program. We have appreciated them and are glad to turn them back to their intended use.

The close of the activities work does not mean the close of the whole recreational program. The playgrounds will be operating right up until the Friday before school starts. Additional supervisors will be placed upon them and play hours—supervised play hours—will be lengthened. Play equipment will not be stored until the last minute before the opening of school. It is all in for a lot of hard use before being stored for the winter.

Playground work will be ready for a boom when the handicraft projects close. The people who have been spending so much of their time in other activities will need these playgrounds to "tap off" on. For this reason the Civic Recreation committee has decided upon the continuation of this part of the program.

Supervisors are planning for the closing week of the activities program. Friday the thirteenth may be "Jinx Day" to a lot of people but to the people of the playgrounds it will probably mean "High Jinx Day". You may expect almost anything to happen. At least there are plans for an Achievement Day Program that should be interesting to all. Perhaps there will be a Field Day also and surely that softball feud will not be entirely settled.

Here's one for the book. We were accosted at the softball game the other evening by a mob

of youngsters from the playgrounds. Their faces were lit up like light-houses and they had the gleam of battle in their eyes. Ambition was written all over them and by the way they squirmed around one knew they were just itching for something. What do you suppose it was? You never could guess. Well, here it is: they wished to issue a challenge to the Southern Pacific softball team for a game to be played anytime, any place satisfactory to them. Imagine that. And they were sincere. They mean business.
