

Late Selling Reduces Prices

RAILS, STEEL AND UTILITIES LEAD IN TREND

NEW YORK, Aug. 6 (AP)—Late selling in today's stock market knocked down leaders fractions to two points. There were a few wider setbacks.

Pivotal stocks, rails, utilities, farm implements and rubbers were among the principal sufferers. At the same time offerings were far from voluminous.

Selected mining issues and specialties managed to buck the trend. Rising metal prices both here and abroad stimulated the former and actual and prospective company profits brought support for the latter.

There was little in the news to inspire liquidation, brokers said, but notable inability of the market to hold gains to make headway in the past few sessions tended to discourage trading forces.

Traders approximated 700,000 shares.

WHEAT MARKET GOES INTO SLUMP FRIDAY

CHICAGO, Aug. 6 (AP)—Late tumbles carried the Chicago wheat market down today more than 3/4¢ per bushel, following a 1/2¢ drop at Winnipeg.

Increased selling of futures against newly harvested domestic wheat was a feature, together with lack of any export business of consequence either in United States or Canadian wheat. There were also indications of corn belt rains where needed.

At the close wheat was 2 1/2¢ to 3 1/2¢ under Thursday's finish, September \$1.12 to \$1.12 1/2, December \$1.13 to \$1.13 1/2, corn 1 1/2¢ off to 4¢ up, September \$1.00 to \$1.00 1/2, December 66 1/2¢ to 66 1/2¢, and oats 1/4¢ to 3/4¢ down.

MARKET FOR WOOL CONTINUES SLOW

BOSTON, Aug. 6 (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow:

"Although there is distinctly less buying in the west, there has been a little more interest shown on the part of certain mill buyers in the eastern market. On the whole, however, the market is rather slow, with prices keeping generally upon the levels set in the west a week or ten days ago.

"Reports from the piece goods markets are rather conflicting, although it appears that the response to the earlier lightweight openings has not been very satisfactory as yet. Some improvement is noted in women's wear lines. Spinners are still in the doldrums, while topmakers are getting some business irregularly.

"Foreign markets are slow, but very firm."

PINE PRODUCTION SHOWS DECREASE

PORTLAND, Aug. 6 (AP)—Reports from 114 mills showed last week's new business of 76,072,000 board feet of lumber was 22 per cent above the previous week's mark, the Western Pine association said today.

Production totaled 88,423,000 feet, a decline from the previous week, and shipments reached 73,404,000 feet, a gain of about four million feet. Orders, production and shipments exceeded totals for the corresponding week of 1936.

To date, orders were reported 15 per cent above last year.

RETAIL TRADE GAIN REPORTED BY DUN'S

NEW YORK, Aug. 6 (AP)—With hot weather spurring demand for summer goods retail trade volume established further gains in many areas during the past week, Dun & Bradstreet said today in their weekly review.

All leading centers of distribution reported larger sales than for the week preceding, the gains ranging from 3 to 3 per cent. The review noted, however, that except in those districts where buying was brought to a standstill by last summer's drought, there was little improvement over the previous year's total.

The estimated volume of retail distributions for the country as a whole was estimated at from 8 to 20 per cent larger than for the corresponding week last year.
