

Ruppert's Boys Take Two With Grand Slams

YANK HOMERS ROUT CHICAGO

New York Hits 'em When It Needs 'em; Cubs Beat Phillies.

They're here in the clutch—the Yankees.

A series for the league lead, an all-star game, or a world series gives many a team the blind staggers. But not Colonel Ruppert's boys in white. The Yanks just swing their bludgeons and bring home the bacon. They reserve their most momentous feats for days when the competition is tight and the stands are full.

Employing their time-honored home run technique—"hit 'em where they can't possibly be"—the Yanks blew down the Chicago White Sox in both games of a doubleheader Tuesday, 7 to 3 and 5 to 3, and pushed their league lead to seven games. The season's largest weekday crowd, 66,787 fans, was on hand.

Home runs, trade mark of the Yankees since 1921, won both games. Bill Dickey hit his 19th with three on in the eighth inning of the second game to climax a bombardment that had begun when Lou Gehrig, starting his 1500th consecutive game, had shot his No. 22 into the stands with two mates aboard in the fifth inning of the opener. In between these two wallops the Yanks' batting Banditti, Joe DiMaggio and Tony Lazzeri, took care of the scoring. Joe hit No. 32 with two mates aboard in the seventh inning of the first contest and Tony got one in each game.

Red Ruffing muffed the Sox in the opener for his 14th victory and Vernon Gomez seemed headed the same way in the second game when the south side's heroes ganged him for three runs in the seventh and eighth. But when the Yanks came up in the latter inning Rolfe singled, DiMaggio doubled, Gehrig walked and Dickey lined one into the stands.

The Sox, who came to New York with gaudy dreams of a four-game sweep, are burdened with a two-game deficit and the series is half over. For the moment their pennant ambitions are squelched.

Gehrig, as chipper as a rookie in the field and at bat, was presented a watch between games for being the league's most valuable player in 1936.

The Chicago Cubs, with Bill Lee, Gabby Hartnett and Frank Demaree hitting homers, subjugated the Phillies, 4-1, as Lee hurled his 12th victory. The win gave the Cubs a seven-game lead in the National league over the Giants, who dropped a tight one to the Reds in the tenth, 3-2. The Pirates picked up a game and a half on the Giants by beating the Dodgers, 5-4 and 10-4. The pugnacious Al Todd led the Bucs at bat in the second game with two triples, a double and a single.

Bob Grove pitched the Red Sox to a 13-2 triumph over the Indians, and Earl Browner's homer, his first of the season, beat the Tigers for the A's, 2-1. The Senators shaded the Browns, 3-2, in the 12th on Johnny Stoen's single.

Sacs Increase Lead at Expense of S. F. Seals

San Francisco's Pacific Coast league Seals, wallowed a bit deeper in their place Wednesday, bewildered as to how Sacramento's second place Solons overcame a six run lead to nose them out, 8 to 7.

While Sacramento increased its percentage at the expense of the Seals, the leading San Diego team with the aid of a homer by young Ted Williams with two on the base, wallowed the Portland Beavers, 11 to 3 in the first game of their series.

Ernie Bonham, Acorn right hander halted the Los Angeles team's winning streak Tuesday night by limiting the Angels to one hit as the Oaks' Dario Lodigiani hit a double with one on to drive in the only run of the game. Steve Mesner of the Angels ruined Bonham's chances for a no-hit performance by slashing a single in the eighth.

The lowly San Francisco Mission continued their winning streak at the expense of the Seattle Indians as Johnny Barich pitched five hit ball to win 5 to 2.

A homer by Gene Lillard with

two mates aboard, a double, triple and single by Dominic DiMaggio, youngest of the baseball DiMaggios, would have been enough to win most ball games, but not from Sacramento. Going into the sixth inning the Solons were six runs behind. They scored a pair that inning, another in the seventh and eighth and three more in the ninth to sew up the game. The Seals outbit the Solons 14 to 12.

Lillard, who pitches when not playing third base or shortstop and leads the league in hitting, turned in the most sensational play of the game making a one handed stab of a line drive and turning it into a double play in the third inning.

Ad Liska, Portland's submarine ball ace, was after his 19th victory of the season when the Padres blasted him from the mound and were none too gentle with his successor, Hobo Carson. Rupert Thompson and Bill Starr nicked the Beaver pitchers for four safeties each. The Padres collected 18 hits.

Wally Hebert limited the Beavers to eight hits. Both teams played errorless ball.

HOUSE COMMITTEE ACCEPTS SENATE WAGE-HOUR DRAFT

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4 (AP)—The house labor committee recommended to the house today a rewritten version of the labor standards bill, retaining the wage and hour provisions approved by the senate.

Discarding a previously adopted amendment which would have permitted federal fixing of minimum wages as high as 70 cents an hour and a work week as short as 35 hours, the committee accepted the 40-hour weekly wage limitation and 40-hour week prescribed by the senate. The committee also restored to the bill the so-called Borah amendment exempting employees of dairy cooperatives from provisions of the bill.

Lehman Urged To Aid Montague In Extradition Fight

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 4 (AP)—Governor Frank Merriam of California said today that if John Montague, Hollywood's "mystery man" of golf and favorite of film celebrities, "has reformed to such an extent as to become a highly exemplary citizen, the man to whom that should be pointed out is the governor of New York."

Governor Merriam has under advisement a case in which Montague is fighting extradition to New York to face a seven-year-old roadside robbery charge. The governor said he would not make a decision in the case for at least ten days.

Apparently heeding the suggestion of California's governor, counsel for Montague said it was preparing a request to Governor Herbert H. Lehman of New York to countermand the extradition request on the ground his client has rehabilitated himself during his seven years in Hollywood in which he has amazed friends with feats of golf prowess.

John Henry Lewis Hounds Joe Louis For Title Match

PITTSBURGH, Aug. 4 (AP)—John Henry Lewis, rapidly outgrowing his light heavyweight championship, plucked all of his eggs into one basket today and began "hounding" Joe Louis for a heavyweight title fight.

His signature on a contract which would guarantee the bonhomie \$150,000 to defend his crown in Pittsburgh, Lewis declared he was ready to forsake the 175-pound bracket he has headed since October 21, 1935.

"I weigh a little over 185 now," Lewis said, "and it's kind of hard to get down there. I'd give up the title for a chance at Louis. And I'm going to hound Joe until I get it."

Manager Greenlee was confident. "I don't see how Louis can turn down that much money and we're willing to fight for nothing to get that title. I know my boy can beat him."

Lewis, 22-year-old Negro, began training today for a bout here August 18 with Italo Colonnello, billed as the Italian heavyweight champion.

Inquiry Started In Ring Death Of Chicago Pugilist

PITTSBURGH, Aug. 4 (AP)—Deputy Coroner J. L. Davidson ordered a "thorough investigation" today in the death last night of Johnny Page, Chicago lightweight, 24 hours after he was knocked out by Eddie Zivic. Davidson said a post mortem would be held and that he would question Zivic, Page's handlers, the examining physicians and ring officials.

A brain concussion caused the death of the 22-year-old fighter who crumpled under a smashing right to the head in the ninth round of a scheduled 10-round semi-final match Monday night.

Page, fighting as a substitute for Charley Burns of St. Michaels, Pa., was leading the fight before he was felled. Assistants carried him to his corner and worked on him for ten minutes before he was removed to a hospital.

Zivic visited Page at the hospital yesterday.

Page transferred his headquarters from Los Angeles to Chicago two weeks ago. He was born in Dallas, Texas, where his mother resides. Since 1934, he has won 13 fights, eight by knockouts, and had lost five.
