

JAPAN COLD ON CHINESE PEACE PARLEY OFFERS

ing and Kalgan, to assure the continued possession of Peiping and the north China plain.

Chinese feared the Japanese army planned to seize all of Chahar and Suiyuan provinces, carrying out the military campaign in that area attempted last year by pro-Japanese Mongol and Manchukuoan armies.

On the Peiping-Hankow line the Chinese Central news agency said that Nanking troops still held the entire stretch of railway north of the Yellow river to Changshien, within sight of the walls of Peiping.

HANKOW, China, Aug. 7 (AP)—Japanese naval and consular officials today ordered complete evacuation of all Japanese in this important commercial city and international treaty port at the confluence of the Yangtze and Han rivers.

The Japanese officials, reportedly acting on orders from Tokyo, decreed that all Japanese nationals must quit Hankow before noon Sunday (11 p. m. EST Saturday) leaving administration of the Japanese concession to Chinese authorities.

Three American gunboats, built in China for use by the United States Navy, stood by tonight observing the Japanese evacuation and guarding the American colony of 200 men, women and children.

The warships were the Oahu, Guam and Luron, the latter serving as flagship for Rear Admiral E. J. Maguire. A majority of the American women and children are summering at Kikung-shan or Kunging and their evacuation was not anticipated.

Although Hankow is hundreds of miles south of the northern China hostilities, Japanese have expressed apprehension for the safety of her citizens in central China, asserting that large bodies of Chinese soldiers were concentrated in the region.

Other cities along the great Yangtze waterway to the sea have been evacuated by the Japanese as a precautionary measure.

Tension in Hankow mounted yesterday after the landing of Japanese warships, and evacuation preparations went forward feverishly. Five hundred Japanese, including 400 women and children, departed from the city this morning and a majority of the remaining Japanese were concentrated on a river barge waiting evacuation down the river.

It was reported the American consul-general had advised all Americans in the part of his consular district along the Yellow river to withdraw to places of safety.

The report coming soon after official intimations in Tientsin that the Japanese campaign might extend to all Chinese territory north of the river, advised that foreigners in the vast region should be warned.

If outbreaks occurred in Hankow numerous Americans would be involved, for about 100 United States citizens were reported in that city and its sister cities of Wuchang and Hanyang.

believed responsible for a similar attack on the Italian steamer Mongola and a machine gun onslaught against a French cargo boat, the Diebel Amour.

The captain of the Italian ship, one of two persons wounded aboard the Mongola, was in an Alger hospital today, seriously injured by a bomb splinter that struck him in the chest.

On "Lawful Business" An officer of the Spanish non-intervention system was the other victim. He had a broken arm.

Lord Beaverbrook's Daily Express urged Great Britain to "set out in full array" and remove the three planes from the sky.

The British Corporal was "about her lawful business, bringing oil to this country," the newspaper said.

Rebellion Reported Headlines, Franco-Spanish from H. N. D. A. Y. E. Franco-Spanish Frontier, Aug. 7 (AP)—Spanish insurgent army officers at Iron declared today they had received reports of an anarchist rebellion at Albacete and other important Spanish government centers.

The insurgents said that former Premier Francisco Largo Caballero, extreme socialist leader, was reported to be head of the anarchist movement.

Government forces in eastern Spain threatened to push Generalissimo Francisco Franco's Teruel salient back in its tracks, Madrid Valencia commanders reported.

They said frontal and flank attacks by infantry and artillery from the south and west of the Albarrañ sector of the Teruel front had gouged insurgents out of the newly won territory southwest of Teruel, Franco's lower Ataxona base.

The government declared Franco's drive to cut the Madrid-Valencia road where it traverses Cuenca province had been checked.

Insurgent advances asserted, however, that Franco's bombing planes, shelling the pine-clad peaks of the central sector, and infantry working over the rocky terrain, had driven the government from important positions.

WPA WORKERS' ATTITUDE TOWARD JOBS DEPLOYED

PORTLAND, Aug. 7 (AP)—WPA workers should be "discouraged in the tendency to consider WPA employment as a permanent type of employment intended for their future security," E. J. Griffith, WPA administrator for Oregon, said today in a letter to Elmer R. Goudy, state relief director.

Explaining reasons for the dis-

missal of 2200 WPA enrollees, Griffith said that the large voluntary withdrawal of workers within the past few months indicated that private employment was available.

He told Goudy that workers being released were aliens who have not declared their intention to become citizens prior to passage of the 1937 relief act, non-certified workers, those physically unable to perform the work available, and others located on small, isolated projects near agricultural areas.

HILL VISITORS HAVE PROMISE OF FAIR SKY

Fair weather was in prospect for the weekend Saturday as many Klamath people prepared to trek to the mountains. A large number were expected to attend the Willamette highway picnic at Odell lake.

Large signs pointing the way to the picnic grounds were being placed Saturday in preparation for the good-will picnic of Lane, Klamath and Lake county residents.

Many hikers for Klamathites had been distributed from the chamber of commerce up to Saturday noon, and officials stated that additional badges would be obtainable at the north end of Odell lake Sunday.

A special train carrying 200 Eugene residents will arrive at the lake shortly before noon, and the picnic luncheon will be served at 12:30 o'clock. Free coffee will be provided, it was announced by the chamber of commerce.

Despite low humidity and serious hazards, no forest fires were reported Saturday afternoon, according to the Klamath Forest Protective association.

Picnickers and visitors to the woods over the weekend are urged to observe the greatest caution, however, as a spark now would cause terrific damages.

Continued fair weather is predicted for the coming week, and temperatures are likely to remain above normal.

SENATE PASSES COMPROMISE COURT REVISION BILL

The sugar quota bill was approved by the house yesterday, despite a warning by President Roosevelt that he would veto it unless it was modified.

The members defeated an administration amendment to lift the measure's restrictions on imports of refined sugar from Hawaii, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands.

How Things Stand The senate passed the Wagner housing bill yesterday, but inserted limitations which sponsors declared blocked part of its purpose.
