

# Seals Arrive Monday Morning for Sox Game

## PLAY TO BEGIN AT 5:30 P. M.

### Baseball Parade Slated for Monday Afternoon on Streets.

The San Francisco Seals ball team will arrive in Klamath Falls on the 10:55 a. m. northbound train, according to a telegram received Friday from Charles Graham, president of the Seals. The entire squad, en route to play the Portland Beavers, will make the stop here for the game with the Klamath Falls Red Sox, scheduled for 5:30 p. m. Monday, on Modoc field.

Hal Haight, who has arranged the game, declared Friday that talk to the effect that the Seals second team will take the field, is entirely wrong.

The entire squad, he said, is of Class AA calibre, generally consisting of five outfielders, six infielders, three catchers and eight pitchers. With the player limit down to 25 men, it is impossible for a Coast league team to carry more than one or two inexperienced players.

"Fans can rest assured that the regulars will be in the line-up," Haight said.

Advance ticket sales indicate the presence of a large crowd for the game. Tickets are on sale at the Smoke, the Waldorf, the chamber of commerce, Molitor's and Polin's.

A baseball parade will be staged Monday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock. The Seals' drum corps will be out to take the lead with Walter (The Great) Mails of the Seals leading the drum corps. Mails is quite a comedian, and has been called on to lead the band at opening of games for many years.

**Mayor Richmond**—Staging of a game of this calibre adds more proof to the people of the Pacific coast that Klamath Falls is the metropolitan city of southern Oregon and northern California. San Diego increased its lead by defeating Portland 5 to 1, and pushing them back to fourth place after a 24-hour stay in the third spot. Oakland continued to win both games by trouncing Los Angeles 4 to 1, and Seattle turned on the Missions to win, 5 to 1.

The Senators outbit the Seals 13 to 8, but the San Francisco outfit made hits when they meant runs. Harley Boss and Ted Norbert opened the Seal's half of the ninth with singles. Boss went to third on Lou Vassallo's two-bagger. Larry Woodall was given a walk and the bag was filled.

Gentleman Dick Newsom, who had been pitching good ball until then, was yanked for Tom Seaus. Geans Lillard went in to pinch hit for Pitcher Frank Lamanske. He smacked a single, and two runners crossed the plate to tie up the game. Dominic DiMaggio was sent in to run for Woodall and scored the winning run on Ed Longacres long outfield fly.

## Baker Park's Short Wall Held Reason for Pitiful Philly Showing at Home

Ask any National league Philadelphia pitcher to describe an eagle, and the answer, nine times out of ten, will be the Phillies ball park.

"You can stand at home plate in that shoebox," is the general reply, "and pretty near throw a grand piano over that short right field wall. The boundaries are so close, that when you get up there to pitch, you haven't got room for your windup. Any pitcher who gets past a game there, deserves the congressional medal."

That's the reason the Phils are playing cellar ball at home in the National league, and show nearly a first division record on the road. It also explains why the loop's pitchers would rather take a salary cut than work in Baker bowl, and why two of the better flingers, Bucky Walters and Lefty Lamaster, each have better than 300 averages away from home this season, and yet their stats knocked off more often than not in Philadelphia.

The Giants and Cardinals are crying for flingers with their stuff, but with the Phils, because of that 280-foot right field home run target, they're as wasted as a bet on a long shot against War Admiral.

Every club is supposed to show to better advantage in their own back yard—but the Phils haven't a chance. To date this year, they have won 24 games on the road and only 16 at home, and have dropped 23 on tour and 34 in Baker bowl. No wonder they're in the cellar.

## 300 PHEASANTS ARRIVE FRIDAY

### Birds Released on Bly Ranches And in Pens At Moore Park.

The first shipment of pheasants for Klamath county from the state game commission arrived Friday morning.

Three hundred beautiful little birds came in the crates on a game commission truck. About 250 of them were released in the pens at Moore park.

Sixty birds were taken to the Bell brothers, Obenchain and another ranch in the Bly district. There are believed the first pheasants released in that section of the county.

Dr. S. P. Scott, secretary of the Klamath Sportsmen's association, was on hand to greet the pheasants when they arrived. He said he expects another 350 birds will be shipped here to be turned loose in this county.

The birds are released in spots where there is a certainty of water, food and cover, and also where farmers will take care of them in the winter.

Fifty were released at Modoc Point on the way south Friday.

Scott pointed out that shooting of hens will not be permitted this year. If the winter is mild, he said, there is an excellent chance for an increase in the pheasant population in this district.
