Jap War Activities Boost America's National Debt

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7 (UP)—The U. S. national debt has gone up \$136,000,000 as a result of Japanese preparations for the present undeclared war in China, it was learned today.

A representative of the federal reserve board disclosed that the administration has absorbed this amount in gold sterilization program, in the gold sterilization program, in consequence of which the treasury must borrow funds to prevent inflationary effects of the metal on the nation's credit structure.

The result has been to increase the per capita debt by slightly more than \$1 for each man, woman and child in the United States.

Officials said the investigation had proved that most of the bullion entering here had been transferred into sterling credits, registered at London, to help reduce Japanese indebtedness to the world and prepare for military borrowings.

In addition, they said considerable credits had been employed in the purchase of raw materials and other war supplies.

The result has been to build up the treasury's gold sterilization fund by more than 10 per cent. The total inactive gold figure today was \$1,220,505,966.

Although the debt does not necessarily shoot up immediately on entry of gold imports, officials said it is inevitable that borrowings to "sterilize" the bullion are finally reflected in the debt statement. The public debt was listed tonight at \$36,714,595,559.

Borrowings are necessary to replace any funds withdrawn from the treasury's balance to "pay" for the inactive gold.

Fiscal experts said they expected an even greater increase in the Japanese gold imports as soon as the empire's diet approves gold revaluation plans announced in Tokyo, July 23.
