

# Red Sox Invade Redding First Time Sunday

## GAME CRUCIAL IN NC LEAGUE

Many Fans Expected to Attend Game in Redding Sunday

Invading Redding for the first time this season, the league-leading Klamath Falls Red Sox planned to leave for the California city early Saturday evening in preparation for the big battle with the Redding Tigers on Sunday.

Thirty players and fans made up the party leaving Saturday, and a host of Klamath folk are planning on driving down Sunday morning for the contest. The Red Sox will make the Golden Eagle hotel their headquarters.

According to Tom Gleason, Redding resident and vice-president of the Northern California league, the largest crowd of the year is expected in the Redding baseball stands. The Redding city band will be on hand to pep the game up and entertain the fans. Redding boasts of a new, modern baseball park, built similar to the Seals' stadium in San Francisco, only on a smaller scale. A turf field promises a fast game.

Manager "Red" Sanders of the local club has not yet announced who will start on the mound for the Sox, but many believe he will use young Lyle Turpin, right-hander, who has turned in several beautiful games this season to add to the list of Red Sox victories. Turpin has a smoking fast ball and a nice deceptive curve, and when he is "on" for the day, it takes a mighty good club to beat him. Either Fryer or Granger will do the receiving. However, Clyde Carlstrom, Red Sox hurler, already has one win to his credit over Redding, and Manager Sanders may start this experienced veteran on the mound to steady the whole team.

Klamath will run up against such fine players as Art Koehler, catcher; Tiger Flowers, outfielder; and Balms, second sacker, all real sluggers, and with plenty of baseball experience.

It is bound to be a good game, and Klamath needs this win to put them over the top in the league schedule.

## Sopwith Says Big Sloops Should Continue to Race For International Trophy

NEWPORT, R. I., Aug. 7 (AP)—T. O. M. Sopwith brushed aside today the idea that the big, expensive class J sloops might be discarded in future America's cup competition, in favor of smaller boats.

"I might as well sail for it in 'thirties,'" he scoffed. "Why not run the derby with cart horses or ponies?"

Then the man whose Endeavour failed in four straight races to finish ahead of Harold S. Vanderbilt's sleek Ranger, went into detail: "The America's cup should be sailed for by the biggest class available. It is time to look for a new class when you want an extra class, or when a present class is moribund. The J class is far from moribund for you have several fine J sloops, so why wreck it?"

There have been suggestions a smaller sloop would widen competition for the trophy, emblematic of world supremacy in yachting ever since the schooner America won it in 1851. Sopwith insisted such proposals have not come from anyone connected with J sloops on either side of the Atlantic.

The approximate cost of building and racing a J boat, the largest of racing sloops, in an America's cup contest is \$500,000.

## Yank Victories Read Like Two-Reel Thriller Script

It reads like a script for a two-reel thriller: A Griffith or a Holace couldn't do better than the dramatic methods the New York Yankees are using to win their ball games these days.

Take Friday, for instance. For eight innings, Young Bob Feller of Cleveland tied the score in knots, allowing six hits and fanning an even dozen. With only three putouts to go and a three-run lead on his side, it looked like money in the bank.

Then, in the ninth, Red Rolfe, who had fanned three times before, tripled to send one run across, and Lou Gehrig, also victim of three previous strikeouts, socked a homer, and the game was tied up. Hal Trosky hit his second homer in the tenth to put the Tribe out in front again. But, with Johnny Heving replacing Feller, and with two out and two on and the count three-and-two on Joe DiMaggio, the deadpan dynamite gave the "third act" its smash climax with a double to left that broke up the ball game, for a 7-6 Yank victory.

That was Friday. The day before, against the White Sox, Gehrig's homer featured a come-back in the eighth inning to pull a victory out of certain defeat, and the day before that, Bill Dickey hit a homer with the bases loaded to bring the Yanks from behind, and Gehrig blasted one to break a tie and win the game. And the day before that, behind 3-1 in the eighth, the Yanks turned the trick again when Dickey hammered a homer with the bases loaded in the eighth.

The Cubs are applying different technique in the National league, but they're getting much the same results so far. Yesterday they snuffed out of a short-lived hitting slump like a shot out of a cannon, and belted over the Boston Bees, 12-6 and 6-2, with a 30-hit barrage in a double-header.

This twin win gave them a 54-game lead, although the second-place Giants, who are slowly replacing, topped the pirates, 6-3, with Carl Hubbel coming out of his losing doldrums.

The Boston Red Sox, hottest outfit in the big time, made it 11 games without a defeat by walloping the White Sox, 7-3 on Pinky Higgins' two homers. The Tigers whipped the Senators, 10-3. The Athletics and Browns were idle.

The Phillies kicked away a seven-run lead and lost, 10-7, to the Cardinals.

## CORN GOES UP ON DAMAGE REPORTS

CHICAGO, Aug. 7 (AP)—For the first time since 1937 corn growth started, serious concern for the safety of the crop became manifest today. Prices scored notable gains.

Complaints that owing to prolonged hot dry weather the leaves of corn were firing over widespread areas, Nebraska in particular, bolstered the corn market an extreme of three cents a bushel.

A majority of traders, however, leaned to belief that despite need of moisture, the general corn crop outlook remained favorable, and top quotations reached were not strongly held.

At the close corn was 14c to 2c above Friday's finish. September \$1.04 to \$1.02, December 65c to 63c; wheat unchanged to 11c up, September \$1.12 to \$1.13, and oats 4c to 4c advanced.
