FIRE LOSS SMALL IN JULY AT K. F.

Fire loss in Klamath Falls during July amounted only to \$50.10, according to reports from Fire Chief Keith K. Ambrose. On this amount of damage insurance collected totaled \$50.10.

There were 17 alarms of which four were false, turned into the fire station during the month, and men and equipment were in actual service for two hours and 35 minutes.

Sound value of property at risk in the minor blazes of the past month was set at \$710,250, and insurance carried amounted to \$469,500.

Eighty-three inspections were made by the chief and his assistants during the month, and 13 hazards eliminated.
