## HANDLING MAIL BECOMES BOOMING BUSINESS HERE

Two years, it was stated Thursday. One of the most disagreeable events in a mail carrier's life is the frequency of attacks by dogs. "And it is always the 'perfectly harmless' dog that bites us, too," one carrier said.

Many queer things are shipped through the mails at the local office, an official stated. Turtles were shipped in great quantities recently to a Chinese restaurant in Seattle, Wash.

An enterprising citizen of Klamath Falls laid snares on the upper lake and Link river, and caught a dozen or more turtles a day to be sent north. He made a considerable sum of money from this industry too, it was said.

Lizards are often shipped through the mail, and once in a while roosters and hens are received, although provisions only allow shipments of day-old chickens, and the crows and racklers are definitely banned by law.

The postoffice department has had considerable trouble recently with improperly packed electric razors. These razors are very fragile, and it has been necessary to issue strict regulations for their packing.

Parcel post clerks are often criticized for refusing to accept improperly packed parcels. If they do weaken and accept such a package, however, they are not only demerited, but in addition are compelled to pay for any damage to the article when not properly packed.

Demerits are particularly feared by postal employees, and any sort of inefficiency or carelessness in observing regulations brings demerits ranging from a fraction of a black mark to several units, according to the gravity of the offense.

The money order business at the local office has increased greatly during the past year, especially on Saturdays and Mondays, when patrons sometimes have to stand in line 10 or 15 minutes before reaching the money order window. Heavy patronage at the money order department also occurs on mill and railroad pay days.

On ordinary business days, however, patrons are waited upon within a few minutes after preparing the money order application.

July receipts at the Klamath postoffice totaled \$9,941.71, an increase of 13.817 per cent over July 1936, when the total receipts were \$8,734.79.

The fiscal year ending June 30, 1937, showed a total receipt of \$110,624.50, according to records, and if business continues at the present rate, total receipts for the calendar year ending December 31, 1937, will be at least \$121,000, the largest amount in history, according to officials' estimates.

Receipts for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1935, were \$85,596.20, and for the year ending June 30, 1936, were \$95,655.57.

room of their west end home today.

Deputy Coroner J. L. Davidson said he and homicide detectives were not certain of the circumstances leading to the deaths. Davidson asserted he did not know whether it is murder or suicide.

Three notes, signed by the brother, Bernard, a 28-year-old unemployed bookkeeper, were found by Homicide Detectives Fred Good and Edward Scanlon. They said one of the notes stated:

Note Text  
"Oh, if there were some way other than this out of our misery."

Bernard lay near the bed, a rifle beside him. The sisters, Marian, 12, and Betty, 17, were sprawled close together, bullet wounds in their heads. They were in night clothing.

The body of Mrs. Anna Gregor, the mother, lay crumpled at the foot of the bed.

Bernard's note, dated August 5, continued:  
"At one time or other I've heard all these say something exactly like they wished they were dead. 'So, maybe I am really right. There is absolutely nothing ahead."

Neighbor Heard Shots  
"I am the only one who knows what I intend to do. I told mother to have some kind of a will made out in case something would happen to her at any time."

Herman Schutte, a neighbor, said, "we heard the shots about 5 a. m. and got up and looked around. When we couldn't find anything we went back to bed."

"Frank found the bodies when he came in this morning."

The rifle found in the bedroom in the bedroom in the second floor apartment was a single shooter, police said, and would have to be reloaded for each shot.
